The Porter having been called before the Board was examined by the Chairman and told if he did not conform to his duties on being again reported should be dismissed.

Letter from The Poor Law Commissioners dated 8<sup>th</sup> February 1848 No 5339. Resolved that on this day investigating the Books of the Relieving officers we find that the ~~present~~ numbers seeking out Poor Relief render it quite impossible for the present number of such offices to make that personal inspection requisite & prevent great imprecision and we therefore deem it necessary to apply to the Poor Law Commissioners for permission to appoint such additional Relieving officers as may be adequate to really investigate the condition of the applicants and for such time as the Poor Law Commissioners may see fit.
