In accordance with a telegram received from the clerk of the Union I visited the Island of Arrischoffin on the 19th inst. There have been 8 cases of Fever one of which proved fatal since my last visit of the remaining 7 there are two in a convalescent state - they are all receiving outdoor relief and it will require to be continued for some time longer.

The sanitary state of the East quarter is much improved since my last visit but that of the West is in the same state. Large manure heaps up to the doors, and there is a large pond in the centre of this quarter into which all the refuse matter of this part of the Island has been put for years past. An opening should be made from the sea into this pond so that it may be dried up -

It would be most desirable that some kind of a temporary

Hospital be erected at once to receive all the Fever Cases and that the nurse be continued to care them during the present epidemic

Ordered that the Relieving at once summon all parties for not removing manure heaps from their Houses and also throwing soil near their Houses - and that Dr Brodie the temporary medical officer be requested to visit Miskoppin and to provide a temporary Hospital for those who are in fever and also a nurse at 10^s or 12^s per week and that he attend on the Island one week until the present medical officer is able to resume his duties

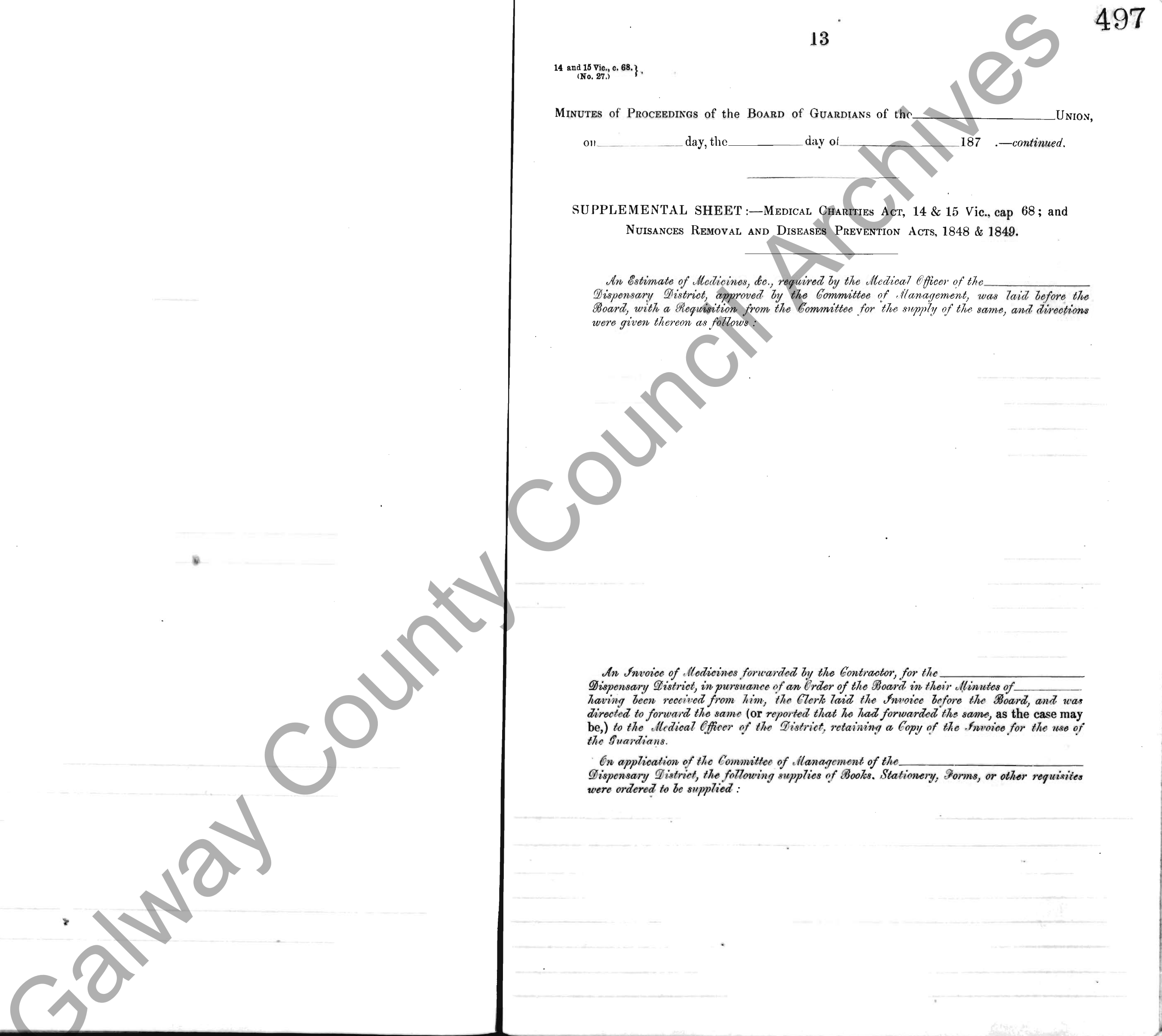

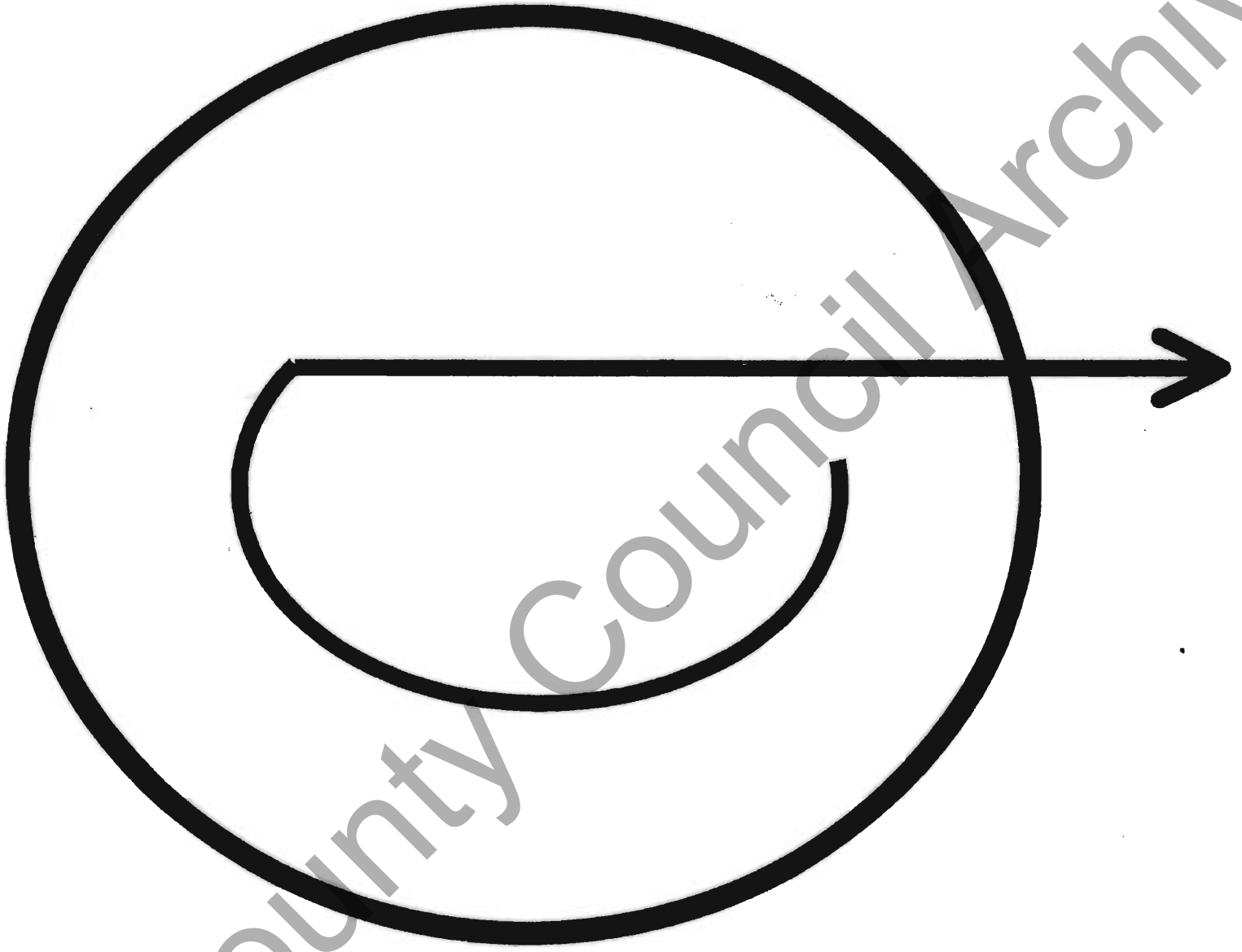
