



My attention has been called to the alteration in the diet recommended by the visiting committee - that meat should be ~~not~~ added to the soup, on certain days in the week, for the lampers generally, such as sheep heads, head and other coarse parts. It would render the soup more nutritive uncooked diminished in consequence the numbers on the Hospital Roofs, whereas there are six persons on the Hospital Roofs, it would enable them to enjoy a better Diet, than the House poor, the aged and infirm at the same time should be recommended that the aged and infirm do receive white bread and milk for breakfast in lieu of粥粥 and white bread and meat soup three or four times in the week for dinner and white bread and milk the remaining days, on the whole it would be advisable to allow meat in the soup for the lampers in the house, after the House generally on three or four days in the week - After 35 cases at present in Hospital 31 cases in the House sick and went direct to the Hospital.

I would also recommend the milk for those 4-5 & 6 for supper, as suggested in Poor Law Commissioners letter of 4th June
