to the same store at the being of the Auctioneers, and that all the cloths given up to me in charge, were delivered to their respective owners except those which were burned or rotten.

Ordered that the Board consider the explanation fully accounts for the deficiency in the following report from Mr. Callis was read -  
Gentlemen

Having been called upon by you to report to you the result of the proceedings at the late Quarter Sessions. I beg to state that in every case in which parties charged with larceny of Union Property, were brought up for trial, and convicted, the Bench through the Assistant Barrister announced a determination not to inflict any greater punishment, or in any future case sent for trial under similar circumstances than the punishment which the Magistrate has the power of summarily inflicting, at Petty Sessions for breach of discipline - namely one month's imprisonment and each such person was accordingly sentenced to "One month's imprisonment from the date of Commitment" most of which term had then expired.

Now the Case of one woman, not an inmate of the Workhouse, charged with having in her possession stolen property - and on which the full Union brand was perfectly fresh & distinct - the Court informed the jury, that in the absence of proof that the Prisoner can read, no guilty knowledge could be attributed to her (especially as she pleaded in Irish), and she was accordingly acquitted but the property was taken home by the Master of the Workhouse.

The Assistant Barrister with the full concurrence of the other Magistrates, from whom there was several precedents reported his determination to limit the punishment in

all such Cases to one month's imprisonment at the most, from the date of Commitment stating that he considered this Course the most effectual in checking this - to say the least of it - injudicious conduct of the Guardians in sending such Cases for trial throughout the Country, and the gallery being put to great expense, and young females perhaps subjected to all the Casualties incident to a large & populous town that it is quite evident there must be gross neglect on the part of the officers or those whose business it is to have proper discipline observed in the Workhouse and he hoped the determination entered into by the Magistrates that day in which he was glad to see they all concurred would put a stop to the high persons which had been sought to be put on Magistrates to cause them to act contrary to their judgment and if the grand jury chose to amuse themselves with prosecutions of this nature, they should pay for them themselves as in no case shall they get any expenses of such prosecutions.

After so strong an expression of the Court respecting the grand jury I felt it to be my duty publicly to state, that but very few, and those the very worst, of the numerous Cases which occur, were selected to be sent for trial - and those only such as the guardians considered could not be sufficiently punished by the maximum imprisonment which the Magistrates had it in their power to inflict - and that but few persons in the Workhouse of this Union would not gladly submit to one month's imprisonment for a full suit of clothes - and that as regards expenses the guardians have never in any instance asked them but have uniformly carried on these prosecutions at their own expense.

As regards the Civil-Bill business - I have to state that I obtained a decree at Galway Sessions, against Mr. Nicholas Lynch for the full amount due by him to this Union as occupier, against which he has appealed to the coming assizes and I also at Moyshers obtained decrees against the same

Quintanias for the rates due by him as Immediate  
Lessor - and which were given by the Assistant Comptroller  
on the terms offered by defendant's Counsel viz that an  
appeal should be lodged against one of them and  
the remainder to abide the event of that appeal -

I have also obtained decrees against John Augustus  
Drill & but on the terms that they shall be used only  
against his property now about to be sold in the  
Encumbered Estates Court in which I have lodged  
claims for the amount due to this Union -

In the case of the ~~proceedings~~ against Henry  
Blake & for £45-18-3 it was urged on behalf  
of Mr Blake that the Collector had sued and  
obtained Magistrate's warrants against some of  
Mr Blake's tenants or served notices for such proceedings  
in other cases, for some of the items included in

many numbers, whereupon notwithstanding the  
argument of counsel whom I employed on the occasion
