The Clerk submitted Commissioners sealed order of 10th December 1862 with Comms letter No 25544 Dated 9th December 1862—Relative to appointment of medical officer for Islands of Enishboppin and Shurk

Resolved in reply to Commissioners letter. Also consider no properly qualified medical officer could be obtained to reside in the Island of Enishboppin for a less salary than £70 a year, there will be no emolument public or private beyond the mere salary. We propose to fix the salary at £70 and trust this arrangement will meet with the Commissioners sanction, with regard to the reduction of £20 a year on the salary of the present medical officer of the Clifden Dispensary District. We are of opinion it would not be a judicious step and that the present salary of £100 per an is only reasonable remuneration for the arduous duties he has to perform even relieved of the attendance on the Island of Rappin, he still has a most extensive District and the largest population of the three Dispensary Districts in this union which we look on as a sure test of the work to be performed, we therefore could not consistently reduce his salary below that of the other Districts. On reference to the Clifden Dispensary medical Register, we find the duties have much increased compared with former years. The Register for 1862 shows an increase of 4354 cases over the year 1861 even though not having the attendance of Rappin for the last six months, we also find that visiting

tickets for this year (1862) exceed
 by 144 cases those of the year 1861-
 we fear from the prospects before
 us that matters are not likely to
 improve therefore consider it would
 be unwise to reduce the stipend
 medical officers salary within the
 sum he now receives, we feel
 it is barely sufficient for the onerous
 duties he has to perform and can
 admit of no reduction. we find that
 even with the foregoing salaries the
 poundage for support of medical
 charities in the Dispensary
 District will be under that required
 for either the Kenyon or Roundstone
 Districts we trust the Commissioners
 will agree in the decision we have
