### HEALTHY IRELAND

### DEMENTIA CAFÉ INITIATIVE IN CONNEMARA



The Dementia Café Initiative was launched in Connemara on Wednesday, May 7th, in An Cheathrú Rua, and it was a great success. This is to be followed by the launch of our Clifden social club on Monday, May 12th, and the Dementia Café in Leitir Mealláin on Wednesday, May 21st.

The event began with a Meet and Greet, followed by an

information and support session from the

Alzheimer's Society of Ireland. Carers Ireland were also present to support the opening of the café, along with local volunteers. Information on the supports available for people with dementia and their carers were also provided by Carers Ireland and the Alzheimer's Society of Ireland.





Additionally, Healthy County Galway funded tailored dementia-specific activity packs, which will be available at both dementia cafés and the social club in Connemara. These packs include arts and crafts activities, board games, and interactive games such as musical bingo and playing cards.



A scheduled plan of talks and activities has been coordinated for the coming months. In June, we welcome Nicola O'Malley, who will give a talk on the benefits of aromatherapy for memory recall and engagement in dementia patients. To support this, we have added an aromatherapy kit to each of the activity packs. Aromatherapy can help reduce anxiety and agitation in dementia patients, promoting a sense of calm. It can also improve sleep quality, leading to better cognitive function during the day, and uplifting scents like lemon and grapefruit can elevate mood and reduce feelings of depression.

### COMMUNITY HEALTH AND WELLBEING BOARDS

The Community Health and Wellbeing Board initiative continues to raise awareness of local and national supports and services available to County Galway residents through the Health and Wellbeing Boards. This month, several boards were delivered to different localities to



specifically highlight these supports and services, as well as to promote the Five Ways to Wellbeing: Connect, Be Active, Take Notice, Keep Learning, and Give. These are five simple, evidence-based actions that we can all incorporate into our daily lives to enhance our wellbeing.

Some of the clubs and community groups that recently received and displayed their community boards include GRETB, Outdoor Activities in Petersburg, Stuntworx Elite in Doughiska, St. Cuans Utd in Ahascragh, and the South Galway Special Olympics Club.

### GALWAY COUNTY OLDER PEOPLE'S COUNCIL AGM

The AGM of the Galway County Older People's Council took place in the Council Chamber on Thursday 17th April 2025. The purpose of the AGM was to elect a new Executive Committee of the Older People's Council who will act as the voice of older people in the identification of issues affecting older people, and solutions or initiatives to these issues through the Age Friendly Alliance which is the interagency forum to address the challenges associated with our ageing population. Nominations were invited from a range of groups committed to improving the quality of life for older people, and a total of 18 people signed up to be part of the new Executive Committee with representatives from Active Age Groups, Men's Sheds, Heritage Groups, Community Development Groups, and older individuals. Following a round-table discussion at this initial meeting, 2 priority areas emerged as the primary concerns for the group, which will be address in further focus groups over the coming months:

- The provision of social and leisure opportunities to combat social isolation and loneliness
- The provision of a range of housing options for older people, particularly town centre housing.

## GALWAY THEATRE FESTIVAL 2025

Galway Theatre Festival took place from 02 – 10 May. Later this year, the festival will create an Artist Residency Week, a week-long intensive in Autumn 2025, delivered in partnership with Fishamble, and supported by the Arts Council, Galway City Council and Galway County Council. This will provide mentorship, professional development, and dedicated creative space for artists to refine their work.

Alongside this residency week, the Arts Office is proud to partner with Galway Theatre Festival in 2025 to support Galway County artists through direct funding and residency opportunities, strengthening artistic connections and fostering new creative voices.

Playwright and actor Rena Bryson, whose work explores mental health and sexuality through a Queer lens, will receive support to develop her practice. Rena co-founded Eva's



Echo Theatre and has written, produced, and performed in over ten productions. Also supported is playwright, performer, and sound designer Jenni Nikinmaa, a Finland- born artist based on Inishmore. Jenni's work blends dark comedy and poetic storytelling, exploring themes of hurt and healing. A former Druid FUEL artist, she is currently developing Sheep!, a play about flocks, survival, and assault.

### CREATIVE IRELAND

### LIVE MUSIC IN RESIDENTIAL HEALTHCARE SETTINGS

Galway County Council has secured additional funding of €25,000 from Creative Ireland to run a series of concerts in Nursing Homes over the course of the summer. This is a collaborative project with Galway City Council and will consist of visits to 8 Nursing Homes in total, 4 in the County and 4 in the City with each site receiving 4 visits.

This is our 3<sup>rd</sup> year running this highly popular project, and the 2<sup>nd</sup> time that we have

received additional funding for its delivery. This year the focus area for Galway County is Connemara, with the star attraction being the new healthcare facility on Inis Mór. The musician visiting this site is local singer/songwriter Padraig Jack who has recorded and released a number of songs as Gaeilge about life on the island.



### CRUINNIÚ NA NÓG 2025

We are into the final weeks of planning Cruinniú na nÓg 2025. Following on from the success of last year's programme, this year is set to be the biggest Cruinniú yet! On Friday the 9<sup>th</sup> of May, Minister Patrick O'Donovan launched Cruinniú na nÓg 2025 at King John's Castle in Limerick. In attendance were a number of Youth Ambassadors from all over the country, including our very own Brendán and Niamh from Inis Oírr who were selected to be the National Youth Ambassadors for Gaeltacht Communities.



The programme for this year features a wide variety of workshops, performances, classes, exhibitions, and so much more. Some of the highlights of this year's programme are listed below.

2025 sees the return of Gliondar's 1 Day Festival in the grounds of Athenry Heritage Centre. Sing Along Social's 'Disco in a Day' workshops and showcase which will see older teens learn how to work the decks and then putting on a gig for their friends and family in a Nighttime Economy funded event. Muintearas Teo will host

workshops in the run up to Cruinniú in which they will create a stop motion animation which



will be screened on the day itself. There are many more and details can be found on the Cruinniú na nÓg website <u>Cruinniú na nÓg - A day of free creativity for children and young people</u>.

As always, we cannot run Cruinniú na nÓg without the incredible support of the Library Service who will be hosting a wide variety of events throughout the day. Art forms covered include cooking, origami, music, storytelling, and so much more.

Once again, we are bringing Cruinniú na nÓg to the Aran Islands with a programme as Gaeilge including Branar's imagination playground, a silent disco, creative workshops, circus performances and group drumming with Drumadore. Our entire programme this year is set to be about 50% as Gaeilge.

### FITSTICK TRAILS

Through the support of Healthy Galway County, Galway Sports Partnership has installed Fitstick Trail Signage at Kilcornan Woods along with improved signage on the existing trails. We are also delighted to announce we have three more Fitstick trails due to be installed in the coming weeks in Corribdale Park, Gort Riverwalk and Lawrencetown. These





will add to the first Galway Fitstick Trail which was installed in 2024.

Galway Sports Partnership will be providing programmes at each of these locations to encourage usage.

### INCLUSIVE LEARN TO CYCLE CAMP

Galway Sports Partnerships assisted HSE Children's Disability Network's Learn to Cycle Camp in Ballinasloe. The camp was held for 3 days on the grounds of Ard Scoil Mhuire where there is both an indoor and outdoor facility for teaching children to cycle. The camp was attended by 20 children between the ages of 3 and 15 all with varying levels of disabilities.



