It appearing that the arrangement in the Sick Wards made by the Master relating to the placing of The Sick Protestant Inmates was not made in accordance with the minute of The Board as entered on their proceedings of the 1st of February.

A Special Meeting to be summoned for the 3rd of May to take into consideration The Report of The Visiting Committee on that subject.

The following Report from the Visiting Committee was read in reference to the Copy of a Report laid before the Board on the 19th inst. and was referred to the Committee.

April 26. 1843

Your Committee to whom you were pleased to refer Mr Wilkinson's letter to the Commissioners of the 1st inst. thereon Report

That in their opinion the sewers of the premises are not well planned, in as much as some of them are led directly through the Privies, which had been so, would have much contributed to cleanliness: and which your Committee would recommend to have done whenever the Finance of the Board may permit.

That, from the Master they learn that he found all the grates over these sewers sold out down, so that it appears not to have been in the contemplation of those who executed the Work. that these sewers should have ever been cleaned, this fastening the Master was obliged to remove and we have no reason to think that there is obstruction in any of the sewers, save that from the Laundry which is short, and which your Committee have given directions to have opened.

That the cess Pools to the Privies have been well designed, but so executed as to be of no use whatever. The design was that the soil from the Privies should fall from the Privy Pits into the cess Pools, and, that the cess Pools being water tight, the water therein would rise over the soil, and prevent smell, and when

it rose near the top, go off by the overflow into the sewer, giving warning to examine the cess Pools to see if it wanted cleansing. But in none of the Privies is the construction such as to deliver the soil into the cess Pools, and so the water object is defeated. Had the sewers passed through the Privy Pits this might not have been the case.

In respect to the roof, Sprouting &c. this is already provided for by Contract, and nothing more need be done.

But with respect to the Pumps, and all the Works so far as can be done your Committee would recommend to advertise for Contracts to keep all in repair.

April 1843 N^o 8.093.0. accompanying a copy of a
communication received by The Com^{rs} from The
Under Secretary relating to the opposition to the
collection of The Poor Rate existing in certain parts
of the Union.

From William Lewis Es^r C^o Inspector stating
that Mr. Loghan the Rate Collector was acting most
injudiciously and using his best endeavours to prevent
the arrears of Rate from being collected and complaining
generally of Mr. Loghans conduct as being impertinent to
The Rev^d Mr. Stone P. P. and requesting The Board
to direct Mr. Loghan to co-operate with The Police
authorities.

Mr. Lewis to be informed that Mr. Loghan
is the person accountable to The Board for the
collection of The Poor Rate, and that The Board
cannot interfere with any arrangements he may

have made, or may make for the collection of Rate
and express on Mr. Lewis the importance of
giving to Mr. Loghan such assistance of The Com^{rs}
as may enable him to collect with the arrears of Rate.
The Rate last declared without diverting him to have
recourse to a mode of collection not recognised by
the Law.

A letter from The Rev^d Mr. Crawford having
been read soliciting a Copy of the depositions taken
at the investigation upon The Report of The Roman
Catholic Chaplain to enable him to make an
explanation to The Poor Law Com^{rs} for which he

has been called on by them, the following order
is thereon.

A copy of the depositions and proceedings
to be given to The Rev. Mr. Crawford, and whatever
other information he may require.

The Rev. Mr. Crawford having laid before
The Board a letter addressed to him by The Poor
Law Com^{rs}. dated the 20th of April 1843, calling
upon him to furnish them with any explana-
tion which he may wish to offer on the
subject relating to the alleged infringement of
The Workhouse Rules as voted in the proceedings
of the Board on the 12th inst.

Proposed by Rear Admiral French
Seconded by Walter McDonagh Esq^r
and carried unanimously.

Resolved, that, The Board have read
with deep regret, the letter above stated from
The Commissioners to The Protestant Chaplain
calling upon him to furnish The Commissioners
with any explanation which he may wish to
offer them on the subject of The Board's
minute in regard to him of the 12th inst.

