The Board approved of the proceeding.

The Tender of Mr. Sharpe to supply Potatoes at 4<sup>d</sup> per stone being considered too high was rejected.

The Earl of Clancarty the Chairman having offered gratuitously a large quantity of the offal of his Flax Mill for the purpose of bedding for the inmates of the Workhouse,  
Resolved - that the offer of the Earl of Clancarty be accepted, and the Workhouse Master directed to send for  
the

the offal, and ascertain if it be suitable for bedding.

A woman named Anne O'Dwyre, having made application for admission to the Workhouse, stating that her husband had turned her out. The Relieving Officer was called before the Board and directed by the Chairman to inquire into the case, and if the woman should be destitute to admit her, and to inform the Husband that the Relief afforded her would be by way of Loan, for which the Board would proceed against him.