This program gives children with additional needs the opportunity to learn to cycle in a fun and safe environment. The aim of the program is to get children cycling independently by setting

small achievable goals which eventually lead to them cycling independently.



### **GROUP VISITS**

A key element of Galway Sports Partnerships work is around information sharing and

supporting people and groups to be active. Through our work with Older Adults, we regularly do visits to these groups to provide them with various programmes we can support them with, identify programmes/activities that they would be interested in and providing demonstrations. We recently visited Killimordaly Women's Group, Mountbellew Men's Shed and through these visits we will continue to support these groups with equipment loans, programmes and linking them into existing activities in their area while also making



them aware of various supports that are available for example grant schemes.

### ACTIVE ISLANDS

At the end of 2024, Galway Sports Partnership along with Basketball Ireland supported the



startup of the Inishmore Celts through the Club Innovation Grant. This grant helps newly formed clubs in their first year of development, providing resources and guidance. The Inishmore Celts are the first basketball club established on the Aran Islands and club coaches are currently achieving and developing their coaching qualifications with Basketball Ireland which will enable the entire community, the opportunity to get involved.

On the 1<sup>st</sup> May Galway Sports Partnership and Basketball Ireland travelled out to Inis Mór bringing basketballs and equipment to the newly formed club. We also visited the local schools where every student received their very own basketball and enjoyed a fun basketball session with Basketball Irelands Development Officer Mike Murray.

### NAVIGATING THE TEENAGE YEARS: A SPORTS PERSPECTIVE

Galway Sports Partnership hosted its third inspiring webinar in the series focused on empowering young women in sport. Titled "Navigating the Teenage Years: A Sports Perspective", the session featured guest speaker Orna Murray, co-founder of Move2B, a platform dedicated to supporting teenage girls in maintaining engagement with sport and physical activity. A total of 117 participants registered for the webinar, which was aimed at teenage girls aged 12–15, along with their parents, teachers, and coaches The webinar provided a valuable platform for teenage girls and their support networks to explore the emotional and physiological changes of adolescence through the lens of sport. With Orna Murray's guidance, participants gained practical tools and inspiration to stay active, confident, and connected.

## LITTLE WANDERERS HIKE AND CRAFT

The Little Wanders Hike & Craft event took place on 01<sup>st</sup> May. The programme offers a nurturing outdoor experience for mums and their little ones. Nestled in the historic and folklore-rich woodland of Knockma Hill, the event was crafted to help mothers connect in a supportive atmosphere—with nature, their children, and one another—through a gentle

hike and creative nature-inspired activities.

Fitness and wellbeing are also at the heart of these hikes, and participants report that they enjoy the encouragement in getting outdoors, and how it has not only benefited their physical but also their mental wellbeing.

### **BUGGY BUDDIES**



Buggy Buddies aims to support parents of small babies to make time for exercise in a safe and social environment. This 6-week programme, led by a qualified instructor, offers gentle, postnatal-friendly workouts held either indoors or outdoors, depending on the location and time of year.

### **GUARDIAN GIRLS**

The Guardian Girls self-defence programme was successfully delivered in Westside and Tuam, Galway, under the instruction of Eimear Porter. This initiative, organised in collaboration with Galway Sports Partnership and supported by Sport Ireland, was strategically aligned with Women in Sport Week to empower teenage girls aged 13–17 with essential self-defence skills and awareness.

The programme commenced with a four-week series in Westside, Galway, followed by a taster session in Tuam. Eimear Porter introduced the sessions with a discussion on the importance of self-defence and the mission of the Guardian Girls initiative. A key



component of the programme was addressing gender-based violence, during which participants shared personal experiences, fostering a supportive and open environment

Over 30 teenage girls took part in the programme, with attendance caps in place to ensure quality instruction. The high demand highlighted the strong interest and need for such initiatives in the community.



## The region of Castilla-La Mancha has been a pioneer in Spain in the implementation of a

**"rural proofing" mechanism.** As of 2022, all regulations, laws, plans and programs prepared in Castilla-La Mancha include a demographic impact report to identify and assess the effects and impacts of these regulations in sparsely populated areas at risk of depopulation. Among all the Spanish and European actors that are working on rural proofing from different angles, and the leadership of Castilla-La Mancha, we can go further and work in a connected and coordinated way, sharing knowledge, and accompanying the pioneering process of rural proofing of Castilla-La Mancha, learning from it, feeding it back, strengthening it and evaluating it with the final objective of making it a more powerful tool, not only for the repopulation of Castilla-La Mancha, but of other territories

### CONTEXT AND BACKGROUND

The G30 is an original methodological model of El Hueco and Cives Mundi are using collective intelligence and co-creation, aims to devise and implement actions, projects and programs that contribute to rural repopulation and the construction of a new rurality, on the basis of social innovation and cooperation.

Since its launch, 6 editions of processes have been carried out with this methodology, which have been a success, both for their results and for the impact generated in the political decision-making bodies, in the media and in civil society.

The G30 (G100) has become an avant-garde think tank and work group, generating a current of innovative and positive thinking around the challenge of rural repopulation in Spain. In 2021, a project called G100-RuralProofing, set out to identify all those aspects of the regulatory framework that, having been created from an exclusively urban perspective, do not favour or directly harm rural environments (www.ruralproofing.com).







A bilingual multi-media campaign was run on social media,

local papers, website and local radio in relation to illegal dumping at Bring Banks.



### ILLEGAL DUMPING AT BRING BANKS - PLEASE RESPECT THIS SERVICE

Bring Banks and Household Textile Banks are a very important resource in helping Galway County do its part for the environment.

Unfortunately, we are seeing an increase in illegal dumping at these locations across the county of late and we appeal to all users of the banks not to abuse these facilities by leaving rubbish or waste at them.

There is particular pressure on the textile bank service at present, and we continue to see misuse of the service with unsuitable bulky items being regularly placed in these banks blocking the chute mechanism or dumped beside them. Often the Council area staff find that banks are not near full capacity but blocked due to the type of waste inserted into them.

Littering is an offence under the Litter Pollution Act and liable to an on-the-spot fine of €150 and/or prosecution. Please bring your bags/boxes home with you and reuse them again. Bring Bank sites across the county will continue to be monitored by Galway County Council mobile patrols in an effort to catch businesses or individuals who are dumping at these sites. Even when banks are full, it is illegal to leave your items beside the bank - go to another site or return when the banks have been emptied.

We will be advertising the burial ground maintenance grants at the end of May, with a closing date of midiAugust 2025. Forms will be sent out to all groups who availed of the grant in 2024. This grant will assist the groups to maintain our burial grounds throughout the County.

## DOG CONTROL

### DOG WARDEN SERVICE

664 dog licences were purchased during the month of April, 444 of which were purchased at the local post office. Licencing compliance is up 2.5% year to date from this stage in 2024.

Galway County Council's dog warden section assisted the Council's Housing's tenancy and estate management team in carrying door to door inspections in Council estates in the Ballinasloe area during the month of April. Licencing campaigns were also carried out by the dog warden service in Maigh Cuilinn and Dunmore areas.

