Dumbell £2 of the said rate and arrears. The said M. Dumbell sold the ewes and lambs to two John M. King for 7/- for each ewe and lamb being 21/- for all and without giving the owner and notice of sale and contrary to his promise given to Peter King that he would not sell the sheep who relied on the faith of such promise, and left him and sought to borrow the money but on his return with it found the sheep disposed of as aforesaid and that the said M. Dumbell did retain the balance over and above 18/- in his hands until within the last month when he crossed that Michael King intended to lay the matter by complaint before the Board of Guardians, then and not then did M. Dumbell grant to the wife of Michael King 5/- of the money detained, and has withheld the over balance since.

2<sup>nd</sup> Charge. That on the said 25 of April 1851. the said M. Dumbell in his capacity of P. N. Collector did seize one ewe and three lambs the property of Peter Early and some few of the said building already alluded to and sold her for the sum of 5/- or 5/- and gave no credit for the price of same out of the said Rate and arrears of Rate of £2. 18. 5 notwithstanding that it was manifest to the said M. Dumbell that the said £2. 18. 5 was due of Early and not of the complainant.
