I In the last eighteen months, I often proposed to myself to trouble you with a statement of the deplorable condition of the population of these Islands, namely Baffin & Shark for want of medical advice and attendance

when I came here I perceived you were anxious to have a medical officer appointed but was sorry to see the Committee had not approve of your selection waited them expecting that some charitable member would move for the appointment of a M<sup>o</sup> officer for a population of more than 1100 individuals.

During the period I am here I have met with many cases in the discharge of my duty where life depended upon medical treatment. At present there are a great many children ill in the Island and if an epidemic broke out the consequence would be frightful. There are a great many children in the Islands that have not been vaccinated.

In behalf of the Islanders I hope that in Justice and charity your Board will not neglect them in future and give them the blessing of a medical officer.