4 fixed penalty notices were issued to dog owners for offences under the Control of Dogs Act 1986 during the month of April.

30 fixed penalty notices have been issued to dog owners under the Control of Dogs Act year to date.

## WATER QUALITY AND ENFORCEMENT

### CATCHMENT MANAGEMENT

Investigative work commenced in the Truskey Stream waterbody in Barna with one day of in-stream assessments to identify any sources of pollution in the different tributaries and a



second day of chemical and bacteriological sampling. A further day of sampling is proposed after a period of dry weather to establish if levels are different compared to wetter conditions.

### AGRICULTURAL INSPECTIONS

Staff from the Environment Department attended 2 public meetings with LAWPRO in na Forbacha and Letterfrack in relation to Areas for Action. This is to cover the Connemara Municipal District. LAWPRO gave a short presentation which was followed by a questions and answers session. Attendees were able to visit stands from Galway County Council, ASSAP (Agricultural Sustainability Support and Advisory Programme), ACRES and LAWPRO. Agriculture is one of the main pressures in many of the Areas for Action, resulting in our Agriculture Inspector in attendance at these meetings.

Our inspector also attended a working group meeting in relation to recording of slurry movements and Galway County Council is to pilot different methods to gather info in relation to this.

A detailed spreadsheet was submitted to the EPA in relation to all farm inspections carried out in Q1 2025.

Preparations were also made in relation to farmer information days that will be run in May in conjunction with Teagasc.

### WASTE/AIR MANAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT

### DECO PAINTS REGULATIONS

A complaint is being investigated of an unauthorized garage in Athenry area. Local residents are concerned about noxious fumes emanating from premises and of the general suitability of building for this type of activity. Documentation was left on-site outlining what steps they need to do in order to comply with the regulations. A follow-up inspection is planned in due course.





### CONSTRUCTION & DEMOLITION WASTE

One unauthorized C&D waste site was cleared prior to a court hearing in April. The case was dismissed.

### WASTE PRESENTATION BYE LAW INSPECTIONS

Environment and Housing staff conducted joint estate management inspections in the Ballinasloe area in April. We were able to check on properties that were previously not compliant with the waste presentation bye-laws.

## LIBRARY SERVICE

Libraries provide an extensive array of services to the community and fulfil the key actions



set out in national policy on the provision of an inclusive library service.

Key elements include extensive lending services to adults and children, PC access, printing, scanning, national book request service, study spaces, newspapers, and magazines.

It provides activity and event spaces for community groups, schools, local NGO's, arts and creative groups and various County Council departments. It works in collaboration with various organisations to deliver workshops and programmes to upskill and better inform communities about issues that are relevant to them.

It also provides a selection of online resources that are available free to registered library members. These online resources allow 24/7 access to a virtual library along with software and educational supports for those with additional needs. ## LOCAL STUDIES

## **DROP-IN VISITORS**

10 visitors dropped in to the local studies section with a variety of queries. These ranged from a request to view a map of Munga in Connemara, a request for a map of the route of the old Galway to Clifden railway, an enquiry about the burial records book for Forthill Cemetery, and the history of Galway fisheries, including reports and photos, and any news items, and an enquiry about the Young Ireland Rebellion of 1848. Some visitors were enquiring about access to the British News Archive, which we have recently subscribed to. Two visitors also called to access the 1995 edition of the Connacht Tribune on microfilm, as the particular information that they required regarding a property sale was not available on the Irish News Archive, but they located the missing piece on the microfilm.

## **PHONE QUERIES**

Several phone calls, which included a request for information on landlords in the Kilkerrin/Clonberne area, the Vesey family, and the sale of their estate, which was not in the Encumbered Estates Court sales of the late 1800s, and the client required some extra information to what she had already accessed on the Landed Estates Database. We suggested a search on the British News Archive to the client, who later made an appointment to view same, and she later said that she was delighted with the information she obtained. The estate was actually sold much later, around 1914, and a lot of details were recorded in the BNA. There was a phone enquiry about the Gort and Kilmacduagh areas, and what resources were available, and some enquiries about the photographic collection and place names.

#### **APPOINTMENTS**

3 appointments for microfilm access, 5 for the Irish News Archive online, 3 for the British News Archive, and study appointments to view a history by William Nolan, and two researchers who required access to Halliday Sutherland's 1956 guidebook to Ireland, which is important in that Mr. Sutherland visited both the Tuam Mother and Baby Home, and the Magdalen Laundry in Galway, and gives excellent first-hand accounts, and an insight into the unfavorable light in which the unfortunate residents of these homes were viewed at the time. Mr. Sutherland was sympathetic to their plight himself. His interview with the Bishop of Galway, Michael Brown, is very revealing of social attitudes of the time. There was an appointment to view the graveyard records book for Killeely Cemetery, Clarinbridge.

#### EMAIL COMMUNICATIONS

Over 30 email queries answered, including an email from the USA looking for information on a relative who emigrated from Headford in 1838, before civil records began. Enquiry from Beverly in Australia, whose husband was descended from a Hubert Connaughton from Tuam who passed away in 1853. Information provided on all the possible resources available. Email enquiries about Knocknagur and Lehid areas, and another family history query from




Mr. Farrell in the USA. Queries about Findmypast, and the photographic collection of Galway Public Libraries, amongst others. Email query on graveyard books available in local studies.




As the annual commemoration of 1916 took place in April, the Local Studies section of Galway Public Libraries would like to highlight one very unique item in our collections. This is a signed copy of "Thomas Campion and the Art of English Poetry", written as a thesis for an MA degree in 1911 by Thomas MacDonagh, one of the signatories of the 1916 proclamation, and published by Hodges Figgis in 1913. MacDonagh was an accomplished academic and poet who was an assistant Headmaster at Patrick Pearses' bilingual Scoil Éanna and later

lectured in English at U.C.D. He was part of the group who

fought at Boland's Biscuit factory, and as a signatory to the proclamation, he was court martialled and executed by firing squad on 3rd May, 1916, at just 38 years of age. His wife Muriel Gifford died the following year in a drowning accident, leaving their two young children orphans. Thomas presented this copy of his thesis to his friend, Professor Seaghan Mac Énrí, who was Lecturer in modern Irish at University College Galway, and a friend of his, through their mutual love of the Irish Language. Thomas has written his signature in Irish on this copy, with the date 1913.



This document dated 1691, and of unknown provenance is one of the rare items held by the



William and Mary by the Grace of God, &cc. To all to whom their Pre-fents fhall come Greeting: Whereas cer-tain Articles bearing date the One and Twentieth day of July laft pair, were made and agreed upon by Our Trully and Well-Beloved, Robert Baron de Gmethe, Junuander in mant=General and

Local studies section of Galway Public Libraries, and it dictates the terms of surrender of the population of Galway to the army of General Ginckle, one of the Generals who fought for the Williamites during the battles of the Boyne, and Aughrim. Galway capitulated to Ginckle's forces; its garrison was permitted to retire to Limerick. Ginckle, a Dutch General, was rewarded for his services by the English King, being made 1st Earl of Athlone, and Baron of Aughrim, and given large estates also, once the conquest of Ireland was complete. This unique document gives insight into this sad chapter in the history of Galway City.

