The Minutes of last Meeting were read and Signed.  
 The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 324 to No. 344, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.  
 The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 1027 to No. 1155, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.  
 The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:



On the Report and recommendation of the Finance Committee, the following Bills having been duly examined, and found to be correct, and in accordance with the several Orders were directed to be paid, and Checks for the several amounts were duly drawn on the Treasurer, and Signed, namely:

The Clerk's Report of Vaccination was read - (this on the first meeting in every month.) Number of successful cases.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

In consequence of the Reported new Circulation of the Cholera, This day visited the Brewery where the Cases were under treatment, and am happy to say that no new Case had occurred in any of the Rooms since yesterday. The only Case added to yesterday's list of six being one brought in from the Tavern. This day of the whole number ten had died and one appeared hopeful of Recovery. The remainder seemed to be doing well.

It is Justice to the Medical Officer Doctor Shuckey in charge of that Establishment and to the Trustees employed on his hire, to say that the Mill Works when the patients were treated were in a most creditable state.

July 10<sup>th</sup> 1849 Signed "Lancaster."

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The Master reported that some Purvis in the Brewery Auxiliary Workhouse were in the habit of measuring an additional quantity of Clothing and that certain females had deserted from the Establishment. Having ordered an extra quantity of Clothing.

Ordered that Mr. DeLang, the person in charge of the Brewery be informed that if such irregularities are again reported. The Board will take very serious notice of them.

On the application of the Master. Orders were signed for the following Articles viz. 1000 lb Soap, 1 Cwt Case Pot, 100 lb Case Pot, and 114 lb Mustard &c.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

Sealed under from the Commissioners dated 28<sup>th</sup> June 1849. Presenting the names for Receiving the Nat. Aid of

Major Stuart brought under the notice of the Board, the Circumstances of the State of the Clothing account, not being kept in good order and also the irregularity with which the Salver Book is made up by the Workhouse Master.

Resolved, that Mr. M. Wrench and Captain George be appointed a Committee to take Stock of the Provisions and Clothing and that it be done by Saturday the 16<sup>th</sup> July in presence of the Clerk

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Circular from the Commissioners, No. 4257/49, dated 3<sup>rd</sup> July 1849, transmitting a Copy of a sealed order prescribing forms in which the Names of the Nat. Aid are to be kept.

Letter from the Commissioners, No. 4306/49, dated 11<sup>th</sup> July 1849. Stating they have received from Mr. Philson relative to his inspection of the Asylum houses. Called a Meeting at 10<sup>th</sup> and stating the same for the Committee's Consideration.

The following viz. for Males 200 Boys & Girls or 172 Adult Females. Males 1311 Boys & Girls or 150 Adult Females. and requesting to be informed what Class of inmates. The Guardians propose to continue to accommodate in the new Building.

Circular, No. 4377/49, dated 2<sup>nd</sup> July 1849, requesting answers to questions regarding the one thing left in preparation for the striking of New Rates, returning the month of Nov. The questions to be returned next month.

Letter No. 4264/49, dated 5<sup>th</sup> July 1849. Regarding a report from Major Stuart, in which he alludes to the unsatisfactory state in which the books of the several Workhouses are kept, and requesting to be informed if the 24<sup>th</sup> Sect. of the 64<sup>th</sup> Chapter of the Poor Law Regulations have been observed, and stating Mr. Wrench and Mr. Law Inspector, will be unable to attend until next week for the purpose of enquiring into the State of the Clothing account, and transmitting a Copy of a letter which the Commissioners had addressed to the Workhouse Master, regarding his judgment upon the Mr. Wrench's premises.

Letter No. 4357- dated 5<sup>th</sup> July 1849, with a Copy of Edward Selous's explanation regarding the non Collection of the Rates, and requesting to know what steps have been adopted, & for the payment of the large amount due by him to the Surveyor and others.

Letter No. 4410/49, 5<sup>th</sup> July 1849. Calling attention to a letter, asking for certain Correspondence & a return of Money paid for April, & May & June, and requesting a Return when same may be furnished.

At this stage of the proceedings, the Earl of Clancarty, Mr. Chairman, arrived. He has been treated by Mr. McAlroy and Mr. Wick by Mr. Earl Clancarty.

