


In answer to the above letter
we beg to state that notwithstanding Mr. Payne
is only a partial resident, and one other member
cannot write, there are eight members of the Board
Committee and that in all probability there will be
two other members in the Carra District at the next
election of Guardians - which will dispense the
necessity, if any existed, of appointing Wardens
with regard to the proposed establishment of a
Dispensary District at Farna and the fact of
Mr. Payne not traversing the District on his

way to Lettermore against that we have to
inform the Commissioners that there is a new
line of Road now completed, to the sea at
Moyra, which brings that place within three
quarters of an hour of Roundstone by Road.
We have also been informed by the relieving
officer that during the last year or so he has
to the District in question, he received not
a single application for relief.

The Guardians on reconsidering the
circumstances of the case would recommend
the establishment of the Carra District at present

wherein that the collectors be called upon to fulfil
their duty of attending weekly with their accounts
at the Workhouse. The Board will be satisfied
with a fortnightly attendance of the collectors at
Mr. S. District, and that the clerk submit
such accounts fortnightly to the Board at the
weekly meetings.

23 November 1859

Mr. Mather your solicitor attended in Dublin on
Monday the 15th inst with the several
Union Books. Treasurers books &c from the opening
of the union to 1855. they were open to and examined
by Mr. Mather on 15 & 16th inst.

On Thursday the 17th the case was
argued before O.G. Mather Esq. Master of the Court of Sessions
the several bills of costs paid Mr. Mather, were
not owing to his not crediting the union with a sum of £40
paid him on acc of his late bill of costs, and which payment
was proved beyond a doubt, by a document in Mr. Mather's
possession, allowing the Board credit for this sum, which
spontaneously discovered amongst the waste papers of the
Union.

It was examined for a lengthened period
into the state of the Union Books - the duties of the
several Clerks made through the Books by me

and the facts connected with the case generally - answered
the several questions, satisfactorily, and told the Court that
my instructions from the Board of Guardians were to
give Mr. Mather every facility to establish his case from
the Union Books, and that both Mr. Mather and his solicitor
had examined the Books repeatedly.

Mr. Mather offered himself for examination
with the view of corroborating several of my statements
but the Master stated he was perfectly satisfied with my
testimony and that his ruling would be in accordance
with the statements then made.

The Rule of Court is that Mr. Mather should
suspend about £60 -

Subsequently inquired from the
Master if Mr. Mather could take any further proceedings
in the matter, and was informed by him - that an appeal
might be made to a full Court, the result of which
would be that it would be again referred to me,
and that his report should be the same as it now is.
He further stated - it was unlikely that Mr. Mather
would appeal, for in the event of his doing so the
Master would be obliged to draft a course that
would not be pleasant for Mr. Mather.

Gentlemen

The Master after last afternoon Pleas. to whom the claim of the Plaintiff was referred to the judges. to take an account of the sum due to the Plaintiff by the taxation of his costs and the credits to which you were entitled. and to strike a balance in favor of either party. to whom he should find such balance due. has after a protracted and intricate inquiry made his decision and reports that Plaintiff was overpaid; and I must say a more righteous decision was never made by any Judge or Arbitrator —

You may remember that Plaintiff by his writ of summons. Claimed a sum of £769-3-6 over and above all credits. but when we put in our defence and claimed several sums which he omitted to give credit for. amongst them 2 sums of £70 & £20. he stated that those were applicable to other costs. than those for which he sued (and subsequently on appeal he actually swore to the same effect although

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

should an account in his own handwriting (contradicting that) if it were suggested by the Court that Plaintiff should be allowed to furnish any additional claim that he had. and that his costs (including those to be furnished) should be referred to the Master of the Court as already mentioned for taxation and account to which suggestion I assented. and a consent order was made accordingly. under this order the Plaintiff furnished additional costs in which he included costs which had been incurred in 1849 - and long since paid and settled for. and re-furnished same by degrees until he dwelled up his claim to the sum of £1265-16-6 over and above all past credits (and the Plaintiff actually swore to the same in April 1858. as being true and correct. and these bills were so numerous. and referred to by the Master of the Court to so many taxing officers. and being made up without dates. one bill containing the same items under another head in a different place. and every bill containing items charged for in others and all containing items which had been long before paid and settled. that it would require all the time that Plaintiff had to multiply and make up the costs in the manner he did and to exert all his exertions and best energies to unravel these mysteries. to find out all these recharges and mischarges. and to then have produced in their depositions before the several taxing officers and finally before the Master and then when all were taxed and the whole of his costs amounting to £1573-16-8 were reduced to £501-0-10 and when the Credit account came to be taken. I took credit for all debts paid the Plaintiff on foot of depositions. so as to finally unravel the intricacy. and thereby proved to the Master that I was entitled to do so by the production of the old bills which had been settled with Plaintiff and pointed out clearly and distinctly. where the same costs had been charged over and over again. by these bills which had been now taxed and thus succeeded in maintaining the view that I had taken of the case from the beginning. and prevented you from being mulcted in several hundreds of pounds

Of course the Plaintiff can if he is so advised appear to the full Court against the Master's report. but if he does not appear the result —

Some of you no doubt had thought that I might have the matter sooner brought to a close. but as I was all through on the defensive. I could not proceed, nor did I cause the Plaintiff the slightest delay, for I always anticipated his movements, and was ready whenever he chose to pop up and sometimes as you feel inconvenience to myself, having to pop up to Dublin especially for every meeting not wishing to interrupt the case to any one else, and in the end had the pleasure of being complimented by the Master —

I have to bear testimony to the great service rendered me by Mr. Burke, your clerk, all through this business. both by his prompt answers and the truly excellent demeanour observed by him at all times before the Master — and also which the Master himself referred to in a very warm manner.