## ACQUISITIONS AND STOCK DEVELOPMENT

The acquisitions team have purchased and processed over 2,500 books this year to date to be sent out to our branches. These include titles in English and Irish for children and adults, adult literacy materials and titles of local interest. Purchase requests are sent in from staff in branches as well as patrons. Recent purchases include new works by Galway-based authors Elaine Feeney, Lucy O'Callaghan, Courtney Smyth, David Green and Claire-Lise Kieff


## ORANMORE LIBRARY

## TUAM LIBRARY

Our weekly craft group continues each Tuesday morning from 11am.

Staff of Tuam Library continue to contribute a weekly article to the 'Library Corner' of the Tuam Herald. The articles are 500 words, on a topic that library members find interesting. For the March 26<sup>th</sup> edition a piece outlining the events held in the library was prepared, along with information on how to join the library.

Rhyme time – every Wednesday morning @11am. 4 sessions were held with children attending. Branch Librarian, Caroline facilitates. There were two young children with hearing impairment at the March 26<sup>th</sup> event so Caroline added sign language to her rhyme time, it was very much appreciated by the parents. Caroline is happy for sign language to be a regular element every week. Great fun every week, no booking required, and all are welcome.

LEGO is available every Saturday in the children's area for free play all day. It is very popular with all ages and is of benefit in the development of gross and fine motor skills, creativity and imagination.

Community Connects – every Friday 11-12pm. This is an open session for members of the public to come in, have a cup of tea and a chat. It is overseen by staff. The numbers attending vary but averages 4-8 each week. This is a lovely opportunity for those who experience limited socializing to come in and meet others.

Trinity Primary School – a weekly class visit is facilitated each Wednesday morning 9.30-10.30am, with classes rotating their visits. It has proved very successful in introducing primary students of all ages from this large school to the library and all we offer. An average of 20 students + teachers/SNAs come each week.

## MONTHLY

Adult Book Club – meets the last Friday of each month, facilitated by Branch Librarian, Margaret. There are 12 members in the book club. The April meeting took place on April 25<sup>th</sup>, with 11 members attending to discuss 'Convenience Store Woman' by Sayaka Murata



Second Adult Book Club – meets the first Thursday of each month, facilitated by Branch Librarian Caroline Greisbach Moran. There are 7 members in the book club. The April meeting took place on May 1<sup>st</sup> to discuss 'The Seven Husbands of Evelyn Hugo' by Taylor Jenkins-Reid

Young Adult Book Club – meets the first Saturday of the month, facilitated by Assistant Librarian, Moira. There are 6 members in the book club. The May meeting will take place on May 10<sup>th</sup>. They are an engaged group of teenagers.

Soundbites – a gathering of local musicians, storytellers, singers and poets gather from 1-2pm on the last Thursday of the month for a lunchtime session. All are welcome, a member of staff remains to oversee. The numbers attending vary but average about 30 each month. This is a very special event in Tuam. For February the event took place on April 24<sup>th</sup> with 24 people attending. We had keyboards, a violin, guitars, singers and poetry reciters.

Breast Feeding group – meet on the second Thursday of the month 10.30-11.30am. All are welcome to join, and the group manage themselves; they just require the space. It is facilitated by a local HSE public health nurse/midwife. The group met on April 10<sup>th</sup>. This is a beneficial time for new mothers to get expert advice from a midwife. The most recent meeting took place on May 8<sup>th</sup>.

## VACANT HOMES

### CROÍ CONAITHE SCHEME

There continues to be a high level of interest in the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant Scheme. Galway County Council has received 564 applications since the start of the scheme with 352 approved to a value in excess of 19 million euros, a further 75 applications are in progress with the balance having been withdrawn or rejected due to ineligibility for the scheme. 31 Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants, with a total value of €1,705,392.55 have been paid to date.

#### **REPAIR AND LEASE**

Owners of vacant properties in need of repair can submit expressions of interest to lease their properties to Galway County Council for social housing. Galway County Council is interested in properties close to villages and towns where schools, amenities and services are readily available. If the property / properties are deemed to be suitable for social housing and in an area where there is demand for social housing, Galway County Council can arrange for a site visit of the property to determine the condition of the property and assess the levels of repairs that may be required to bring the property to the required standard.

The cost of the repairs would be paid for by Galway County Council (upfront loan of up to €80,000 per unit (incl. VAT)) and the property would then be leased to Galway County Council for social housing. There would be an agreed rental payment, and the value of the repairs would be gradually offset against this rental payment over the duration of the lease. Galway County Council has received 21 expressions of interest for the Repair and Leasing scheme throughout 2024 and 2025 to date. 8 properties have been deemed unsuitable due



to the properties not meeting a social housing demand for the area and due to the properties not meeting the minimum requirements as per the design guidelines for social housing. 13 properties are under consideration with further information requested.

# SITE VISIT BY MINISTER OF STATE FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND PLANNING, JOHN CUMMINS, T.D

Minister of State for Local Government and Planning, John Cummins, T.D., met with Galway County Council officials at Áras an Chontae on Thursday, April 17<sup>th</sup> to discuss their strategies for rolling out new social and affordable housing initiatives throughout County Galway.

During his visit, Minister Cummins toured the site of a new affordable housing scheme at Baile Chláir (Claregalway). The initial residents of the three-phase project are set to move into their new homes over the coming weeks. The 17 homes form part of the 61-unit Garraí Na Gaoithe development, marking the first turnkey housing project in County Galway to



incorporate affordable housing under the Government's 'Housing for All' policy.

## 44 NEW AFFORDABLE HOMES ANNOUNCED FOR ATHENRY

Contracts for architect-led integrated design services have been signed with Studio PKA (Paul Keogh Architects) for the design of the two affordable housing schemes in Athenry. They include 28 homes at Raheen and 16 at Páirc na hAbhainn. The next steps involve carrying out site survey and topology reports, design and planning preparation and environmental impact assessment. The planning documents are expected to be submitted under Part 8 or similar planning application at the end of July. These units are expected to be completed in Q4 2026 or Q1 2027.

Galway County Council received funding approval from the Department of Housing for the to the value of €2,278,000 with a target of 67 units. This equates to €34,000 per unit and include VAT. As a result, Galway County Council provides additional funding to implement this programme, and the Housing Unit are implementing this programme at the following locations.

- Crowe Street in Gort
- Cullairbaun Estate in Athenry
- Hymany Park in Ballinasloe
- St Brigids Rd in Portumna
- Woodview Estate in Woodford
- Tullyvoheen Estate in Clifden.

Works to the units may include removal of chimney(s), external insulation, new windows and external doors to achieve maximum Building Energy Rating (BER).

Where funding permits, retro fitting works under this initiative are also carried out on voids as they are turnover for re-tenanting.

# ACTIVITIES IN QUARTER 1, 2025

- Scheduled Visits: Conducted in Ballinasloe MD, including Eiskir Riada, Bothair Eiskir Riada, and An Tobar Mhuire Ahascragh.
- Findings: Identified issues such as non-compliance with household waste management, unlicensed domestic pets, restricted breeds, unlawful occupants, and additions to tenancies.