The supposition, that further explanation
than was made to The Board by The
Protestant Chaplain at that time was necessary,
implies an opinion on the part of The Com^{rs}
that the Board had not fully investigated
into the complaint, and this is confirmed
by The Commissioners directing themselves at once
to their officer, instead of making their
enquiry through The Board, which, unless

under suspicion that The Board had failed
in their duty, would have been the regular
mode of acting.

The Board do not see what there is in
their proceedings to warrant in the slightest
a departure from the courtesies of usage.

The Roman Catholic Chaplain's complaint
above alluded to bears date the 5th inst. on which
day the Board met, and had it before them.
Twelve of the Guardians were present, of whom
eight were Protestants, and four were Roman
Catholics; in the ordinary course of business
it was their duty to dispose of this, as of all
other matters; but, being that it involved a
question of much delicacy, they unanimously
agreed that the Board be summoned
for the 12th inst. to take into consideration
the Report of The Roman Catholic Chaplain
and of this fact The Commissioners were fully cognizant.

That on the 12th inst. The Board again
met pursuant to that notice when there were
thirty one Guardians present, of whom sixteen were
Roman Catholics, and fifteen Protestants, and
at which meeting after the very fullest investi-
gation, the minute, the subject of The Com^{rs}
interference was moved by Lord French and
unanimously agreed to, all of which matter was
also fully before The Commissioners.

The Board cannot separate without ex-
pressing their opinion that this interference is
calculated to stir up, or keep alive religious
discussion, which it has been the constant
object of the Members of this Board

individually, and collectively to prevent, afford
and reconcile ⁱⁿ which object, They were
in no instance more happily successful than
on the occasion of the very delicate investigation
They felt it their duty to institute.

And The Board consider that in middle
interference of this kind, upon the part of
The Commissioners will be found one of the many
causes through which they have brought
The Poor Law System in Ireland, and the
Law which gave them the power to make
it into so much dispute.

With reference to the communication
read at last meeting of The Board from
The Guardians of The Callan Union.

It was Resolved, that this Board do
not deem it expedient to take any steps in
the matter

The Board then adjourned to Wednesday
the 3rd of May next.

The following Report from The Committee appointed to enquire into the cause of mortality among the infants being read orders were accordingly made on it.

The Committee to whom you were pleased to refer Dr. Harrison's Report of the 23rd 1784 report

That the former suggestions of Doctor Harrison in respect to the Children in the House have been all duly and immediately attended to,

That the Nursery designed by the Plan was the most inefficient room in the whole house for the purpose, and the Board have given orders to have another larger and more airy room prepared: the delay in getting it ready has been occasioned by the non-arrival of a window required for it, which the Contractor expects from Dublin this day.

We recommend that Ellen Coffey one of the Paupers be put to superintend the Nursery, day and night, and to do nothing else.

That the Nurses and Children be obliged ^{by the Statute} to be out in the yard as much as possible every five day, and, that the Nursery be supplied with two oil lamps for warming the food of the infant Children at night, and that six of these lamps with their appendages be now supplied.

That the Room designed by a Committee who first had this subject under consideration has since been changed to one much less appropriate, and which the Doctor is apprehensive will not be found to answer, being too small and less ventilated, Your Committee

therefore recommend to the Board the first intention.

This Your Committee are of opinion should do all that it is in the power of the Guardians to do on this subject; But Your Committee feel convinced The Poor house management is not suited for rearing infant Children whose Mothers are not with them: the paupers to whom the care of such infants is committed, can have no interest in their welfare and no vigilance by Superintendants can sufficiently protect them, that so with children sent to nurses in the County, good care of the children is ensured by the interest of the nurse; and We strongly recommend that application be made to Lord Edliot to have provision made in this in The Poor Law Amendment Bill according

We are of opinion that the Children sent to nurse should be kept there till they shall be at least five Years old.
