Known ledge admonished him, and told him, if he did not
more strictly conform to his duties for the future and that
the next complaint preferred against him, he would be
dismissed. The Master for the Report that two Paupers named
Douglas and MacLean have been refractory and disorderly
and Refused to Work.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given theron, as follows:

The Board directed that both Bills be brought before the Magistrate at Petty Sessions.

On the Master's application Orders were signed, for the following articles, 500 yards of Flannel from the Helquins Committee p. 8 pp yard, 1000 yards of Linen, 200 yards of Canvas, 3 Ton Coats, 1 basket for bread, One Dozen Jugs 20 lbs English Handling, 14 lbs Steel Spikes, 2 lbs Cloring Iron, 1 box of Tack, 7 lbs Pitch and Varnish, 1/2 ton Rock Stone & 1 ton Hams.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:-

Letter from the Commissioners No. 38637 dated 1st August 1848 relating to the Return of inmates in the Workhouse and Auxiliary buildings and recommending the Guardians to take the Master into Consideration with a view to such arrangements being made to prevent the Work House being over crowded, and referring to the Case of the Poor Woman named Anna Nolan who is stated was Conveyed to the Workhouse on a Cart.

Letter from the Commissioners No. 38637 dated 1st August 1848 relating to a Resolution Contained in Minutes of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians on the 12th ulto. on the Subject of the Recovery of the Rate due on Properties over which Receivers have been appointed and transmitting Copies of the orders of the Court of Chancery.

Letter from the Commissioners No. 44523 dated 5th August 1848 acknowledging the Receipt of a list of defaults in the Payment of Poor Rate, against whom the Board propose to institute Proceedings in the Superior Courts, and stating that the Consent of the Commissioners for Proceedings to recover Rate is only required in the Cases of Inmates at Large and when furnished with that list they are bound to give the Consent.

Circular from the Commissioners No. 5854/48 dated 7 August 1848 transmitting a form of Bond for Collectors of Poor Rate, Referring to the Commissioners letter No. 38637 1848

Resolved, That the Clerk be directed to send to each Collector a Copy of the letter referred to, and direct them to make application to the Receivers in cases, where Receivers are appointed over Properties on which the Rate is due, and in making application to each Receiver their attention should be called to the order of the Court of Chancery bearing date the 12th day of November 1845.

Referring to the Commissioners letter No. 44523 1848

Resolved that the Clerk do write to each of the Poor Collectors calling upon them to furnish lists of such Inmates late lessors, that there is any difficulty in collecting the Rate from, and if not furnished in proper form "a copy of which the Clerk is directed to furnish to each Collector" and to state that if the required lists be not furnished by the 23rd inst. their Solicitor will be directed to proceed against the Sequestrators for failing to comply with the orders of the Board.

Resolved that the Master be directed to employ an Accountant to regulate the Books of the House in order to make them agree with the actual number of Persons in the House for which the Board will allow the sum of Five Pounds Sterling.