# PRIVATE HOUSING GRANTS

Notification was received on 12<sup>th</sup> May 2025 of the capital allocation to Galway County Council for the Housing Adaptation Grants for Older People and Disabled People scheme for private homes. An allocation has been received of €3,666,644 (85%) which requires a minimum contribution of matching funding from Galway County Council of €647,055 (15%). The combined capital allocation is €4,313,699 (100%). The Department contribution has increased from 80% to 85%.

Private Housing Grant applications are prioritised based on the medical needs of the applicant.

# HOUSING ACQUISITIONS

Circular: Housing 11/2025 which outlines the arrangements for the acquisition of secondhand social housing by local authorities in 2025 introduced revised eligibility criteria. The Housing Department has reviewed existing applications and is actively liaising with clients and property owners to progress acquisitions under these new criteria. This review is part of our ongoing commitment to ensuring that housing support is delivered in a needs-based manner and that each acquisition aligns with departmental priorities, criteria and in accordance with funding allocation.

Properties throughout the county are being acquired using the "Tenant in Situ" scheme, where valid NTQs have been received. The Council had anticipated acquiring approximately 15 additional properties in 2024, however of those, thirteen tenant-in-situ applications were paused until 2025 capital allocation was confirmed, and of those thirteen, ten applications will potentially progress. 3 no. applications will not now proceed due to the change in 2025 criteria.

# HOUSING SUITABLE FOR PERSONS WITH A DISABILITY OR THE ELDERLY

The guidance for acquiring housing suitable for persons with a disability or the elderly, particularly where urgent or emergency needs arises, recognizes that while the preferred approach is to deliver new housing through build programmes, certain situations may necessitate the targeted acquisition of properties to meet specific client needs. Where such acquisitions are necessary, Local authorities are advised to provide clear justification including:



- The nature of the emergency or urgent situation.
- The suitability of the property for the intended tenant(s), especially regarding necessary disability or age-related adaptations.
- Confirmation that support services (e.g. from the HSE) are in place or will be arranged.

The guidance highlights that when a tenant's situation is urgent, authorities should ensure rapid turnaround and only proceed once all support and property suitability are confirmed.

In cases involving disabled or elderly tenants, the all-in cost (purchase price, legal/valuation fees, and essential refurbishment/adaptation works) must be within the ACG (Acquisition Cost Guidelines).

The Housing Department is reviewing existing applications and is actively liaising with clients and property owners in order to progress such acquisitions.


## PART 8 PLANNING FOR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AT RAHEEN, ATHENRY

Part 8 planning was advertised for a 43-unit housing development at Rahen in Athenry on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of May 2025.

The proposed development will consist of 43 no. dwelling units in six blocks. The proposed southern block is located along the existing Gort Mhaoilir estate roadway, the remaining blocks are located along new roadways. The proposed blocks are two-storey in height and comprises of:

- 6 no. 2-bedroom apartments
- 6 no. 1-bedroom apartments
- 14 no. 2-bedroom dwellings
- 16 no. 3-bedroom dwellings
- 1 no. 5-bedroom dwelling

Construction of new roadways and paths, provision of new car parking spaces, provision of cycle parking, hard and soft landscape works, lighting, signage and all associated infrastructure, site developments work necessary to facilitate the proposed development.



This project will be delivered through the accelerated Design Build delivery process with completion due in Q4 2026.

# PART 8 PLANNING FOR HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AT ST BRIGID'S ROAD PORTUMNA

Part 8 planning was advertised on the 9<sup>th</sup> of May 2025 for the partial demolition and complete refurbishment of 11 two bed units at St Brigid's Road in Portumna.

This project will bring back into use 8 derelict units while modernising 3 additional units to provide A2 rated modern homes.

## ROAD SAFETY EDUCATION EVENT: THE LIFE SAVER PROJECT

Leas-Cathaoirleach of Galway County Council Ollie Turner and Senior Engineer Tom Prendergast attended The Life Saver Project on the 06<sup>th</sup> of May in Leisureland, Galway. This road safety education event was hosted by An Garda Síochána's Road's Policing Unit and Galway City and County Council supported the event - it was attended by 600 Transition Year students. The Life Saver Project is a new initiative aimed at reducing deaths and serious injuries caused by traffic collisions. Delivered by Gardaí, the programme encouraged motorists to adopt safer driving habits, particularly focusing on speed reduction.

The two-hour session included a mock road traffic accident scenario, with participation from all major emergency services, followed by a powerful film illustrating the devastating impact of road traffic collisions on individuals and families. This event is one of the strong road safety partnership initiatives under our Joint Roads Safety Committee, dedicated to improving safety for all road users across Galway city and county.

# GCO/24/0002 ATHENRY CHURCH ST TO TUAM RD (VIA STATION RD) ACTIVE TRAVEL SCHEME AND GCO/23/0021 TUAM ACTIVE TRAVEL SCHEME

Phase 2 Options Assessment Workshops were held for Athenry and Tuam. Approval in principle was given by the National Transport Authority (NTA) to progress the identified emerging preferred option designs and develop the associated documentation for both schemes.

## ROUND 1 SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL (ORANMORE AND ATHENRY SCHOOLS)

The schools included are Calasanctius College, Oranmore, Gaelscoil de hÍde, Oranmore, Scoil Iósaif Naofa, Oranmore, Scoil Chroí Naofa, Athenry & Athenry Boys National School. TOPO surveys were completed in April. A workshop including the NTA, Clandillon Consultants and Galway County Council was held end of April 2025. Preliminary design drawings are currently being finalised to progress to NTA's Phase 3.

## GCO/24/0004 - SRTS R1 ST PAULS OUGHTERARD

Harrington Concrete & Quarries Ltd have begun construction works are 85% completed.

Works include a pedestrian crossing, SRTS signage, bespoke road markings & pencil bollards all dedicated to improving safety within the vicinity of St Pauls Secondary school.





ROUND 2 SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

There are 5 schools included in Round 2 SRTS for County Galway:

- Scoil Sailearna (Indreabhán)
- Scoil Na bhForbacha (Furbogh)
- Ballinderreen NS (Ballinderreen)

Clandillon Civil Consulting was appointed as the Design Consultant on April 11, 2025. A kick-



off meeting was held on April 23, 2025, to initiate the project. Joint site visits by Galway County Council Active Travel and the consultants took place on April 8, 2025. Currently, the procurement documents for TOPO surveys are being finalised.

## ROUND 3 SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

There are 11 schools included in SRTS Round 3. An Taisce have visited all 11 schools to identify the issues pertaining to each location. 10 out of 11 Draft Delivery Plans have been received for information purposes. A workshop to discuss options for Milltown N.S. was held in April. All the TOPO surveys have been completed. The NTA have directly engaged with Active Travel Services Office (ATSO) to complete a design for all Round 3 schools.



# GCO/23/0015 ORANMORE ACTIVE TRAVEL SCHEME – PEDESTRIAN CROSSING, L4103, OLD LIMERICK ROAD (NEAR LIDL)

Construction works are being carried out by John Madden & Sons Limited for the pedestrian crossing near LIDL, Oranmore. Works are nearing completion and are envisaged to be completed in May 2025.

