Gentlemen

It gives me much pleasure to  
be able to report that there has not  
been a single death amongst the  
class named in the Commissioners  
Circular (children from 5 to 15)  
during the past year - there has

been but two very mild cases of inflammatory ophthalmia for the past year in the workhouse. One occurring in a boy of 15 years old who lost his right eye when he was 5 years old by a bad accident and during his illness consequent upon it the other eye suffered from inflammation and has since been subject to inflammatory attacks periodically.

I am glad to say that the sanitary state of your workhouse is such at present that there is no fear of any infectious disease, as a rule when children are admitted to the workhouse their general health very fast improves nor can it be otherwise when the contrast between their damp & leaky cabins and our well ventilated wards are considered.
