Irish Volunteers, Galway City Corps, May to October 1914

Galway County Council Archives welcomes you to its online exhibition which includes exciting original source material recording the development of the Volunteers in Galway City in 1914. It also includes records documenting the split in the organisation following the outbreak of World War I.

The exhibition is primarily comprised of items from two collections, Minutes of the Irish Volunteers, Galway City Corps dating from 4th May to 20th September 1914, (GS01/03), and also a City Corps file of correspondence dated 25th July to 5th October 1914 (GS13/02). These two small items hold a wealth of rarely accessed material relating to the early days of the Corps in Galway.

Irish Volunteers, Galway City Corps, May to October 1914

The Irish Volunteers - Óglaigh na hÉireann were founded on 25 November 1913 at a public meeting held in the Rotunda Rink in Founders of the Volunteers included Dublin. Professor Eoin Mac Néill and The O'Rahilly, a member of the governing body of the Gaelic League. The Galway Corps was established just months later, following a meeting in the Town Hall in December 1913, which was addressed by MacNéill, Sir Roger Casement and others.

By July 1914 the Irish Volunteers numbered around 160,000 members, formed against a background of rising militancy in Ireland after the Irish Home Rule Bill of 1912, to which Ulster Unionists were vehemently opposed.

Redmond would have confidence, would prove to the world that the manhood of Ireland are ready to do their part in defence of their homes and liberties, and if need be to protect our fellow Nationalists in Ulster from insult and attack".

Galway County Council and Galway Rural District Council also adopted this resolution, (G01/2, p529 and G01/9/3, p523).

STATEMENT BY THOMAS HYNES, Kilcullen, Newcastle Road, Galway. Thomas Hynes, recalls the establishment of the Volunteers in Galway.

Military Archives, Bureau of Military History Collection 1913-1921, witness statement 714.

My connection with the Volunteers connenced about 1912-1913. Previous to this I used to be in . Dublin very often, nearly every week-end in connection with athletics running at Jones Road (now Croke Park). I was introduced to some men by the late Ton Kenny, In later years I found out those men were Craughwell. I was generally given a bunch of the all I.R.B. men. first Sinn Féin pamphlets and asked to post them up in Galway; this I did faithfully. A short time after this I was introduced to George Nicholls, a young solicitor working in G.C. Conroy's office, Francis Street, Galway, and a Seamus Carter working in the County Council office at the Courthouse, Galway. Carter I knew before as a member of the Galway City Harriers.

I was asked to join the Gaelic League and Pipers' Band. There I met John Hosty, Ton Flanagan, Martin Ridge, John Griffin, John Tierney, J. Beatty and several others, also the late Mary Malone, Maggig Nelvin, etc. M. Malone was afterwards the most active girl in Galway in the Cumann na mBan, with Mrs. Donegan as Chairman.

There was a meeting held in the Town Hall, 1914-1915, (the late E. McNeill and Sir Roger Casement were amongst the speakers) for the purpose of forming the Volunteers. After the meeting a few hundred joined up but that was all that was heard of most of them.

Maurice Moore (1854-1939), brother of George Moore of Moorehall, Co. Mayo, was an author, soldier and politician. He served with the British Army (1874-1906). He was a member of the provisional committee of the Irish Volunteers, and spent much of 1914 organising the troops in Ireland. He was reluctant supporter of Redmond's takeover of the Volunteers and was ultimately the leader of the National Volunteers after the Volunteer split.

The beginning of the split in the Volunteers

Mr. Redmond, addressing a body of Irish Volunteers on last Sunday, has now announced for the Irish Volunteers a policy and programme fundamentally at variance with their own published and accepted aims and pledges, but with which his nominees are. of course, indentified. He has declared it to be the duty of the Irish Volunteers to take foreign service under a Covernment which is not Irish. He has made this announcement without consulting the Provisional Committee, the Volunteers themselves, or the people of Ireland to whose service alone they are devoted. Having thus disregarded the Irish Volunteers and their solemn engagements, Mr. Redmond is no longer entitled, through his nominees, to any place in the administration and guidance of the Irish Volunteer organisation. Those who, by virtue of Mr. Redmond's nomination, have heretofore been admitted to act on the Provisional Committee, accordingly cease henceforth to belong to that body, and from this date until the holding of an Irish Volunteer Convention the Provisional Committee consists of those only whom it comprised before the admission of Mr. Redmond's nominees.

Extract from a typed circular issued by the Provisional Committee, HQ, opposing Redmond's call, made on 20th September 1914, for the Volunteers to support the Allied cause during World War I. The Committee proposed a convention to 'reaffirm the organisation's Manifesto' and also 'To declare that Ireland cannot, with honour or safety, take part in foreign quarrels otherwise than through the free action of a National Government of her own'. It also rejects Mr Redmond's entitlement to 'any place in the administration and guidance of the Irish Volunteer organisation'. 24 Sept 1914, GS13/02.

The vast majority of the Volunteer membership remained loyal to Redmond, bringing some 142,000 members to the National Volunteers (as the pro-Redmond Volunteers became known), leaving the Irish Volunteers with under 10,000 members.

Then the unfortunate 'split' during 1914-1915. took place. There was a meeting called in the Town Hall - it was held in what was known as the Urban Council Chamber - a pretty large room; the late Martin McDonagh, T.D. (the biggest merchant in Galway) presided. His sympathics were Redmondite. Our crowd was rounded up for the occasion and a vote taken which side the Volunteers as a body would go. We had no intention of going any side but the right side, no matter how the vote went. The Redmondite section was also rounded up - they had a full following - Volunteers and non-Volunteers - for voting purposes. The vote was a tie, and Martin McDonagh declared the motion which was "that the Irish Volunteers deserve the support of the meeting" lost. It was inevitable anyway. Every obstacle would be thrown in the way of the Irish Volunteer Movement no matter what happened. From now on it was open war between both sections. The Irish Wolunteers had both press and people against them. The finest body of fifth columnists in Ireland were in Gelway town. The remainder of the county, especially around Castlegar area, was pretty good and could always be relied on for any help required. They were a deterrent factor against the likelihood of any of us here in town getting a bashing. You could always call on them if necessary and, did the other side know it, not half!