## COMMUNITY WARDEN UPDATE

This month we had a two-day training course run by La Touche Training for all 15 Community Wardens. All 15 Community Wardens attended and found this course very insightful and helpful.



We held the training over the two days in the Loughrea Area Office. The course covered Law, Evidence & Procedures on the first day and the second day we covered Notes, Reports and Courtroom Skills.

## CLIMATE CHANGE

#### COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION

#### OILEÁIN ÁRANN DECARBONISATION ZONE

The three islands of Oileáin Árann were designated as the Decarbonisation Zone (DZ) for Galway County under the Climate Action Plan 2024-2029. The DZ is an area where local authorities and communities work together to find innovative ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and support a just transition to a sustainable economy and community. To

support Climate Action in the DZ, Galway County Council launched the Pilot Oileáin Árann Climate Action Fund on 28<sup>th</sup> April. It will remain open for applications until 28<sup>th</sup> May. The €60,000 fund is open to organisations, businesses and communities of Oileáin Árann that are interested in developing Climate Action projects and initiatives under four key themes: Energy, Travel, Food & Waste, and Local Environmental Action. A link to the

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## COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION FUND

Communities are currently implementing projects which were awarded funding in 2024 under the Community Climate Action Fund. Seven of the thirty-two projects have been completed. Galway County Council is supporting the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest number of projects in the Country.

Oranmore Tidy Towns group received funding for a cargo bike which is a shared resource for the community. It provides a sustainable and practical way for local groups and individuals to move items from place to place; whether delivering supplies for community events, helping local organisations transport equipment, or even assisting neighbours with bulky



loads. There is an online booking system in place.

The Climate Unit continues to work towards reducing energy use and emissions and establishing an ISO 50001 accredited Energy Management System within the organisation.

Project	Update
Building Audits	Codex Energy Consultants Ltd were appointed in April to conduct non-domestic BER assessments on four of our buildings. This will enable us to identify projects that can avail of 50% funding under the SEAI Pathfinder Programme. Site visits will take place in May, and it is expected that the reports will be issued by July.
Energy Management System Audits	Optien Ltd conducted a pre-award Internal Audit on 16 <sup>th</sup> April. The Climate Unit are working on the identified Non-Conformances and Opportunities for Improvement with a view to applying for ISO50001 certification later in 2025.

## LAUNCH OF KILCOLGAN / CLARINBRIDGE ENERGY MASTERPLAN

The Sustainable Energy Communities (SECs) programme supports communities in the transition to a low carbon society. The Climate Action Unit works with SEAI mentors to support the completion of community level Energy Masterplans (EMP) through the provision of Bridging Finance and procurement support and then recoups the funding from SEAI. Kilcolgan / Clarinbridge will launch their EMP on the Wednesday June 4th from 6-9pm in the Clarinbridge GAA Clubhouse. The event will include an EV test drive and presentations on available SEAI grants. It will also include a presentation from Tina Ryan, Climate Action Coordinator, GCC in relation to GCC funding and a Housing Retrofit Case Study.

## GREEN CLUBS INFORMATION NIGHT

A GAA Green Club Programme Information Night will take place on June 17<sup>th</sup> in Ballindeerran GAA Club organised by the Climate Action Unit. There will be presentations from Croke Park GAA Green Clubs Programme representatives, field studies from Green GAA Clubs, as well as presentations from Galway County Council staff including Rosina Joyce, Mark Molloy, and Denise Feeney. Denise will be giving a presentation on the Community Climate Action Fund 2025, which we expect to launch in the coming months. GAA clubs will be able to apply for funding under the following themes: Energy, Biodiversity, Transport, Recycling and Local Climate Action.

#### SAND DUNES GATHERING



Sand dunes play a critical role in coastal protection and Galway County Council has participated in the Protect Our Dunes Campaign since its inauguration in 2021. Participating agencies include Leave No Trace Ireland, CARO and the University of Galway. The third annual Sand Dune Gathering will take place in Galway on the 17<sup>th</sup> May and aims to bring together anyone interested in the future of Ireland's beaches and dunes, focusing on latest actions and initiatives in tackling erosion and other issues on their local dune systems.

#### FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

#### CHIEF FIRE OFFICERS ASSOCIATION ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2025 - GALWAY

Galway Fire and Rescue Service hosted the Chief Fire Officers 'Association (CFOA) Annual Conference and Trade Show Exhibition in the Salthill Hotel on the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> May. The theme of the conference was "*Delivering a Modern Fire Service – The Future is Here and Now*." Fire Officers, industry experts, and government and local government officials from Ireland and overseas gathered for the annual showcase event for Ireland's fire and emergency services sector.

The CFOA represents the leadership and senior management of all Irish fire services, with a mission to enhance safety and protect lives and property across the country. The aim of the conference and exhibition was to provide a platform for those in the fire and rescue sector to discuss pressing issues, explore cutting-edge fire service equipment and appliances, and discover the latest technologies in fire operations and prevention. The conference addressed key challenges confronting the Fire Services and highlighted the latest advancements in fire service operations and prevention technologies.

The event hosted expert speakers from Ireland and abroad in the emergency services and fire industry, sharing their expertise and insights to offer innovative solutions for adapting the Fire and Rescue Service to current challenges.

The conference was opened by Dennis Keely, CFOA Chairperson and Chief Fire Officer for Dublin Fire Brigade, with a video address to delegates provided by James Browne TD, Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

Mark Hardingham, former Chair of the UK National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC), spoke about the Final Report of the Grenfell Tower Inquiry, following the death of 72 people in the worst UK residential fire since World War II. Meanwhile, the inquiry learnings and fire safety changes were the subject of a talk by ARUP fire safety specialist and expert witness for the Grenfell Tower Inquiry, Dr Barbara Lane.

The risks and challenges associated with Lithium-Ion batteries, used primarily in electronic devices, electric vehicles, and small appliances, were studied by Conor Leonard, Head of Batteries and Projects, WEEE Ireland.

Phil Garrigan, Chair of the UK National Fire Chiefs' Council (NFCC), shared UK perspectives, while Peter Lonergan from the European Emergency Number Association explore how improved communications can enhance emergency response.

Additional speakers included Ray Goggins, Author, Keynote Speaker, and Director at Core Skill Training, discussing effectiveness; Liam Carroll, SEO Climate Change and former Acting Chief Fire Officer at Carlow Fire and Rescue Service, addressed the Irish Fire Service's role in climate change resilience; Keith Leonard, Director of the National Directorate for Fire and Emergency Management, presenting a national perspective on fire services; and Ritika Wadhwa, Founder and CEO of Prabhaav Global, exploring cultural intelligence as a key skill for managing rapid change.

Conference delegates were welcomed by Cllr. Peter Keane, Mayor of Galway City, and Cllr. Martina Kinane, Cathaoirleach of Galway County Council, followed by addresses from Uinsinn Finn, Director of Services of Galway County Council, and Leonard Cleary, Chief Executive of Galway City Council.

Over 300 delegates and 150 exhibitors attended over the course of the two days, which features a trade exhibition taking place in parallel to the conference programme, showcasing fire service fleet and equipment from all the main suppliers to the Irish Fire Services.

