meals but am never inclined to eat.
I could go all day without a meal.
(maybe a good candidate for a hunger
strike) but I don't plan it right now.
I was so nice to hear about all those old
friends you mentioned. I also got a kick
out of. Recent progress & anything.

I never knew where it was composed before

Sgoes in Easpuig map pucde yádor
Tom A Lee ap Sceisi bithed & sang
I think it was more a recitation than
a song, Mick Coyne I know used to
recite it. Was not Mick a great old
~~giant~~ do you know if it was true
that from a Finn part o Derry many took
the I. R. B. oath from Seán MacDermot
when he visited the old Gaelic League
I think Malachy Hanly told me that.

I remember a man from Dublin
visiting the Gaelic League & after the
rebellion Padraig asked me if I knew
the Dublin man that visited it was
thin that I was told it was Seán Ó hUighe
You remember that our old Sinn Féin
club was called after him I remember

wearing a Sean Mac badge in my lapel
Many things have happened since themdays
& Ireland is still struggling to have Sean
ideals come true Damn your Concessions
give us our Country. I was sorry to
hear about poor Mleg's death I had heard
it before I received your letter as you said
he was a good hardy young man & one
who worked hard & smoked about three
of Tobacco daily. Half my world passed
away when Matthe ^{phone} Griffini died. I talked
to him 2 days before he told me he had
a tough fight but he thought he had it beat
I had a couple of tough weeks the same
time I was not out for St Patricks Day
activities. Mat used to come ^{to} visit us
very often he used to take Kennedy &
the two wifes & of course we would have
a bottle & I am slore you could guess
what our main subject would be.

my wife thought Matty was a little god &
was heartbroken for his death. I think Matty
was the best liked Irishman in Cork. He went
to all affairs wakes funerals weddings game
parties. He had a car & made use of it
to visit all those places that he enjoyed.
Poor Kennedy is not well he have been
in the hospital the 2nd time since Matty
died & Billy is getting pretty feeble too.
I passed (as I am sure you know) my
4 score on Mar 20th 72 & Kennedy is 14
months older 81 in Jan 72. We had a
Football team Galway Boston played here
last Sunday week they had 2 players from
Moycullen. I was there but only had a
few words with one of the players
before the game he was from Corofin
For 1 year we played (probably which was
(Corofin) in Blaregalway I think in 1917.
