



The Board are further of opinion that the allegation, that the Children are not kept in the Schoolroom, but allowed to go where they please, that the Master had often remarked this, but that his directions were not attended to, is a complaint against the Schoolmistress, and that she admits its truth, but endeavours to throw the blame upon the Assistant Schoolmistress, in which the Board are of opinion she has not succeeded, in as much as that she brought no complaint of misconduct upon the part of the Assis^t School Mistress before the Board, and in as much as that before she had the assistance she now has in the School, she had full time enough to see that such neglect did not exist.

The Board are by no means satisfied with the conduct of either the Master, Matron Schoolmistress, or Assistant Schoolmistress in this case, and feel quite sure that a due ^{and} discharge of duty by each would rectify all the evils complained of: and that such discharge of duty would result in a return to the system of work in the Girls School, so very necessary to the good of the children therein; and The Board admonish these officers of the House to this due discharge of duty, under pain of their severe displeasure.
