

Gentlemen

I beg most sincerely and gratefully
to return you thanks for the kind and almost
unanimous vote made in my favor by your
granting me a Superannuation allowance
of £40 a year. I regret however to find that
same has not obtained the sanction of the
Law Commissioners. I did hope there would be
no difficulty as another medical officer of
union in Ireland obtained a Superannuation
allowance under what appears precisely similar
circumstances as my case. I am still in
hope if the Poor Law Commissioners are put
in possession of the actual facts they may
still be inclined to grant their approval
I presume that the difficulty is that I did
not devote "my whole time" to the duties
of my office, as to the other facts there
can be no question that for over 20
years I acted as medical officer to Clifton
Workhouse that I was forced to resign
from continued ill health broken down
in your service and that I am now rendered
helpless by disease and incapacitated from
making any exertion now as to my whole
time not being devoted to my workhouse
duties. It appears that I was appointed
as your Medical Officer in the year
1848 by a vacancy caused by the then
Medical officer having died from
Violent Typhus Fever which raged
in your workhouse. This was in the
midst

Midst of the famine years, and I now fearlessly assert that for many years after my appointment I did devote my "whole time" to the discharge of my workhouse duties. Not only in attending to the sick and dying, but also in assisting to procure food and other necessaries for the pauper inmates. I have frequently been engaged at your workhouse from an early hour in the morning until 10, 11 & 12 o'clock at night and when Cholera and Typhus have prevailed I scarcely obtained time to eat my meals. I had the workhouse, a fever and Cholera Hospital in Clifton five Auxiliary Workhouses in different localities. Under my care one of them at Dunraven a distance of eight Miles from Clifton. I need not tell you to do justice to all these. I must

have devoted my "whole time" to my workhouse duties. So far did this reach that during the years I allude to - The Board of Health then existing in Dublin was obliged to send down two Medical Men from Dublin to take charge of my Dispensary duties as I was unable to meet them my whole time being taken up in the discharge of my workhouse duties - these facts cannot be forgotten by the Vice Guardians - the several Messrs and there are even some Guardians of those days living who can confirm my statement. Hyacinth Darcy Esq. now the Rev. H. Darcy, was for many years the Chairman of the Board and took an active part in the management of the union. He can tell whether for many years I did or did not give my "whole time" to the duties of my office as workhouse Medical officer. of late years fortunately destitution has not been so pressing but I respectfully submit that I should be in all fairness get credit for what I did do, and I therefore most respectfully urge my claim for what you almost unanimously declared me entitled to I did hope that a Katepays in this Union could not be found to remonstrate against the granting to me the small pittance of £40 a year (the highest however the law permitted) and for which I feel very grateful, after 27 years active service in your Union my health broken and constitution shattered and myself

reduced to what I must ever feel a
 sad & melancholy state without a ray
 of hope that I may yet with Gods blessing
 be somewhat restored, and this brought
 about by fatigue and overexertion, constant
 exposure to wet and cold during 27
 years active service. I feel I ever
 endeavoured however feebly to discharge
 my onerous duties honestly and conscientiously
 and that I now lost an opportunity so
 far as my humble services reached to
 relieve destitution and want and which
 I am proud today has not been over-
 looked or forgotten, as evidenced by
 your almost unanimous vote in my
 favor and which I again repeat, I shall
 ever feel deeply grateful for leaving
 my case further to your ^{kind} consideration
