The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

In Consequence of the reported new Circulation of the Cholera, This day visited the Brewery where the Cases are under treatment, and am happy to say that no new Case had occurred in any of the Breweries since yesterday, the only Case added to yesterday's list of six being one brought in from the Town the day before. The Master has died and one appears hopeless of Recovery. The remainder seem likely to be doing well.

It is justice to the Medical officer Doctor Shanks in charge of that Establishment and to the Nurses employed on his time, to say that the Poor Woods when the patients were treated were in a most creditable state.

July 20th 1849 Signed "Clerk of the Board."

Referring to the Commissioners Letter No. 35528. dated 27th June 1849 relative to the Dartmouth Hospital. The Board directed the following Communication to be inserted, addressed to the Committee of Management by the Medical Officer. Ballina Co. Co. July 11th 1849

Gentlemen. In consequence of your having referred to me for my report on the Communication received from the Poor Law Commission Office of the 27th ultimo containing Dr. Shiel's Observations relative to the Ballinasloe Infirmary Poor Hospital.

I beg to enclose the following for your consideration.

The Dartmouth Poor Hospital has in my opinion conferred great benefit upon the poor of this District which had been visited by Fever, so much so, that, upon the Certificate of any Medical member of the Relieving Officers, I have ascertained that the Case and Person obtained immediate admission to the Institution, where they received such Medical and other treatment as their State of Disease required.

The debilitate and delirious state of the poor suffering Relief, whose Contagious disease render Hospital resources insipendable for the safety of others necessarily renders their Convalescence slow and protracted, and if untimely discharged must be attended with considerable risk and danger to the individual and the families to whom they may return.

At the time the Fever Hospital was first opened, an unwillingness and dread prevailed amongst the sick prior to entering Hospital

Relief from the infirmary which always existed at the Idea of being removed to the Poor House.

During that period Four hundred and Sixty widely through families but from the Confidence which the Doctor from time began to entertain even from distant parts of the Union, in the comparatively few deaths and many recoveries that had taken place (as recorded in my weekly report to the Board of Guardians) he made a decision for Relief in the Infirmary and the patients were provided.

The following report of the number of Fever Cases and some date December of the present Cases treated in Hospital for the last six months ending Decr 1st June shows how rapidly the number increased.

Number of Cases in Hospital during 51st December 33. the number since admitted 377. Making a total of 399. Desirable to have received Hospital Relief of those men declared Cured 231. The number of deaths being 23. giving a mortality Proportionately small of 4.8% & yet although many of the cases were of the most dangerous Typhoid character.

The average number of days each patient was in Hospital from his admission to his discharge or death being about 23 days showing that discharge did take place as soon as was compatible with the safety of the Patient and the public.

A Supply of body linen has been provided for all patients as well as the required quantity of beds and bedding requisites

for the extended accommodation which was necessary to be provided.

The Brewery Circular Workhouse which had been reserved for Ophthalmic Cases during the prevalence of that Epidemic in the town, has lately been occupied by Convalescents from various diseases and Chronic Cases of Dispensary and at present contains a number nearly equal to that limited by the order under Seal from the Commissioners.

No accommodation is at present available at the Workhouse Hospital or Infirmary from the number of Cases of sickness with which their institutions are now occupied.

Read a letter from Mr. Clarke regarding the buildings of drains at one of the Workhouses. The Board desire to refer it to the visiting Committee.

Read a proposal from A. Clarke to fit up the new Clothes Store with shelves &c of a proper size and to be labelled alphabetically and in every way fitted up to the satisfaction of the Board for the sum of £^{550/-}. which the Board do accept of.

It being reported to the Board that John Clarke Relieving Officer for Cypress & Gladfield was ill of Fevers.

Mr. Symons one of the Guardians of the District being present recommended Thomas Darcy to act during the illness of Clarke at the same Rate of remuneration allowed to Mr. Clarke, while he will be so engaged, which the Board do approve of, and directed that a draft of £^{150/-} be placed in his hands for the purpose of affording Relief.

On Mr. Martin's requisition it was then signed for the following articles to be supplied free 200 yards Corning & 200 yds Sweeping Brush.

The visiting Committee reported on Mr. Clarke's letter as follows. It is better to have but one drain and that through the centre of the floor, to lead from the Tank at the Privy in rear of the Infirmary and recommend that a doorway with iron frame complete be put in the rear wall opposite the said tank for the purpose of cleansing it occupantly.
