remained as such until Mr. Buffett subsequently to Mr
Buffett Appointer to the Union. When he ordered as
many labelled bundles as were out & sent to be removed
to the late store store. May to state that that store was
settled twice in Mr. McMurran time as Master and once in
Mr. Fairning time. Another may to state that as soon as
Rumour was spread as our Armley all the paupers
sent there were sent in their own clothes and dressed
there in the Union dress. No clothes came from Board
Residence to the Parent House for these paupers until

To the poor Women & Children of the Association, and that all the clothes given up to me in charge, were delivered back to their respective owners except those ~~which were~~ clothes which were burnt or rotten.

Gentlemen.

Having been called upon by you to report to you the result of the proceedings at the late Quarter Sessions - I beg to state that in every case in which parties charged with larceny of Union Property, were brought up for trial, and convicted, the Bench through the Assistant Barrister announced a determination not to inflict any greater punishment or in any future case sent for trial under similar circumstances than the punishment which the Magistrate has the power of summarily inflicting at Petty Sessions for breach of discipline - namely one month's imprisonment and each such person was accordingly sentenced to "One month's imprisonment from the date of Commitment" most of which terms had then expired.

In the Case of one woman not an inmate of the Workhouse, charged with having in her possession stolen property - and on which the full Union brand marks perfectly fresh & distinct - the Court informed the Jury, that in the absence of proof that the Prisoner can read, no guilty knowledge could be attributed to her especially as she pleaded in Irish - and she was accordingly acquitted but the property was taken home by the Master of the Workhouse.

The Assistant Barrister with the full concurrence of the other Magistrates I should think was very properly repeated his determination to limit the punishment in

all such Cases to one Month's imprisonment at the most, from the date of Commitment stating that he considered this Course the most effectual in checking this - to say the least of it - injudicious conduct of the Guardians in sending such Cases for trial whereby the Country, and the galway union are put to great expense, and young females perhaps subjected to all the Casualties incident to a large & populous town that it is quite evident there must be gross neglect on the part of the officers or those whose business it is to have proper discipline observed in the Workhouse and he hoped the determination entered into by the Magistrates that day in which he was glad to see they all concurred would put a stop to the high presumption which had been sought to be put on Magistrates to cause them to act contrary to their judgment and if the grand juries to arm themselves with prosecutions of this nature, they should pray for them themselves as in no case shall they get any expenses of such prosecutions.

After so strong an expression of the Court respecting the practice I feel it to be my duty publicly to state, that but very few, and those the very worst, of the numerous Cases which occur, ever selected to be sent for trial - and those only such as the guardians considered could not be sufficiently punished by the maximum imprisonment which the Magistrates had it in their power to inflict - and that but few persons in the Workhouse of this Union would not gladly submit to one Month's imprisonment for a full suit of Clothes - and that as regards expenses the guardians have never in any instance asked them but have uniusually carried on these prosecutions at their own expense.

As regards the Civil-Bill business - I have to state that Collected a decree at Galway Sessions, against Mr. Nicholas Lynch for the full amount due by him to this Union as occupier - against which he has appealed to the Coming assizes and I also at DrophEDA obtained decrees against the same

gentlemen for the rates due by him as Immediate Lessor - and which were given by the Assistant Commissioner on the time offered by defendants Counsel viz that an appeal should be lodged against one of them and the remainder to abide the result of that appeal -

I have also obtained decrees against John Augustus Drury £3 but on the terms that they shall be used only against his property now about to be sold in the Encumbered Estates Court in which I have lodged claims for the amount due to this Union -

In the Case of the frauds against Henry Blake £ for £45-18-3 it was urged on behalf of Mr Blake that the Collector had sued and obtained Magistrate's warrants against some of Mr Blake's tenants or served notices for such proceeding in other cases, for some of the items included in the Civil Bills each of which included a great many sum bers, wherupon notwithstanding the argument of counsel whom I employed on the occasion those Civil Bills were all dismissed -

In the case of the frauds I have to observe that Mr Blake was the person primarily liable and the tenants so sued or served with notice were proved to be unable to pay and the magistrate's warrants unexecuted -

In the Case of the frauds against Mr Broughton I obtained a decree for £4 the sum paid for flags taken out of the Commdstone Building M. House -

John Ogle sued for £4. 16. 3 rates was proved to be a minor of about seven years old and it was likewise proved that there is a receiver under the Court of Chancery on his property should the Collector not be able to levy the amount due. If the land together with the new rate a Commissioner advised it will be necessary to apply to the Court of Chancery for an order on the Receiver to pay the amount but this is at present so small, that I cannot recommend the Board to incur the expense at least until the striking of

I have also obtained a decree against Patrick Kelly of Commdstone for £4. 3. 9 rates from the Honourable Comptt of the County of Cork

We are induced to take this step confident that you will in this, as on all other occasions "strain a point" to assist your Officers, And we have further been induced to do so seeing that other Unions (Galway and Baltimore) have lately taken the matter as respects the payment of the Union Officers into their serious consideration and have devised means to liquidate the large arrears due and to secure in future a more punctual payment of their salaries. We therefore pray that you will deem it fit to order the sum due to us to 25th March 1852, and make any other arrangement which may seem advisable for our future benefit, by complying with our request you will materially oblige and serve us -

The Board would refer the Committee to the fact that not only has there been a large Majority in favour of W H O'Leary on each meeting of the Guardians, and that Majority including the Owners or representatives of the owners of the greater part of the property of this Union, and who are naturally deeply interested in its proper valuation, but that on November 1st when it was voted on the subject since first proposed, seventeen have chosen this gentleman to value their own properties. The Board therefore feel, that the delay would be more properly chargeable on the arbitrary opposition of the Committee to such a marked choice of the Board.

The Board moreover consider that the objection raised to W H O'Leary as a Valuator cannot be sustained, for this reason, that the valuation of the late Estate of W H O'Neill was not appealed against for its impropriety in proof thereof, the first rate made was collected without difficulty, and when an objection was raised to the making of a second rate, its object was merely to adjust the rate upon the respective parties of whom it would be payable, and the Receiver on the property offered to have the adjustment made without expense to the Union if such were allowed and confirmed by the Board, but as it was suggested that it would delay the making of the rate at the time, this offer of the Receiver was rejected, & for this reason his appeal

was made not for an implied impropriety in the valuation
The Board therefore acquit W H Shee of being the
cause of the appeal having succeeded in the case
With regard to the omission of a small House in Roundstone
It has been already thoroughly investigated by the Board
up to their satisfaction that W H Shee was in no
way instrumental to the omission, but that it arose
from that number having been confused with another.
Other inaccuracy may have crept into the valuation
which the Board cannot charge the valuator with,
owing to the continual changes of tenantry, and
of ownership &c & a want of proper information
and a cooperation on the part of interested persons
The Board do therefore again appoint W H Shee, &
trust that he will well see it is for the real