A draft was ordered to be drawn on the Treasurer for the amount.

Read an application from John Abbott, Shoemaker, asking leave of absence for a few days.

The Board taking into Consideration that Abbott is employed by the day, having agreed to give his time if absent for three days.

Read Reports from Dr. Sherry & Dr. Moran regarding the outbreak of Cholera. The former relating to the Norway, the latter to the Court.

Read a letter from the Agent of the Bank of Ireland "New Treasurer" stating the Bank would advance £1000 on the security of the Order of the Guardians Viz. J. Clancarty, Clerk and Mr. Walter McAlroy at 4<sup>th</sup> Street until 1<sup>st</sup> October next.

Referring to Dr. Sherry's report asking additional remuneration for the increased duties now devolving upon him.

The Board beg to state that from the Circumstances of this kind they cannot request the allowance of remuneration to Dr. Sherry.

The Relieving Officers Diaries were laid before the Board.

The Master's Punishment Book was submitted to the Board and the Punishments therein contained approved of.

John Saffoye an orphan having applied for Relief and being stated by The Relieving Officers of the District, that his mother was in the receipt of  $\text{£} 4$  Weeks of out door Relief, and the present applicant was one of her family for whom she was drawing Relief.

Ordered. That the Woman's name be erased from the Out door Relief List.

The following resolutions regarding the duties of the Union was decided to be inserted in the Minutes, and also that 2000 Poor Bills be printed and circulated through the Union by the Relieving Officers and Rate Collectors, and posted in the several Chapels & Churches in the Union.

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Guardians under a stated order of the Commissioners, have appointed Mr. W. H. Park, Receiver of the Union, Ed. Rab Pym and all others concerned are requested to lodge with the Clerks of the Union, on or before the 1<sup>st</sup> August next such objections or representations as they have to offer regarding the existing occupancy, extent of holdings, erection of new Buildings or dilapidation of existing ones. Objection papers can be obtained at the Board Room, Ballinacree by making application to the Clerks of the Union &c

Resolved: That a Committee be appointed next days meeting for the purpose of assisting the Reviewer in the Revision of the Union, and to whom the Reviewer will be bound to refer in all matters of difficulty relating to the existing Regulations.

It being reported to the Board that the supply of Mill was inferior in quality, the Storekeeper was called before the Board and directed not on any account to receive mill of an inferior quality.

Referring to the Commissioners Letter N. 35528. dated 27th June 1849. relative to the Southborough Fever Hospital.

The Board directed the following Communication to be inserted, addressed to the Committee of Management by the Medical Officer. Ballinacorney July 11th 1849

Gentlemen. In consequence of your having referred to me for my report on the Communication received from the Poor Law Commissioners Office of the 27th ult. containing Dr. Spelman's observations relative to the Ballinacorney Fever Hospital.

I beg to submit the following for your consideration.

The Southborough Fever Hospital has in my opinion conferred great benefits upon the poor of this District who have been visited by Fever, in as much as they upon the Certificates of any Medical practitioner of the Relieving Officers, having obtained immediate admission to the Institution, where they received such Medical and other treatment as their state of Disease required.

The destitute and debilitated state of the poor seeking Relief whose Contagious Disease render Hospital resources indispensable for the safety of others necessarily renders their Convalescence slow and protracted, and if untimely discharged must be attended with considerable risk and danger to the individual and the families to whom they may return.

At the time the Fever Hospital was first opened, an unwillingness and dread prevailed amongst the sick poor to receive Hospital

Relief from the repugnance which always existed at the idea of being removed to the Poor House.

During that period I was prevailed and spread widely through families but from the Confidence which the sick soon began to entertain even from distant parts of the Union, in the comparatively few deaths and many recoveries that had taken place (as evidenced in one week by a report to the Board of Guardians) a more just desire for Relief from the temporary Poor Hospital was provided.

The following report of the number of Typhoid Cases and some acute Dysentery of the poorest class treated in the Hospital for the last six months ending the 31<sup>st</sup> June shows how extensively the epidemic prevailed.

