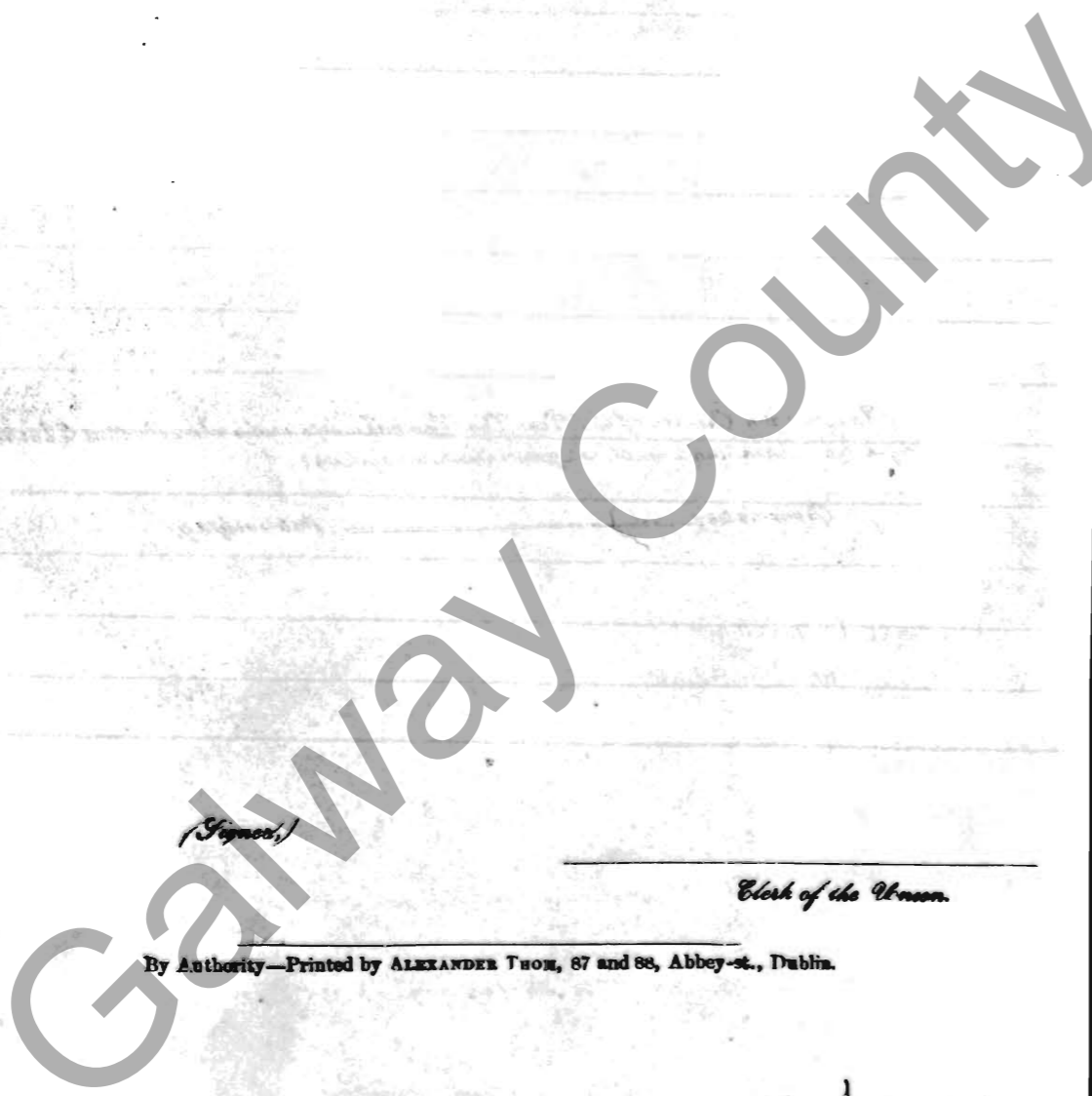

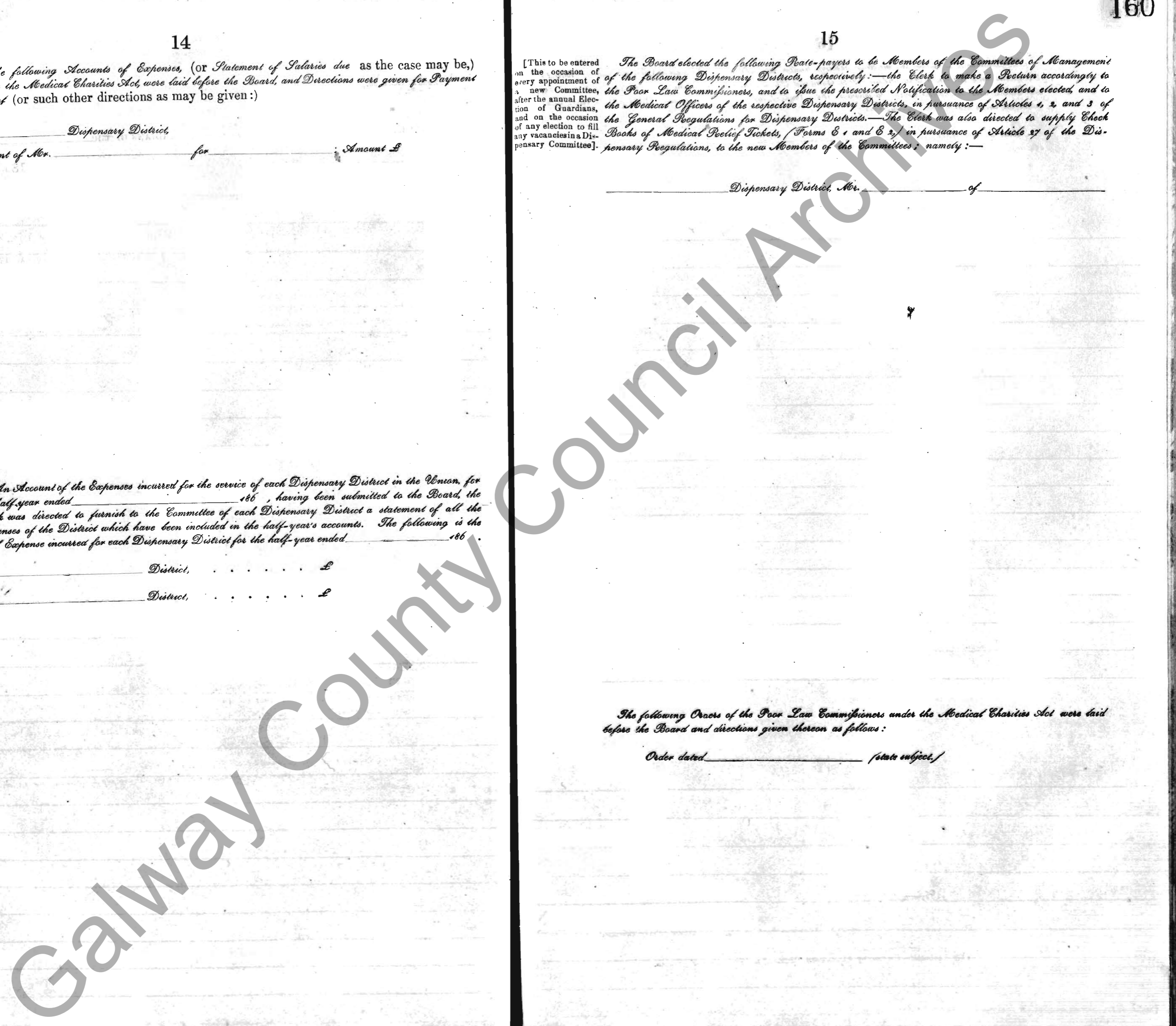

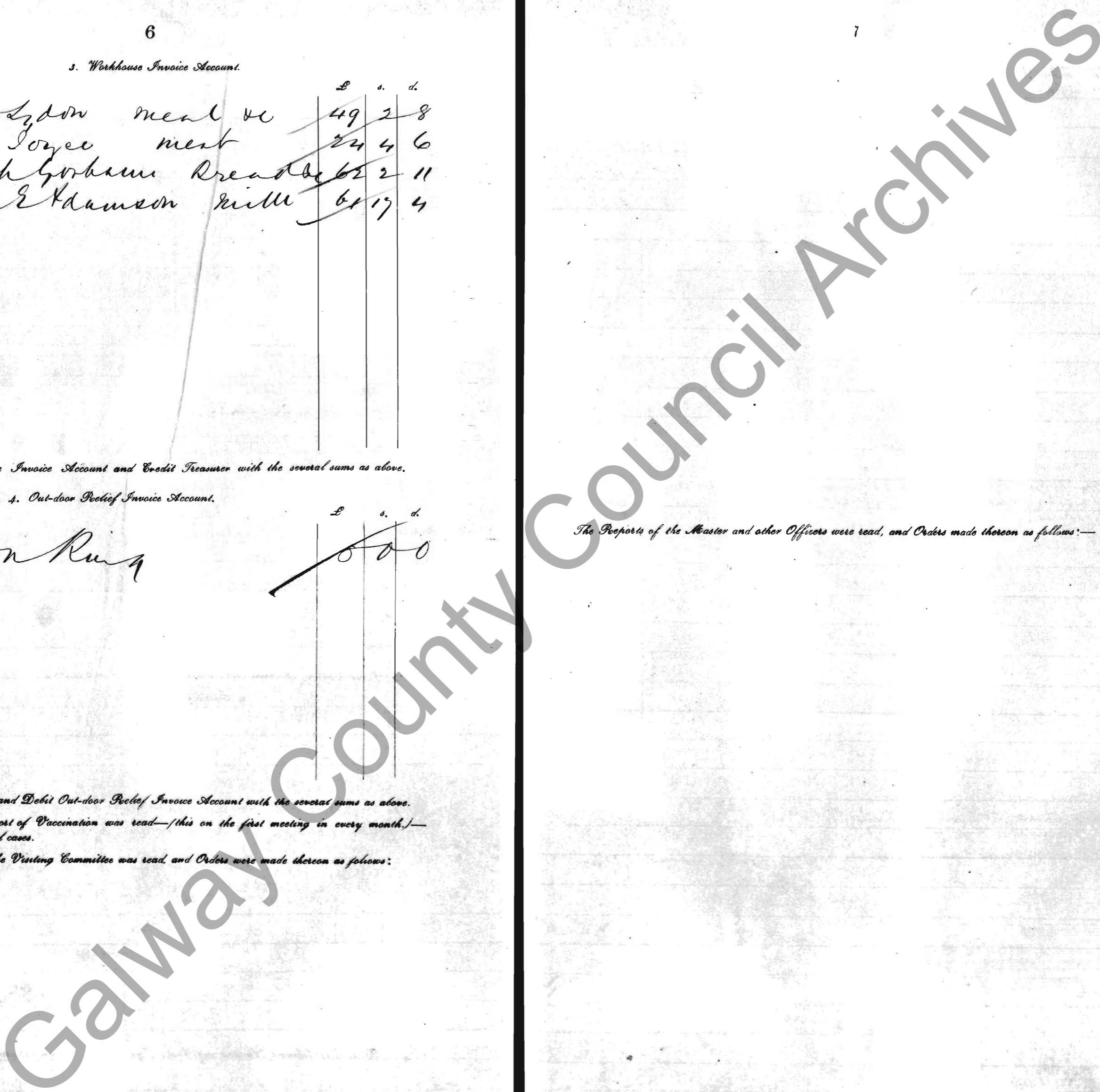

Under these circumstances, as I could no longer be of service, by the issue of tickets to the sick poor in this District. I considered it my duty to write a letter to the Commissioners for administering the laws for Relief of the poor in Ireland of which the following is a copy posted this day —

I regret much being obliged to act thus as I have now been a member of Rensy's Dispensary, Committee for years past during which time I trust that my exertions, having been an ex officio guardian for ^{13 or 14} some years past during which time I trust that my exertions have not been without benefit to the poor generally in said District.

