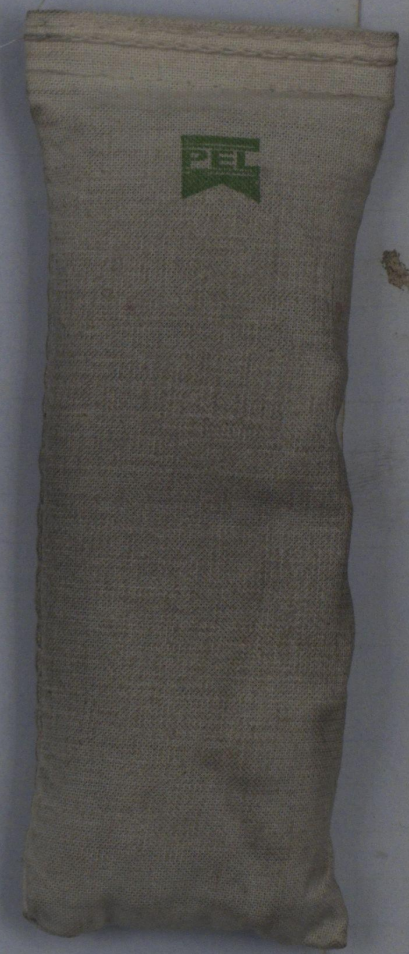

Specification for raising Walls of Dykes at Glasgow Workhouse.

The present dipping of the Walls to be taken off, and the Walls to be then raised at their present thickness & the height ^{height} ~~height~~ of at least fifteen feet from the ground at the foot of the Walls at both sides to be finished at top with a Coping similar to the Coping on the walls at present.