The conference was a resounding success with many of the attendees complimenting Galway Fire and Rescue Service on a very well run and organised event with a lineup of very interesting speakers.





#### **OPERATIONS**

The information below is based on April data from West Regional Control Centre (WRCC). Galway Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) had 224 turnouts to 179 Incidents. This is an increase of 11 incidents on 168 the previous month. 81 were fire incidents, 90 were special service incidents (road traffic collision (RTC), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), flooding, storm damage, etc.) and 8 were standby either in station or at a central location. Of those incidents, 29.27% were attended by Fire Service resources within 10 minutes of alert, 41.46% were attended between 10 and 20 minutes and 29.27% were attended in over 20 minutes. The average turnout time for the Full-time station in Galway City was 2.13 minutes and for county retained stations was 5.75 minutes.

An analysis of the statistics for April by comparison to previous March shows that normally the ratio of fire incidents to Special Service incidents is normally approximately 1 to 1.5. In April however the ratio was more or less equal with a similar level of fires and Special Service Incidents. This is accounted for by the time of year (gorse/bog fire season) and the considerably dry weather in a large portion of the month of April. As many of the fires were gorse/bog fires they were in remote locations, hence the increase in the percentage of incidents attended in over 20 minutes by comparison to previous months.

## CIVIL DEFENCE

#### CIRCLE K MEM (MAJOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT) TABLETOP EXERCISE

The Civil Defence Officer (CDO), Assistant Civil Defence Officer (ACDO), and two officers attended the Circle K MEM tabletop exercise at the Harbour Hotel in Galway. Members assisted with Information Management during the exercise.

#### OPEN DAY AT LOUGHREA GARDA STATION

Civil Defence was invited to attend an Open Day at Loughrea Garda Station. Members displayed several assets, including:

- Boat and Rescue Sled
- Control Unit
- Drone
- Sonar Scan Unit

The public showed significant interest in the services provided by our organisation.







Ms. Karagh Kelly will commence employment as Business Development and Operations Manager for the facility on May 21<sup>st</sup>, 2025.

Tenders for the operation of the on-site café closed on May 6<sup>th</sup>, 2025. Tenders received are currently being considered. The evaluation will be complete by the end of May.


BIRDS EYE VIEW OF THE LONG POINT REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT INCLUDING THE VIEWING PLATFORM

## RRDF PROJECT – PUBLIC REALM ENHANCEMENT SCHEME


Following a detailed application by the Regeneration Team, Athenry was granted €6,075,518.40 Rural Regeneration Development Funding for the Athenry Public Realm Enhancement Scheme Phase1 and the redevelopment of Somers House Burke's Lane to provide a Community and Enterprise Hub.

The detailed design of the scheme (drainage, m&e, alignment, pavement) continues, led by Tobin Engineers. A pre-qualification tender will issue week beginning 9<sup>th</sup> May in order to shortlist suitable contractors to tender to deliver the scheme.



Current programming forecasts construction to commence late-2025. As part of the contract a community liaison officer will be appointed to manage engagement with local stakeholders both prior to and during works.

The contracts have been signed, and a booking deposit has been paid to purchase a site at the bottom of Bridge Street from the OPW to provide off street parking. Initial estimates are that approximately 30no. off street spaces could be provided at the location.



## RRDF PROJECT – SOMERS SHOUSE

O'C & C Architects have been appointed to deliver the process through detailed design, tender and construction phases. It is the intention to investigate the provision of a meeting room facility to cater for meeting of the Municipal District as part of the project. The detailed design process has commenced.

## **OPW WORKS – ATHENRY CASTLE**

Galway County Council have been informed that the Office of Public Works have appointed a contractor to carry out improvement works to the entrance threshold to Athenry Castle. Works are progressing on site and are expected to be completed in advance of the high tourism season.

#### TUAM STATION BUILDING: REPURPOSING, RENOVATION AND EXTENSION

The Part 8 planning application was submitted on the 28<sup>th</sup> of March and is available to view on Galway County Councils consultation portal.

A Meeting of Tuam Municipal District will convene on May 29<sup>th</sup> to consider the Chief Executives Report on the planning file. The

deadline for submitting a funding application to deliver the capital project is May 30<sup>th</sup>. This application will be made to the Northern and Western Regional Assembly. Updated 3d renderings have been produced to support our funding application as below.















#### TUAM STATION QUARTER MASTERPLAN (THRIVE FUNDING)

Galway County Council is working in partnership with larnród Éireann and to deliver a transformational masterplan for the Tuam Station Quarter. Reddy Architecture and Urbanism have been formally appointed to develop the masterplan. The first public consultation has taken place. The findings are being collated by the consultants to inform the draft masterplan. Engagement with larnród Éireann has progressed in the past number of weeks, further exchange of information is scheduled to take place.

#### CLIFDEN

A Part 10 planning application has been submitted to An Bord Pleanála for the Public Realm project for Clifden Town Centre, Harbour Park and Beach Road Quay. ## HERITAGE OFFICE

#### PRESERVING THE PAST: ABBEYGORMICAN PROJECT EARNS NATIONAL ACCLAIM

A landmark restoration project dedicated to preserving centuries of archaeological and



architectural heritage at Abbeygormican in East Galway has earned national acclaim at the prestigious Irish Construction Excellence (ICE) Awards.

The Abbeygormican Church Conservation Project received the Judges' Silver Award, honouring the

meticulous restoration of the historic Augustinian friary and its unique blend of 12th, 15th, and 17th-century architecture, all set within an ancient ecclesiastical enclosure.

Conservation works were carried out in three phases in collaboration with Galway



County Community Archaeology Project, Galway County Heritage Office, Galway County Council, the local community, and the National Monuments Service, and guided by a Conservation and Management Plan prepared by a multidisciplinary team.

The award was jointly accepted by contractor Mathieu & Mitchell Ltd., the Abbeygormican Cemetery Group, and Galway County Council at a ceremony held in the Convention Centre, Dublin.

The conservation of this historic site not only safeguards an important part of East Galway's architectural and cultural legacy but also reconnects us with the rich story of our community. I commend everyone involved for their collaboration and commitment to protecting our shared history for future generations."

Liam Hanrahan, Acting Chief Executive of Galway Council, commented, "Located within a graveyard, the Augustinian friary is a sensitive monument that required urgent repairs to ensure safe access for burials and prevent further deterioration of the medieval church exposed to the elements. The successful completion of the restoration project would not have been possible without the funding support granted by The National Monuments Service, the diverse skillset of the multidisciplinary team and the dedication of the local community.

**Michael McDonagh, Chief Archaeologist with the National Monuments Service**, which funded the work through the Community Monuments Fund, stated, "Abbeygormican is a lesson in perseverance, commitment and pride. Crumbling masonry did not deter the contractor's perseverance in preserving the piscina, conserving the ivy-clad transept chapel, supporting the Hannon Tomb, and stabilising the transept and chancel walls."

Outlining the background to the project, **Marie Mannion**, **Heritage Officer with Galway County Council**, explained, "The Abbeygormican Church Conservation Project exemplifies what can be achieved when communities, heritage professionals, and public bodies work together with a shared vision".

