I beg to report that by direction of Mr. Butler your solicitor attended in Dublin on Monday the 15th Inst with the several Union Books. Recensress Books &c from the opening of the year to 1855. they were open to and examined by Mr. Elliott on 15 & 16th Inst.

On Thursday the 17th the case was argued before C. G. Burke Esq Master of the Court upon whom the several Bills of costs paid Whalley, were found owing to his not crediting the Union with a sum of £91 paid him on account of his late Bills of Costs, and which sum was proved beyond a doubt by a document in Whalley's handwriting (allowing the Board credit for this sum) which unfortunately, disappeared amongst the waste papers of the office.

Was examined for a lengthened period into the state of the Union Works - the duties of Clerk of the several Workshops made throughout the Works by me

and the facts connected with the case generally, I answered the several questions satisfactorily, and told the Court that my instructions from the Board of Guardians were to give Mr. Colles every facility to establish his case from the Union Books, and that both Whalley and his Solicitor had examined the Books repeatedly.

Mr. Butler offered himself for examination with the view of corroborating several of my statements but the master stated he was perfectly satisfied with my testimony and that his ruling would be in accordance with the statements then made.

The Rule up above is that Whalley has been remiss about £60.

Subsequently I enquired from the Master if Mr. Colles could take any further proceedings in the matter, and was informed by him that an appeal might be made to a full court, the result of which would be that it would be again referred to him, and that his report should then be given now. It was further stated - it was unlikely that Mr. Colles would appeal, for in the event of his doing so the master would be obliged to adopt a course that would not be pleasant for Mr. Colles.

Gentlemen

Dear Sirs. To whom the claim against the Guardians was referred by the judge, to take an account of the sum due to the Plaintiff by the taxation of his costs and the credits to which you were entitled, and to strike a balance in favor of other party, to whom he should find such balance due. After a protracted and intricate inquiry made his decision and report that Plaintiff was overpaid; and cannot say amore righteous decision was never made by any judge or Arbitrator —

You may remember that Plaintiff by his writ of Summons claimed a sum of £ 769-3-6 over and above all credit. But when we put in our defense and claimed several sums which he omitted to give credit for. amongst them 2 sums of £ 70 & £ 20. he stated that those were applicable to other Costs, than those for which he sued (and subsequently in apprehension, actually swore to the same effect although

The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.

Should an account in his own handwriting contradicting that it was then suggested by the Court that Plaintiff should be allowed to furnish any additional claim that he had, and that his costs (including those to be furnished) should be referred to the master of the Court as already mentioned for taxation and account to which suggestion I agreed, and a consent order was made accordingly, under this when the Plaintiff furnished additional costs in which he included costs which had been incurred in 1849- and long since paid and settled for, and repudiated same by deposit with me, he dwelled up his claim to the sum of £ 1265-16-8 over and above all just credits (and the Plaintiff actually dwelt to the sum in April 1858, as being true and correct and these bills were so numerous, and referred by the master of the Court to two many taxing officers, and being made up without dates, one bill containing the same items under another head in a different place, and every bill containing items charged for masters and all containing items which had been long before paid and settled, that it was impossible at the time that Plaintiff took up to make up all the bills in the manner he did and took all his exertions and best energies to unravel those masters, to find out all those recharges and mischarges and to have them done and made in their conformity before the several taxing officers and bushels, before the master and thus when all were taxed and the whole of his costs amounting to £ 1573-16-8 were reduced to £ 501-0-0 whether the credit account can be taken. Stark credit for all was paid the Plaintiff on foot of a receipt. So we to finally unravel this intricacy, and thereby proved to the master that these entitled to do so by the production of the old costs, which had been settled with Plaintiff and pointed out clearly and distinctly, where the same costs had been charged over and over again, in those bills which had been now taxed and thus succeeded in maintaining the view that had taken up the case from the beginning, and intended you from being mulcted in several hundreds of pounds.

Of course the Plaintiff can, if he is so advised, take full issue against the Master's report, but if he does not fear the result —

Some of you no doubt had thought that I might have the Master sooner brought to account, but I was all through on the defensive. I could not prevail, did I scarce the Plaintiff the slightest delay, for he always anticipated his movements, and was ready whenever he chose to pounce on me and sometimes at very great inconvenience to myself, having to go up to Dublin frequently, for even meeting necessitating to enter the case to run me off, and in the end had the pleasure of being complimented by the Master.

I have to bear testimony to the great service rendered me by Mr. Mulke, your Clerk, all through this business, both by his prompt answers and the truly excellent demeanour observed by him at all times before the Master, and into which the Master himself referred in a very warm manner.
