Resolved By the Guardians, that the Report of the Medical Officer, dated 1st January 1844, relative to the Salary to be allowed the Medical Officer of the Workhouse.

Resolved. That having again taken this matter fully into our consideration we cannot discover any reason to alter the opinion already expressed, and we still think that the Salary of the Medical Officer ought not to be reduced under £50 per Annum, at least for the present, and we do hope the Commission will not offer further opposition to the proposed opinion of the Board on this subject, we find that the same we propose to give is under the average allowed to Medical Officers in several Workhouses in the County of York. It is true the Salary of the Medical Officer allowed at the time of his appointment was £50 per Annum, but at that period the Workhouse was only able to contain 400 paupers, and the Hospital 40 beds, whereas the Workhouse can accommodate 1344, & the Hospital 100, and although the number of paupers at present is limited, yet we fear as the season advances many paupers must be admitted, and the Salary of the Medical Officer consequently increased, and thus being above the sum that the Medical Officer's duties are lightened of our intention. We are happy to find that the Sanitary State of the Workhouse could not be better and the Salt we propose, but we do not consider this a good reason for diminishing the Salary of the Medical Officer. On the contrary we feel that the more entitled we are to the Account to the fair and reasonable consideration of the Board for his exertions in assisting in bringing the House to the present State.
