O'Keefe on said lands of Cahill and gave back said cattle for £1.5.0 under these circumstances I appeal to you did I offer a fair value for my horses, as the Collector got from for the above named horse & cattle, he should - I am in a position to show you that my horses were driven at an unreasonable hour ^{at} the night, contrary to law and it is quite evident that the Collector would be able to point out some person who would see him seize or drive them if they was driven at any time or people travelling the roads when they would see him at any time in any light in the morning till dark of night and I require a bus any member of the Board see any officer of the Union not improper or illegal has been in duty to pursue the discharge of that officer & I hope you will all agree with me in proposing that Patrick Mullin be dismissed from the office of Clerk of the Board & never to be employed in that office again.
