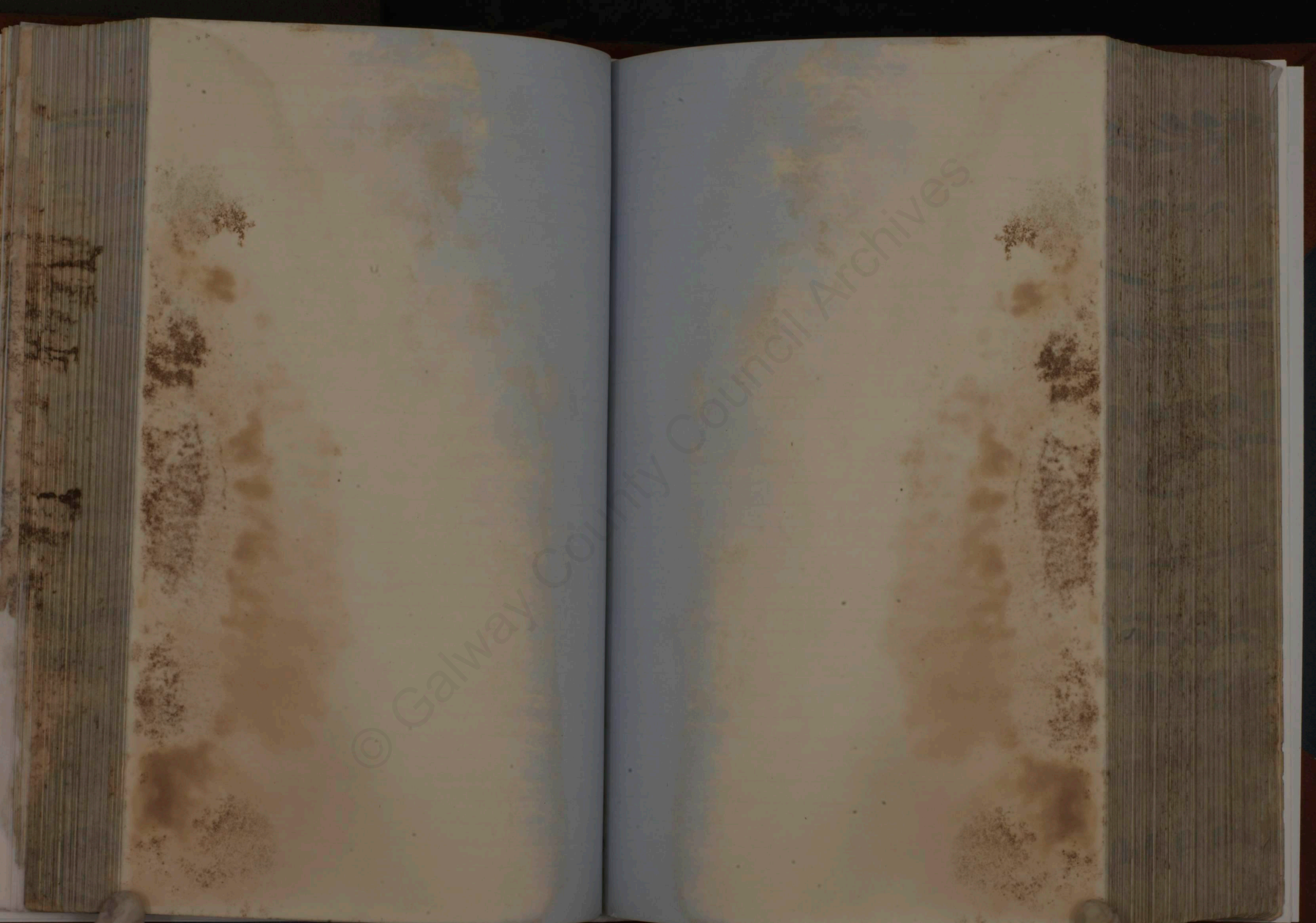

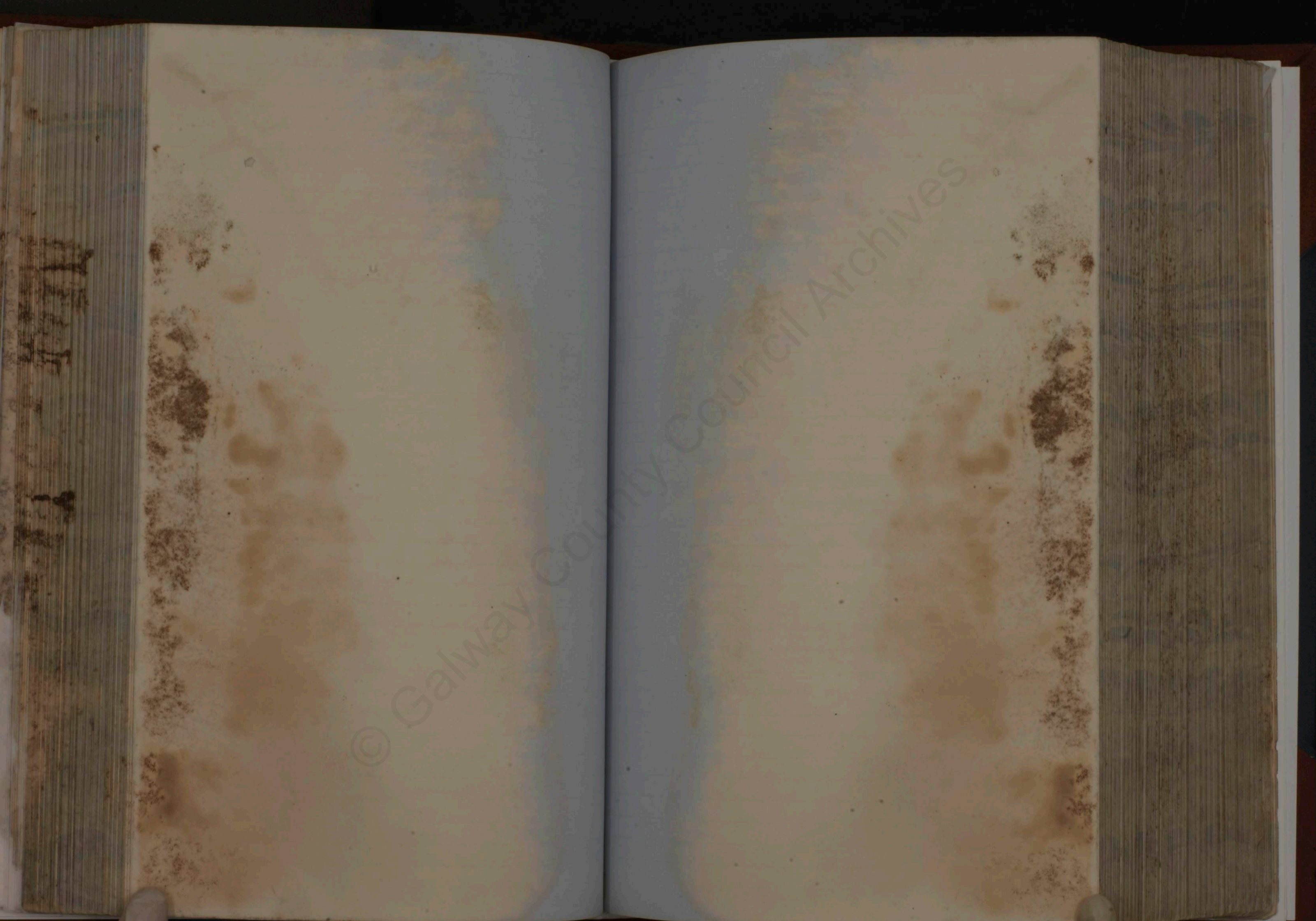

In reply to Commissioner's letter regarding the paper furnished with my explanation relative to charges of irregularity forwarded by Michael Lee -

I have the honor to inform you that the paper was given W-R Joyce in open day and with the intention on my part of laying the matter fully before you at the next meeting. the paper cut in my opinion was of some little value and if not disposed of would undoubtedly have rotted. If I have acted wrong in disposing of it without your express permission to do so I beg to say I am sorry. As regards the charge of W-Joyce being supplied with candles soap &c from Workhouse it is a gross and malicious falsehood. I never gave W-Joyce or any other person a particle of my private property - on reference to the paper which I have checked up I beg to say you will see manifestly it was impossible for W-Joyce to receive either of the articles mentioned

out of Workhouse. The consumption of candles is only 3lbs weekly, and that of soap 19lbs weekly. For a large establishment with 102 paupers and officers in the very lowest quantities that could be without detriment to the well conducting of the Workhouse. Permit me to assure you that if these articles were it was simply from an error of judgement and unintentional. I respectfully hope that you will be preparing together with my long service in the matter into consideration and it will be my anxious care to take most particular in matters of this kind.