My reasons for so doing, I have placed before the Clifden Board of Guardians in my letter of this date, trusting that attention will be given to the matter —

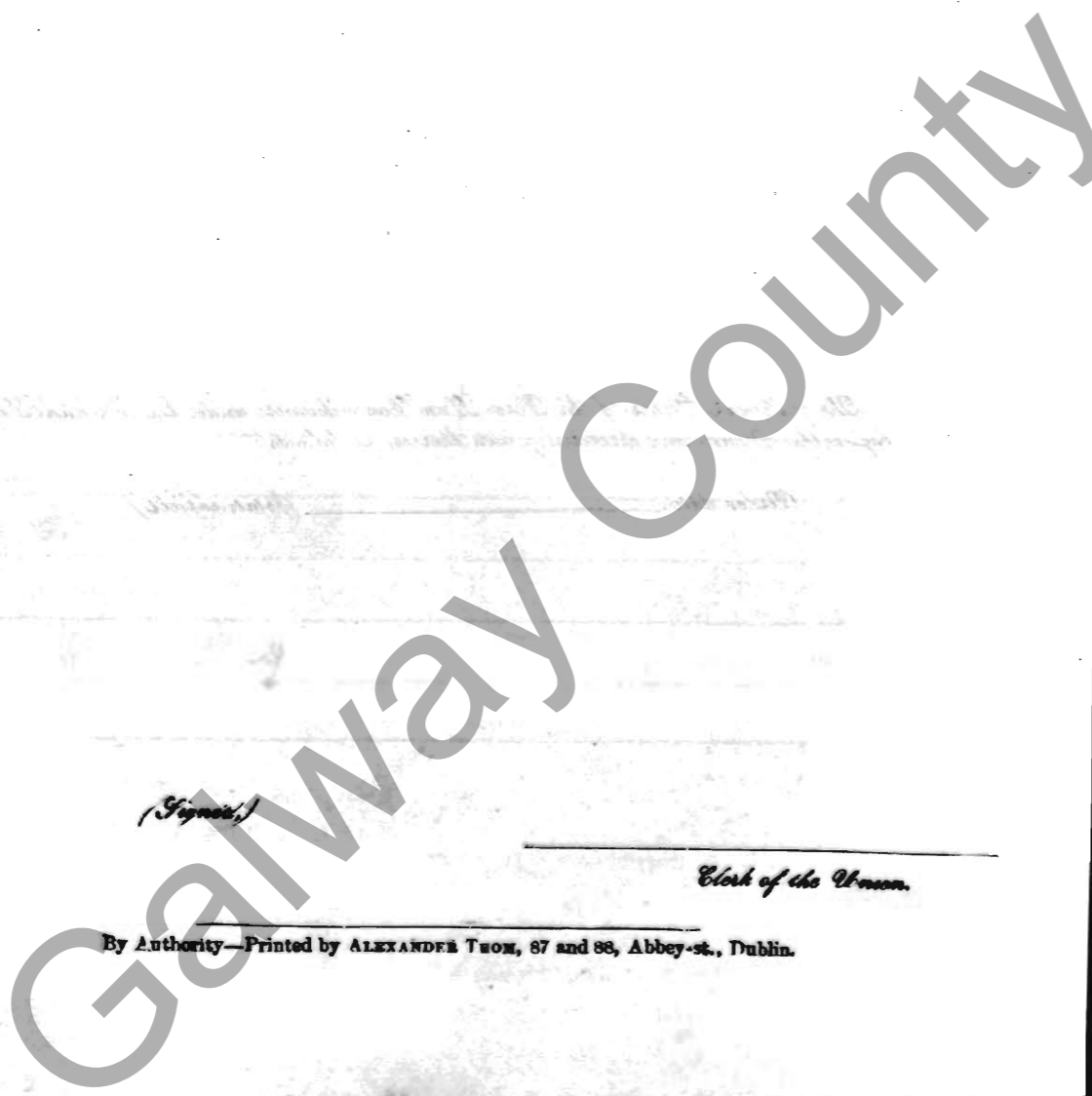
