N^o. 35,680 acknowledging the receipt of Minutes of the 28th instant and requesting to be informed of the particulars of the Case of the Poor Woman sent by the Relieving Officer to the Workhouse and who is stated to have died in about a Month after her admission. Referring to the above letter, the Medical Officer states that Hannah Nolan was aged 60 years was brought to the House and cast during a Relieving officers ticket she appeared extremely weak and was obliged to be carried, being unable to walk after her admission some warm Milk was brought to her which she was unable to drink. She made no rally or apparent Constitution effort and died about a Month from the time of her admission.

The assistant Master was called in and as far as appeared to have called forth a report had been demanded - and the pumpers were ordered to be employed in repairing the floors of the ancillary Workhouse with lime and sand.

My reason for thus bringing the subject under the notice of the Board are that the appointment of the Apothecary being made by the Guardians at the request of the Medical Officer in consequence of the increase of duty caused by the late considerable increase of the numbers already in the House

The Medical officer has to devote a considerable portion of his time to the sanitary condition of the entire Establishment as well as daily prescribe the Medicine and dietary for the large numbers of sick both in the hospital Infirmary and Workhouse. Under those circumstances I trust the Board will consider that the apothecary is to keep the books necessary consequent on his duty.

Major Stewart sends a letter from the Poor Law Commissioners No 35662 dated 8 July 1848, relative to the local Committees to the following effect— the Commissioners are of opinion that it might be explained to the Committees that their powers are expressly limited by the 6th Section of the Irish Relief extension act to inquiring and reporting, the Board of Guardians being exclusively responsible on each case. In cases where the holders of land as well as their families are recommended for relief the Board of Guardians have no legal alternative but are bound to reject the recommendation as regards the holders of land but not their families if found to be in actual want of goods.

Resolved That an overseer be appointed at £1 per week until the 1st of August next in each Electoral division in which out door Relief is given to able bodied under the 2nd Section of the Poor Relief extension act and we

do further propose that the cutting of turf for sale to be placed to the credit of the several Electoral divisions be carried on by those persons receiving out door relief when Turf may be obtained gratis after the completion of Roads as well as stones breaking the employment of those persons to be carried on according to the directions of the Poor law Commissioners.
