Letter from the Central Board of Health No 2139 dated 11th February 1850 in reply to the Resolution of the Guardians requesting they would direct the closing of Epsecont and Carnacragg Poor Hospitals stating the Board of Health have acquiesced in the closing of Carnacragg Temporary Hospital but suggesting the propriety of continuing the Epsecont Hospital for some time longer. Stating they will submit Com Supply and discharge a Certificate for the withdrawal of Hospital accommodation at Epsecont.

Circular No 7768¹⁸⁵⁰ dated 11th February 1850 calling for a return of all Contracts containing Penal Clauses entered into by the Guardians.

Letter No 1200 of 1850 dated 18th February 1850 stating that in consequence of the alterations proposed to be made by them in the boundaries of the Central

Division of Dublin and Union and of their intention to declare the New Unions of Mount Pelican and Pullinina they have determined to issue an order postponing the Election proceedings for the present.

Letter No 9079/50 dated 19th February 1850 advising to the Resolution contained in Minutes of the Union proposing that a sum of £10 be given for the purpose of assisting Mary Bury Helen Finnan to emigrate to New Orleans and in reference thereto requesting to be informed more fully of the Circumstances under which it is proposed to assist these parties to emigrate what their ages are & whether any members of the family are at New Orleans, also advising to the Resolution that Messrs. Poole & White be appointed to revalue the Union and stating the Guardians are not authorized to appoint more than one person to make a revaluation of the Union & recommending the Guardians to select one person for the office with a view to procure uniformity in the valuation. And as regards the principle of adopting Mr. Griffiths Valuation. The Commissioners request the attention of the Guardians to the 134th section of the Act 1847^{and} vic. Cap 56. The Valuator will be bound to proceed strictly in accordance with the principle prescribed thereby. The Commissioners also desire to request

Mr Dickey which Rents had been paid without any notice to discontinue the legal proceedings instituted.

Ordered that the Collector Mr Dignan be called upon to give an explanation of his proceedings for the recovery of the Rents in the case of Mr Dickey without an order of the Board. Referring to the Commissioners letter No 8005 dated 11th January, Mr John Kelly the Rate Collector being in attendance was called before the Board and examined into the circumstances of the case, his explanation appearing satisfactory was requested to put it on paper.

Referring to the Commissioners letter No 8475 dated the 19th February 1850.

The Board decide to say that they in giving Dr Double leave of absence at the time did not contemplate stopping his salary.

Referring to the Commissioners of Health letter No 2139 dated 16th February 1850.

The Board in applying to the Board of Health to have the Hospital at Epwcomt closed took into consideration the amount of accommodation available for New Patients, which they ascertained to be under present circumstances sufficient for the number of patients really suffering from Fever, and they therefore still would press upon the Board of Health the expediency and justice of closing an Hospital which affording relief only to the adjacent district is chargeable for all expenses upon the Union at large while the patients sent into the Union from Hospital are chargeable upon the Division.

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only to which they respectively belong.
The Board in referring to what the Commission-
ers say respecting the distance from which patients
have to be sent from the South of the Union to the
Central fever Hospital beg to remind them that
they have already ordered the closing of two fever
hospitals accommodating patients from the
North and West which are at least as remote from
the Center.

The Board of Guardians have read with the
greatest alarm two letters from the Poor Law
Commissioners referring to their intention of
proceeding to a division of the Dublin Union.
The Board beg to refer the Commissioners to a
unanimous Resolution in their meeting of the
13th November 1848 in which they strongly remonstrated
against such a division by which large addi-
tional staff expenses must necessarily be
imposed upon the already overburdened
rate payers. The Board most cordially agree
with the Commissioners as to the propriety of
reversing the order of taxation by the proposed
alteration of the boundaries of the Electoral
Divisions, but they would respectfully repeat
their strong hope that the present boundary
of the Union may be preserved.

With reference to the proposed valuation the
Board beg to remark that it was in order to have
uniformity in the valuation that they (having
previously examined the valuations as to their
opinion on the subject) were disposed to adopt
Mr Griffiths valuation as a basis upon which
that now proposed should be conducted and
it was in order to lessen the chance of unduly

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influence on the opinion of the valuator (which
in former valuations they have reason to fear
did operate in many cases) that they thought
it advisable to appoint two persons who should
proceed together in the execution of the work.
Should the Commissioners persist in their
intention of dividing the Dublin Union
The Board request instructions on the follow-
ing points

Is the valuation to be confined to the
limits of the proposed future union of
Dublin and?

Are any steps to be taken with respect to the
valuation of the remaining districts?

The Board are anxious to have the Commis-
sioners immediate instructions on this latter
point, as it is their decided conviction
that it will be impossible to strike another
Rate in any district without a previous
valuation.
