Copy of Admiral Trounch's letter as read at a meeting of
The Board of Guardians held on the 25th Jan^y
Ballinacree 20th Jan^y 1843

Sir

I am honored by the receipt of your letter of yesterday's date, and will beg of you to state to the Guardians of this Union, that as my proffered resignation of a seat at their Board arose out of matter purely personal to myself a request from such men so kindly expressed must, to me, be as a command that I ought not, and could not disobey, and, that therefore in obedience thereto, I beg, with their permission to withdraw it.

For the kindness of the purport and manner of their resolution, I shall take an opportunity to return my thanks to them in person, when I hope to be able to shew with more satisfaction to myself the high degree I entertain of it.

As to the bearing of the clause in the Act that I had hoped to induce them to assist to have rescinded, by bringing it under the consideration of Parliament, I have seen no cause to alter my opinion, I still think that the Legislature would be well pleased to be made aware of matter so disgracing their Statute book, and which nothing but over-confidence in designing men, could ever have allowed a place there. One argument indeed against acceding to my proposition used while the matter was under discussion seemed to me deserving of much attention.

It was this: that the whole Act is framed in such an overbearing bad spirit, and its many other parts so very objectionable,

that a partial review of it would be quite insufficient, and this more extensive review, I have hopes, it must soon undergo.

There are few men to whom such tyrannic power could with safety, none to whom it should, be given, and the misuse made of it by those to whom it has been entrusted shows that they at least are not among those few.

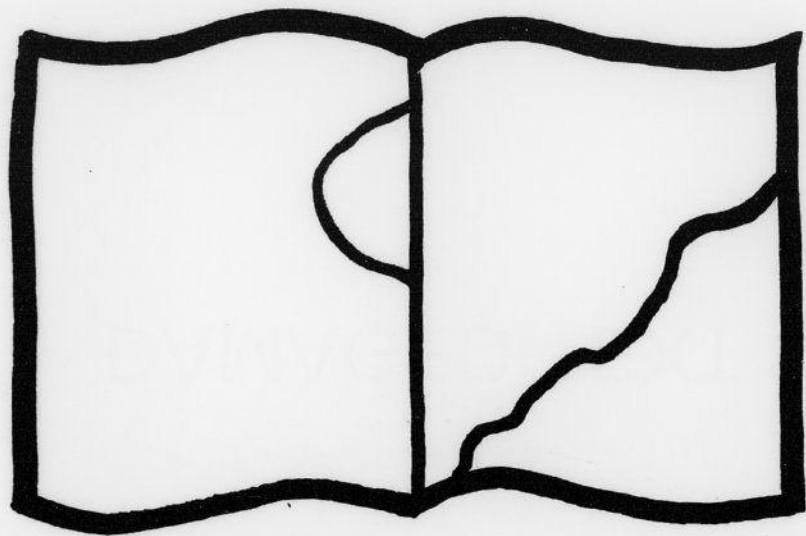
