Resolved That the board of Guardians of the Olden Union are most anxious to introduce industrial agricultural employment into the Union, in order to carry out this object it would be necessary the Guardians should obtain some land adjoining the Workhouse and the property of Mr. Drinn, for which the Guardians will be prepared to pay Mr. Drinn any fair rent that may be agreed upon.

In order to make the land available for the purposes of Workhouse employment it will be necessary it should be fenced round with at least a seven foot wall, If Mr. Drinn was not disposed to advance the funds necessary for this purpose on terms that may be agreed upon the Guardians would suggest to Mr. Drinn the advisability of borrowing the amount required from the Land Improvement Comrs. the Interest and principal on which would be 6% per cent for 22 years which per centage the Guardians will make themselves liable for.

Before entering more fully into this subject the Guardians are anxious to ascertain if Mr. Drinn will be likely to entertain it, when the Guardians will be found willing to enter into the necessary arrangements.
