Board are of opinion that Mr. Nolue ought not to be retained, and request the Commissioners answer for the guidance of the Board.

Letter from The Poor Law Commissioners dated 24<sup>th</sup> Nov. 1843 stating, that according to the Clerk's letter of the 22<sup>nd</sup> inst. and the Commissioners' letter of reply thereto, the Commissioners had since been in communication with Her Majesty's Government in Ireland on the subject of that correspondence, and that they are informed in such inquiry or necessity for the proposed arrangement existed in this case, as would justify the Commissioners in acceding to the reception and accommodation of Her Majesty's Troops in the Workhouse, and that the Commissioners were informed with certainty that any damage which may accrue to the Premises from the introduction and accommodation of the Troops in a portion of the Workhouse cannot be made good by the Authorities directing the movement of the Troops, and that for these reasons the Commissioners must withdraw the limited sanction which they gave in their letter of yesterday.
