Letter from the Commissioners N<sup>o</sup> 37,516/49 dated 12 June 1849, referring to the Resolution of the Board respecting the appointment of a Reviewer by the Poor Law Commissioners and Guardians of the several Electoral Divisions to appraise the existing Gross Valuations thereof, according to the present occupiers and to correct errors and stating that it is not competent for the Boards of Guardians to delegate the appointment of a Reviewer of the

Valuations. Proposed and in order to prevent delay have issued an order for the appointment of a Reviewer. Referring to Commissioners Letter N<sup>o</sup> 35,833 dated 30<sup>th</sup> May 1849.

In my report I have to observe that no Cholera cases or symptoms of the disease has appeared since my last report, 3 weeks having elapsed without a single case.

Letter N<sup>o</sup> 16/435 dated 13<sup>th</sup> March 1849 with a Memorial from the Pallinacloy Poor Improvement Com<sup>rs</sup> asking for a new Valuation, was again read this day in consequence of a Communication addressed to Major Stewart by the Poor Law Commissioners referring to it, when the following order was made in reference thereto,

The Board beg to refer the Commissioners to their minute requesting of them to appoint a Valuator and to state that in consequence of their having declined to do so, a Revisor has since been appointed under their sealed order and their Election now awaits their Confirmation, which they observe with regret, that the Commissioners have delayed sending,

Referring to the Commissioners' Letter N<sup>o</sup> 35.528. The Board desire to refer it to the Committee for the Brocknagh Temporary Fever Hospital

The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.

The number of provisional admissions to the Workhouse confirmed was 142

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

Read a letter from Mr. Murphy, Agent to the Bank of Ireland office, stating the Guardians' account is now overdrawn, and requesting the Board to draw as little as possible until arrangements are made.

The Board of Guardians request Mr. Murphy will make application to the Directors for liberty to make the necessary advances (which will be as limited as possible) until the new Rate is available, which is expected to be in course of Collection before the 1<sup>st</sup> October next.

Read a letter N<sup>o</sup>. 30829, dated 11<sup>th</sup> May 1849, addressed to Major Stuart sanctioning the opening of a gate way in the Boundary Wall, to the field at the rear of the Workhouse.

Read a letter 29585, dated 25<sup>th</sup> June 1849, addressed to Major Stuart sanctioning the Erection of a Dead House and Pines to the site of the Workhouse.

Read Letter N<sup>o</sup>. 41105 dated 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1849, addressed to Major Stuart requesting that he would continue to press on the Guardians, their obligation of keeping within the limits fixed by the Commissioners Order, and to report any excess of the limited number of inmates which may occur, also of bringing under the notice of the Guardians the state of the Workhouse Master's Book, and of the adoption of proper steps for their Correction, as well as the Consideration of his Competency.

Read an application from Mr. Poyntz, the Apothecary asking leave of absence for 10 days.

The Board granted the application on the understanding of Dr. Burke that the duties will be performed in his absence.

Read an application from Mr. Lannon asking the Board to pay (Dr. Lannon) his salary who acted as Relieving Officer during the illness of Mr. Delahunt Relieving Officer for Kiltormer & Abbeygormican.

Ordered, that Mr. Lannon be paid, at the same rate of salary as Mr. Delahunt, who he replaced as Relieving Officer in Kiltormer and Abbeygormican Divisions.

Read an application from John Abbot, asking the Board to allow him the expenses incurred, attending Longhroa Sepulchre, to procure some papers.

It was ordered to allow him 12/-

Read a letter from Thomas Molloy, asking liberty to substitute John Ryan as one of his securities in room of Francis W. Cough.

The Board accepted of Mr. Ryan as Molloy's security.

Read a letter from Dr. Spence requesting the Board to Reconsider the amount of remuneration to be allowed to Medical Officers, engaged to attend Cholera Cases.

The Board do desire to state that no alteration can take place.

Read a Memorial from Pat. Mammion requesting the Board to allow him the amount of his former Bill. The Board having referred this memorial to the Committee of the District, have refused to entertain the subject.



Read a letter from Mr. Owens, Assistant Master asking for leave of absence to attend the Election of Master to the Longtree Workhouse and requesting to get a testimonial from the Board as to his Competency and Conduct for the last two years.

The Board granted the application, On the presentation of John Clarke Relieving Officer for Clonfert Electoral Division of a Woman named Catherine Glemane of Lisnore being on the Out Poor Relief List and in the occupation of three acres of Land.

Ordered that Catherine Glemane's name be erased from the Relief List

A Letter having been addressed to the Chairman by the Rev. Mr. Crumpton respecting the case of a poor Woman named Mary Dolan of Chelsea who it appears was improperly struck off the Relief List.

The Board having inquired into the Circumstances have directed that Relief be continued to Mary Dolan & family.

An Estimate being sent for the Board from Thomas Page for building a pair of Piers and Breasting on Crom Gate at the end side of the Boundary Wall for the sum of £112:6.

The Board have accepted of it

On the proposal should proceed to the Consideration of the Applications for Relief. Major Stuart read a letter from the Commissioners requiring him to enquire upon the Guardians in no case to exceed the number they have allowed to be accommodated in the Workhouse and Auxiliaries. The houses being already nearly full and the alternative with hundreds applying for Relief being either to refuse it at great risk to the applicants or to order admission that they may exceed the number allowed. The Board felt it their duty either to afford Relief in each case of destitution and as on former occasions to adjourn to the following day, to make the discharges from the house necessary to bring it within the required limits of such persons as can be put out of the house with the least aggravation of suffering.

The Board adjourned until the day 5 July.

Thursday July 5th 1841

The Board being reassembled The Earl of Clancarty in the Chair. Walter M'Donagh, Hugh Kelly, Wm. Goldbar, & Major Stuart P.S.

The Board then proceeded to discharge persons from the House on the Out Poor Relief List

The Master was directed that in future any turf that is received must be delivered at the Main House yard and to be clamped there until measured, and turf required for the Auxiliary Houses to be supplied from the Main House.

A Representation having been made to the Board  
of the absence of the Watchman on yesterday without  
leave, was called before the Board, and stated he went  
with 15 boys to one of the Ancehain Workhouses, he  
was cautioned by the Board never to absent himself  
without the liberty of the Master or Wardens.

The next meeting of the Board will be held on  
Wednesday the 11<sup>th</sup> of July instant.
