There are at present 23 cases of fever in the workhouse fever Hospital the greater number of these have been admitted from the Town of Clifton and neighbourhood and as fever seems disposed to spread no doubt there will be many new cases seeking admission.

It will be therefore necessary for the proper treatment of the pauper patients to have the Hospital in the most efficient state possible. It will be necessary to procure a proper supply of sheeting of which there is a short supply also all other necessaries such as straw bedding &c.
