That a pauper girl named Elizabeth Beegan had left the House a short time since to go to service, she returned here on yesterday and was admitted into the House without any knowledge the Master having been called stated that it was the Porter who admitted the girl. The Porter being called in stated that it was to be her Mother, and intended she would leave again.

The Board being of opinion that the Porter had acted very improperly in admitting the girl without the Master's knowledge admonished him, and told him, if he did not more strictly conform to his duties for the future and that the next Complaint preferred against him, he would be dismissed. The Master for the Report that two Paupers named Paulan and Moclair have been refractory and disobedient and refused to work.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

The Board directed that both Warrants be brought before the Magistrates of Petty Sessions.

On the Master's application orders were signed, for the following articles, 500 yards of Flannel from the Selwynian Committee, 8 1/2 yards, 1000 yards of Linen, 200 yards of Canvas, 3 Tin Cases, 1 basket for Bread, 3 lbs. Mackerel, 20 English Ramming, 14 1/2 Steel Spigs, 2<sup>nd</sup> Classing yarns, 1 brace of Tack, 1/2 lb Pitch and Vaseline, 1/2 lb Black Stones & 1/2 lb Hairs.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, for Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Letter from the Commissioners N<sup>o</sup> 38637 dated 1<sup>st</sup> August 48 relative to the return of inmates in the Workhouse and Ancillary buildings and recommending the Guardians to take the matter into consideration with a view to such arrangements being made to prevent the Workhouse being over-crowded, and referring to the case of the Poor Woman named Honor Nolan who is stated and conveyed to the Workhouse and a Cost.

Letter from the Commissioners N<sup>o</sup> 38637 dated 1<sup>st</sup> August 1848 relative to a Resolution contained in Minutes of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians on the 12<sup>th</sup> ultimo on the subject of the recovery of the Rate due on Properties and which Receivers have been appointed and transmitting Copies of the orders of the Court of Chancery.

Letter from the Commissioners N<sup>o</sup> 41523 dated 5<sup>th</sup> August 1848 acknowledging the receipt of a list of defaulters in the payment of Poor Rates against whom the Board propose to institute proceedings in the Superior Courts, and stating that the Consent of the Commissioners for proceedings to recover Rates is only required in the Cases of Immediate Appeals and when furnished with that list they are prepared to give the Consent.

Circular from the Commissioners N<sup>o</sup> 585/48 dated 7<sup>th</sup> August 1848 transmitting a form of Bond for Collectors of Poor Rates, Referring to the Commissioners Letter N<sup>o</sup> 38637/1848

Resolved, That the Clerk be directed to send to each Collector a Copy of the letter referred to, and direct them to make application to the Receiver in Cases, where Receiver are appointed over Properties on which the Rate is due, and in making application to each Receiver their attention should be called to the order of the Court of Chancery bearing date the 12<sup>th</sup> day of November 1845.

Resolved that the Clerk do write to each of the Rate Collectors, calling on them to furnish lists of such Immediate Sessons, that there is any difficulty in collecting the Rate from, and if not furnished in proper form "a copy of which the Clerk is directed to furnish to each Collector" and to state that if the required lists be not furnished by the 23<sup>rd</sup> inst. their Solicitor will be directed to proceed against the Committee for failing to comply with the orders of the Board.