Number of Cases in Hospital Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> December 33. The number since admitted 277. Making a total of 309. 224 males & 85 females. 217 recovered. Hospital Relief of these were discharged 214. The number of deaths being 23. Showing a mortality comparatively small of 7 or 8 % Cent although many of the Cases were of the most dangerous Typhoid Character.

The average number of days each patient was in Hospital from his admission to his discharge or death being about 23 days showing that discharge had taken place as soon as was compatible with the safety of the Patient and the public.

A supply of body Linen has been provided for all patients as well as the required quantity of beds and bedding requisite

for the extended accommodation which was necessary to be provided.

The Brewery Auxiliary Workhouse which had been reserved for Cholera Cases during the prevalence of that Epidemic in the town, has lately been occupied by Convalescents from various diseases and Chronic Cases of Dysentery and at present contains a number nearly equal to that limited by the order under Seal from the Commissioners.

No accommodation is at present available at the Workhouse Hospital or Infirmary from the number of Cases of sickness with which their institutions are now occupied.

The Board having verbally given directions that no wine or to his key should be supplied without the directions of the Medical Officers and having ascertained that the direction has not been complied with, have now given the Workhouse Master directions not to give any wine or to his key unless prescribed for by the Medical Officers.

Read a Petition from persons complaining that they cannot get spirit for fuel supplied to the Workhouses.

The Clerk stated that in consequence of the arrangements for the issue of Cheques not being made with the Bank, the accounts of the Petitioners had not been presented for payment.

Read a letter from Mr. Clarke regarding the buildings of drained areas of the Workhouse. The Board desire to refer it to the visiting Committee.

Read a proposal from A. Clarke to put up the new clothes store with shelves &c. of a proper scantum to be labelled alphabetically and in every way fitted up to the satisfaction of the Board for the sum of £50.0.0, which the Board accepted of.

It being reported to the Board that John Clarke, Relieving Officer for the District of St. Martin's was ill of fever.

Mr. Cymon, one of the Guardians of the District being present, recommended Thomas Darcy to act during the illness of Clarke at the same rate of remuneration allowed to W. Clarke, while he will be so engaged, which the Board approved of, and directed that a draft of £12.0.0 be placed in his hands for the purpose of affording relief.

On Mr. Martin's requisition it was then signed for the following articles viz 2000 new pins, 2000 new needles & 2000 new sweeping brushes.

The visiting Committee reported on Mr. Clarke's letter as follows: It is better to have but one drain and that through the centre of the pile, to lead from the Tank at the Pury in run of the Infirmary and recommend that a doorway, with door frame complete be put in the yard wall opposite the said Tank for the purpose of cleansing it occasionally.

The amount of Mortality set forth in the Report submitted respecting Cholera. Corresponds with the preceding week altho. there are a larger number under treatment than from the decline of Dysentery in its violent form. Anticipate that in course of the current week an equal number will prove fatal. There was however in Hospital a great many recently admitted in the most debilitated state under the influence of a combination of Fever and Cholera with swelling of limbs and general prostrated tendency. These are hopeless cases which I can attribute to no other cause than the prostration they had to endure previous to their admission but it is pleasing to find that when well these prostrating causes have not completely undermined the Constitution. Hospital rest diet and Care

Resolved. That Potatoes be substituted for Smut in lieu of Bread for the Healthy Inmates, and that they be bought in the Market at the lowest price but not exceed 3<sup>d</sup> per Stone.

The Workhouse Master having brought under the notice of the Board, the Circumstances of a Woman, disabled and not able to work, who had been forwarded by a Member of the Board of the Loughrea Union, by order of the Vice-Guardians for the purpose of having her forwarded to her Union at Castlebar.

The Master having admitted the Woman and Child, the Board desire the Document to be forwarded to the Commissioners, with the minute and request to be informed how they are to act in the Matter.

The Masters Punishment Book was submitted to the Board, by which it appeared that 2 women had deserted from the House, and returned again.

Ordered that the Warrant Solitary Confinement for 12 hours, and that a pauper named Macdonald, who was employed as Porter of one of the Auxiliary Work Houses, had misconducted himself,

Ordered that he be kept in Solitary Confinement for 24 Hours, and that he be entirely removed from the Auxiliary Work House.
