been but two very mild cases of inflammatory aphthalmia for the past year in the Workhouse one occurring in a boy of 15 years old who lost his right eye when he was 5 years old by a bad accident and during his illness consequent upon it the other eye suffered from inflammation and has since been subject to inflammatory attacks periodically.
