CAPT. F. HYNES

Captain Frank Hynes, Cross Street, Athery, whose death has occurred at the age of 85, took a distinguished part in the fight for freedom. Having joined the Volunteers as a young man he helped Liam Mellowes to organise and train the Galway Volunteers for the 1916 Rising. After the disbandment of the men at Moyode Castle he refused to leave Mellowes; joined by the late Alf Monaghan the three of them went "on the run" for six months. Mellowes wanted Captain Hynes to go to the U.S.A. in his stead but he refused and helped to disguise Liam for the trip.

Afterwards Captain Hynes was Lieutenant-Commandant of the first Cork Brigade, taking an active part in the war against the Black and Tans. He became a close friend of Terence McSweeney and Thomas MacCurtain, the two murdered Lord Mayors of Cork. He was interned in Belfast Jail and later was transferred to Wormwood Scrubs where he was on hunger strike for 14 days.

Captain Hynes was a cultured and literary man in the finest Irish tradition. Prior to 1916 he devoted much of his time to promoting Gaelic League classes where he taught Irish dancing and the Irish language. In the early 30's he founded a Boys' Club in Athery. He wrote poems in Irish and English and he wrote many plays which his Club staged. Many of the boys of the Club subsequently became priests; others became prominent in other walks of life. All remember him with affection and gratitude for his deep religious influence on their lives and his Irish ideals on their minds.

The funeral was attended by a large crowd, with a firing squad from "Dun Uí Mhaoliosa". The attendance included Rt. Rev. Monsignor T. Fahy, Canon Heaney, Fr. Langan, Fr. Gleason, Fr. Mulvany, O'Shea, Feighery, all O.M.I.'s, Bro. Conroy, O.M.I.
Requiem Mass was concelebrated by his sons, Fr. Francis and Fr. Terry, O.M.I.
