It appears that Mr. Kelly's account has increased in the Dublin Electoral Division from £ 381 due September 1848 to £ 524 due on 12<sup>th</sup> Sept 1849, yet by allowing for State due on the Auxiliary Workhouse, Demerit on the account will be reduced by the sum of £ 78. 11. 3.

In the County Electoral Division Mr. Kelly has reduced the account from £ 252. 8. 2 due September 1848 to 222. 11. 2 due this day.

We beg to call the attention of the Board to the inaccurate manner in which the State books have been filled up, rendering it next to impossible in many cases to recover the State. This we expect will be remedied in the books preparing for the State now being made.

Out of the 27 days paid on for Mr. Kelly's attending and settling his accounts, he attended 19 in person, 4 by his brother his deputy as High Constable and was absent, on the 8 days of non attendance he states he was 2 at Office and 4 ill - not accounting for 2.

There are several sums due in both divisions that he might, and has not called in, and we think he ought to have used more diligence. We have only examined into the State of the Electoral Division of Dublin and County Workhouse.

With regard to Mr. Kelly's account a large account appears to be due on the Dublin Electoral Division, but to a great extent he has accounted for this by showing that several of the

The persons rated have been quieted and that until the dead land-loads come into possession and can be rated under the valuation now being revised, it would be impossible for him to collect. The sum due by Southam and Mr Morahan and others for Land Tax is estimated amount to nearly £200 which with £50 he has collected within the last week and £100 he has erroneously charged in rate book will reduce his arrear to nearly 1/3

It appears that he has used due diligence for the last fortnight, since the cutting of the corn crops commenced, before which time in very many instances he had nothing to seize on for the rate due, under these circumstances we suggest the propriety of continuing Mr Pelly in the collection of the rate

It is to be remembered that the school is wanting in the exhibition of a paper showing the scale of proficiency required for the several classes. I recommend that such a paper should be prepared by the teachers submitted for approval & afterwards exhibited in the school room with the numbers in each of the forms or classes signed Elizabeth 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct 1849

Dysentery, Diarrhoea, Scrophula, Scoury, and ophthalmia form a large proportion of Infirmary Diseases, but contrasting the admissions and discharges, with the few deaths occurring, I may venture to assume for the information of the Guardians, that all classes are taking a favourable turn.

The Board in deciding that the Rate Book for the Bullinastee Division should be signed do so subject to the opinion of the Poor Law Commission, respecting the rating of the Agricultural Hall which is taken by the month at the gross rent of £12:6 month, the premises having been altered and in part repaired at the charge of the Trustees, with power to the Board to surrender in a month's notice. It does not appear to the Guardians under the circumstances that the Board would have right to charge rate upon an amount of rent beyond what the Lessee may be entitled to receive.
