There is however <sup>extreme want of</sup> Employment and almost a total want of Classification 165 Females of various ages and some Children are there together. Rather with a view to accommodation than to Classification or Employment and about 110 Men of various ages occupy a part of the House having access to the same yards and Privies as the Females. It would be most desirable if the number of the Aged and infirm admitted of it that none under Sixty years of age should be sent whether for these same light Work such as Spinning or Carding might be provided and even if Males and Females were both there together the classification should be carried by restricting the use of the House to the aged. The able bodied and young of both sexes ought to be kept at the various Halls where Classification can be easily impressed. Constant better exercise and industrial occupation carried on under the superintendence of a larger and more efficient Staff of Officers. By Authority.—A. Thom, 87, Abbey-street, Dublin.

The Medical Officer's Report was read to the following effect: it suggested that two Windows should be broken out in the Refactory Ward, where there are a number of Children placed who are suffering from Mystery and various Contagious diseases.

It was ordered that the present Windows be enlarged by removing the wooden frames, and having Metal Sashes or Panels substituted, in order to afford the Ventilation necessary.

The Master having signified for himself and his wife, their resignation of the situations they respectively held in this Establishment, in consequence of his having been appointed to a higher office in the Union of New Ross.

The Board Resolved that Request be made to the Poor Law Commissioners, to recommend suitable persons to fill the vacant Offices of Master and Matron

Looking upon the Workhouse as calculated under Proper Management to afford to Destitute Poor the best resource of their temporary relief, and the most amicable test for discriminating between real destitution, and an idle resort to Clemency and aids. The Board attach the greatest importance to the Selection that may now be made of Officers upon whom future good Management of this Establishment must mainly depend.

The Workhouse was originally designed to contain 1000 inmates, but never until the close of last year did the Number exceed 750, and they were most commonly <sup>under</sup> 400. the Charge of Committee Small assembles consisting of the most part of infirm persons, and orphan Children, either infants not attending at School, and barely enough of able bodied to perform the Work of the House. There was no one of Moral labour and responsibility the buildings have since been much enlarged, and

when completed will with the hired houses be capable of containing over 1900 persons, they at present amount above 1400, the inmates now consist for the most part of the children and able bodied adults, for whom as yet no sufficient means of profitable occupation have been provided, the classification and general constraint combined with the physical treatment of such large numbers, strangers in general to any civilized habits and ignorant of every occupation or pursuit cannot be satisfactorily performed by any inexperienced person.

The Board feel desirous that with the appointment of a new Master and Matron no pains shall be spared to obtain the services of officers properly qualified by abilities and previous training to introduce and efficiently direct industrial occupations suitable to the various classes and calculated to render the paupers on leaving the house improved in their habit, and better fitted for independent exertion than when they come in, with this view it is that they earnestly request the co-operation of the Poor Law Commissioners, in furnishing this Union with an efficient Master and Matron, the existing salaries are for the Master £10, and the Matron £8 per annum with dietaries and apartments, the Board would favourably consider any modification the Commissioners might recommend, nor will they be wanting in personal exertion to give the best support to these officers in rendering of the Workhouse of this Union as much as possible, a useful name to others they make advertisements in the general advertiser for tenders for this day fortnight, but they have little hope of being able through this channel to obtain tenders from persons that would be proper for the institution.