**Bernie Doherty, Galway Community Archaeologist,** said "Through careful research, conservation best practice, and community collaboration, we have safeguarded an irreplaceable part of Galway's heritage story. It is deeply rewarding to see this dedication recognised on a national stage."

Initiated by the Abbeygormican Cemetery Group and Galway County Council, the Abbeygormican Church Conservation Project team comprised Mathieu & Mitchell Limited (Contractor), 7L Architects (Architects), John Britton Consulting (Engineer), Moore Group & Martin Fitzpatrick, Thrutime (Consultant Archaeologists), and MKO Ltd. (Ecologists).

The Heritage Officer met with members of the Irish Planning Institute as part of their fieldtrip of East Galway on 11<sup>th</sup> April and gave them an overview of the medieval town of Athenry and its walls and the conservation works that are being undertaken of Athenry Town Walls by Galway County Council Heritage Office and funded by Galway County Council and the Heritage Council.



# PRESENTATION AT STONE CONFERENCE, JEJU ISLAND, REPUBLIC OF SOUTH

Marie Mannion, Heritage Officer was invited by Jeju Special Self-Governing Province Stone Culture Park (The Jeju Provincial Government) to Jeju Island, Korea, to present a paper entitled "The UNESCO Inscription of Ireland's Drystone Walling: A



Celebration of Heritage and Craftsmanship" on April 26<sup>th</sup>.

Jeju Island are keen to apply for UNESCO recognition of their own drystone construction



practices. By sharing Ireland's and Galway County Council's (Féile na gCloch, Inis Oírr) experiences and insights, the aim is to foster a reciprocal exchange of knowledge and interest between the two islands.

Jeju representatives attended Féile na gCloch in 2022. The paper that was presented provided an overview of the historical context and techniques of dry-stone construction in Ireland, showcasing how this ancient practice has been preserved and celebrated through various initiatives including Féile na gCloch held annually in Inis Oírr, since 2006. It mentioned other stone festivals and training related to stone craft in Ireland and the DryStone Walling Association of Ireland. It also the journey Ireland took with regards to UNESCO's recognition of Ireland's Dry-Stone Construction.

Féile na gCloch (Festival of Stone)

Féile na gCloch (Festival of Stone) is a festival that takes place each year in Inis Oírr, County Galway, Ireland, in celebration of the timeless beauty of the dry-stone walls and stonework that can be found on the island, in various parts of Ireland and throughout the world.

Féile na gCloch (돌의 축제)

Féile na gCloch 는 매년 아일랜드 골웨이 카운티 이니스 이어 섬에서 열리는 축제로, 섬뿐만 아니라 아일랜드와 세계 여러 지역에서 볼 수 있는 건식 돌담과 석조 작업의 아름다움을 보여주기 위해 개최됩니다.

The theme for the 2023 festival was 'Hands across Europe/ Lámha trasna na hEorpa'. An exhibition and booklet celebrated the craftsmanship, heritage, and beauty of dry-stone wall building found in Andorra, Austria, Belgium, Croatia, Cyprus, France, Greece, Ireland, Italy Luxembourg, Slovenia, Switzerland and Spain.

#### RESPONSIBLE LIGHTING FOR LOCAL AUTHORITIES VIDEO

A recently released video captures key highlights from last month's artificial lighting workshops, coordinated by the Biodiversity Officers across Connacht. The video not only showcases the environmental and health impacts of light pollution — which disrupts wildlife behaviour and human circadian rhythms — but also effectively highlights the proactive role of local authorities and their Biodiversity Offices in addressing this issue.

The workshops underscored the financial and energy costs associated with excessive artificial lighting, particularly from LEDs in urban and roadside settings. Over two days, expert speakers shared practical strategies for reducing light pollution through thoughtful lighting design, robust policy frameworks, and collaborative community action. The central message was clear: responsible lighting — the right light, in the right place, at the right time — is both achievable and essential.

The initiative was supported by local authorities in Sligo, Galway County, Galway City, Mayo, Roscommon, and Leitrim, with valuable contributions from speakers including Kerem Asfuroglu, Miriam Crowley, Georgia McMillan, Peter McLoughlin, and Tina Aughney. The video serves as a strong testament to the leadership and commitment of the Connacht local authorities in promoting biodiversity and sustainable practices.




Following the positive response to this workshop series, similar events are now being

## BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

During April 2025, Ballinasloe MD technical teams have been assessing tenders received for works to be completed as part of the annual roadworks programme. It is expected the works will begin in May under the restoration improvement (29 projects) and restoration maintenance (39 projects) grant categories funded through the Department of Transport. Advance preparation of roads is ongoing by Ballinasloe area crews. It is possible that with improved value for money achieved through the tender process, that some additional projects made be considered in 2025.

Throughout Ballinasloe Town, grass cutting has begun by both direct labour crews and contractors, with changes and improvements made from the 2024 season, in particular around areas for biodiversity.

Sightline improvement works, supported by Elected Representatives NOM allocations, have begun in Creggs at the Ballygar junction on the Roscommon Road. It is expected that these works will be completed during May 2025

A tender competition was submitted on eTenders for the provision of consultancy services for the ORIS grant funded Ballinasloe Outdoor Recreation Park Feasibility Study project. An assessment of the tenders received along with the appointment of consultants will progress shortly.



Ballinasloe MD staff have contributed the 2025 Tidy Town application for Ballinasloe. It is hoped that the improved engagement and provision of details of both the works planned, and the works being undertaken will help to improve scoring under the National Competition.

Phase 3 of the Beechlawn Active Travel footpath project is well underway and nearing completion. This project is funded by the NTA, and was designed, procured and delivered onsite by Ballinasloe MD, including all landowner engagement.

# UPDATE ON ACTIVITIES FOR CONAMARA - MAY 2025

- The Restoration Improvement Works and Restoration Maintenance Works has been awarded and works have commenced. A total of 76 sections of roads throughout Conamara MD will be resurfaced.
- An application for funding regarding for Inishbofin, Inis Mor, Inis Meain and Inis Oir has been submitted to the Department of Rural Community Development. Substantial funding was granted in 2024 and a decision on 2025 funding is expected shortly.
- An allocation of €30,000 has been granted by the Department of Transport to progress a Strategic Infrastructure Scheme at Cuan na Loinge to address flooding of the main road into this area.
- Safety Improvement Works allocation of €80,000 has been granted for 3 locations: R345 Máimín, R336 Na Forbacha, R336 An Tulach.
- Climate Change Projects €240,000 (4 projects) has been allocated.
- Main activities at moment for outdoor staff include road maintenance, town and village maintenance, preparation works for roads programme & drainage works.
- Community Wardens 3 positions dealing with illegal dumping, parking enforcement, ringbuoy inspections.
- Town and Village Maintenance substantially done by direct staff.
- Piers & Harbours- Direct labour projects ongoing under marine infrastructure scheme.
- Operation & Maintenance of Public Beaches- Summer ready- preparing for summer 2025.



The Tuam MD Roads Programme was brought to the April MD meeting and was adopted by the Elected Members. €7.8m was allocated towards the road infrastructure in this year's programme.