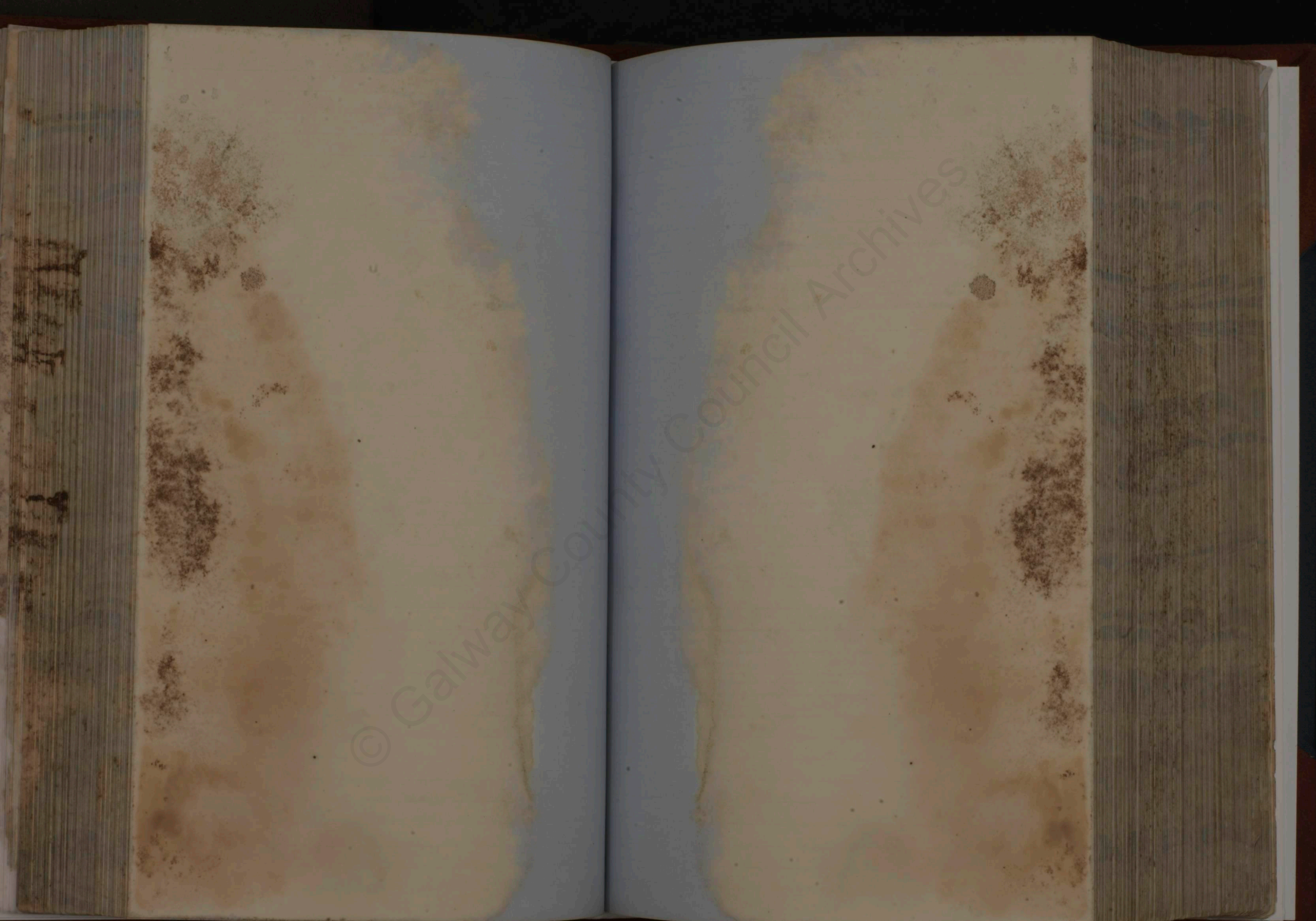
