Gentlemen

In compliance with the Local Gov Board
order. I beg to offer the following explanation
in connexion with the charge preferred against
me by Mr Kendall - as reported in the
visiting committee book. I have to state
that on the date that gentleman visited
the House - the Matron and had been for
some time previous confined to her bed from
sickness and is now on sick leave. On
the date in question I ordered five women
to scrub the floors of the male sleeping
Dormitories and placed 1 of them aged 60 years
in charge and with one exception all the
women sent to perform that work were over
50 years of age -

With reference to the filthy state of the
Female water closets. I have to state that
the closet accommodation in the female
parts of this House is altogether inadequate
for the requirements of the inmates. a fact that
I called the attention of the Board to some
years ago. and of which their attention
was also drawn by Mr Rowke L.J. in
one of his reports -

I have also to state that there is no supply of water for drinking purposes in either the male or female yards and from this fact alone it is almost impossible to keep a strict classification -

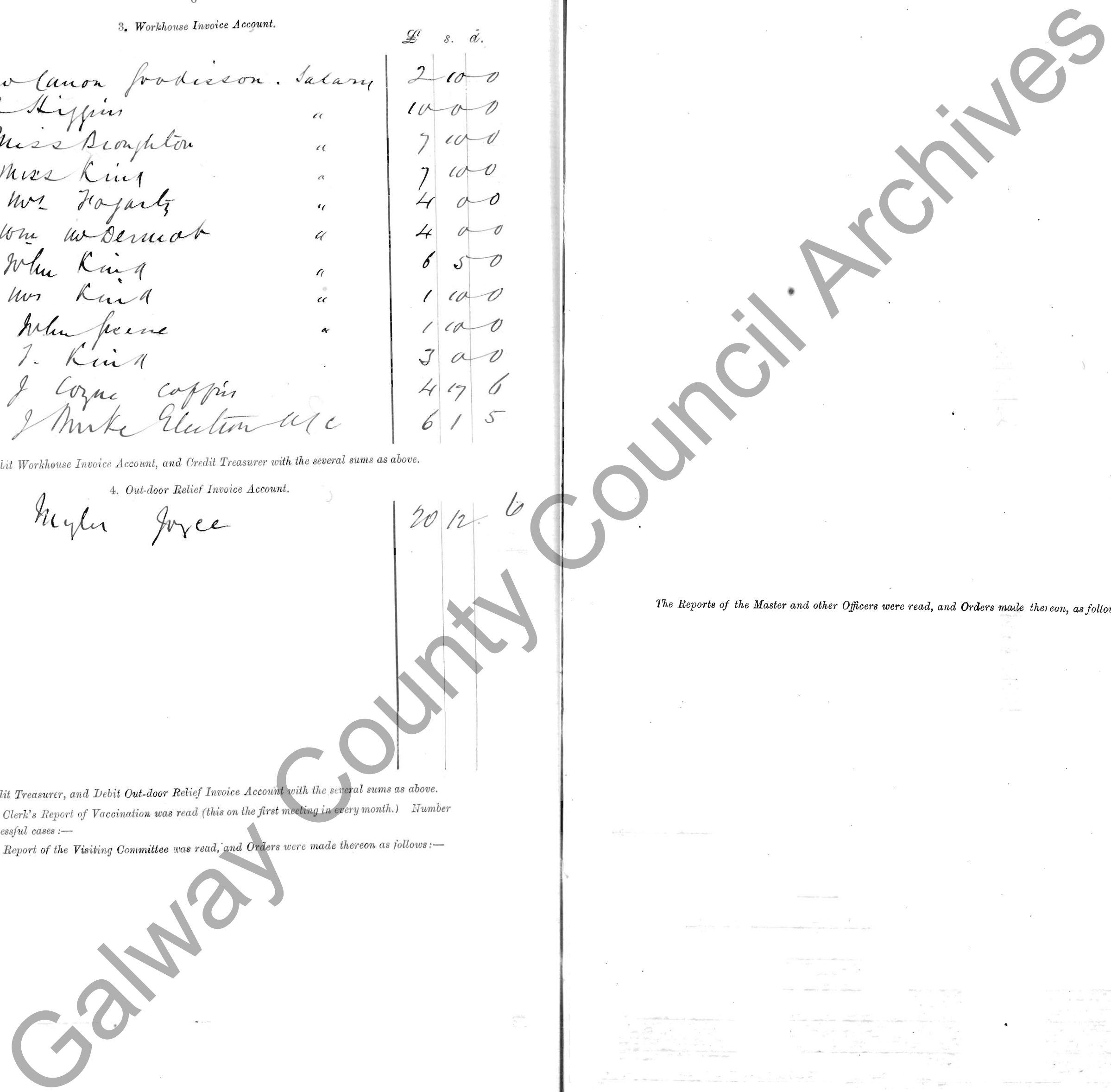

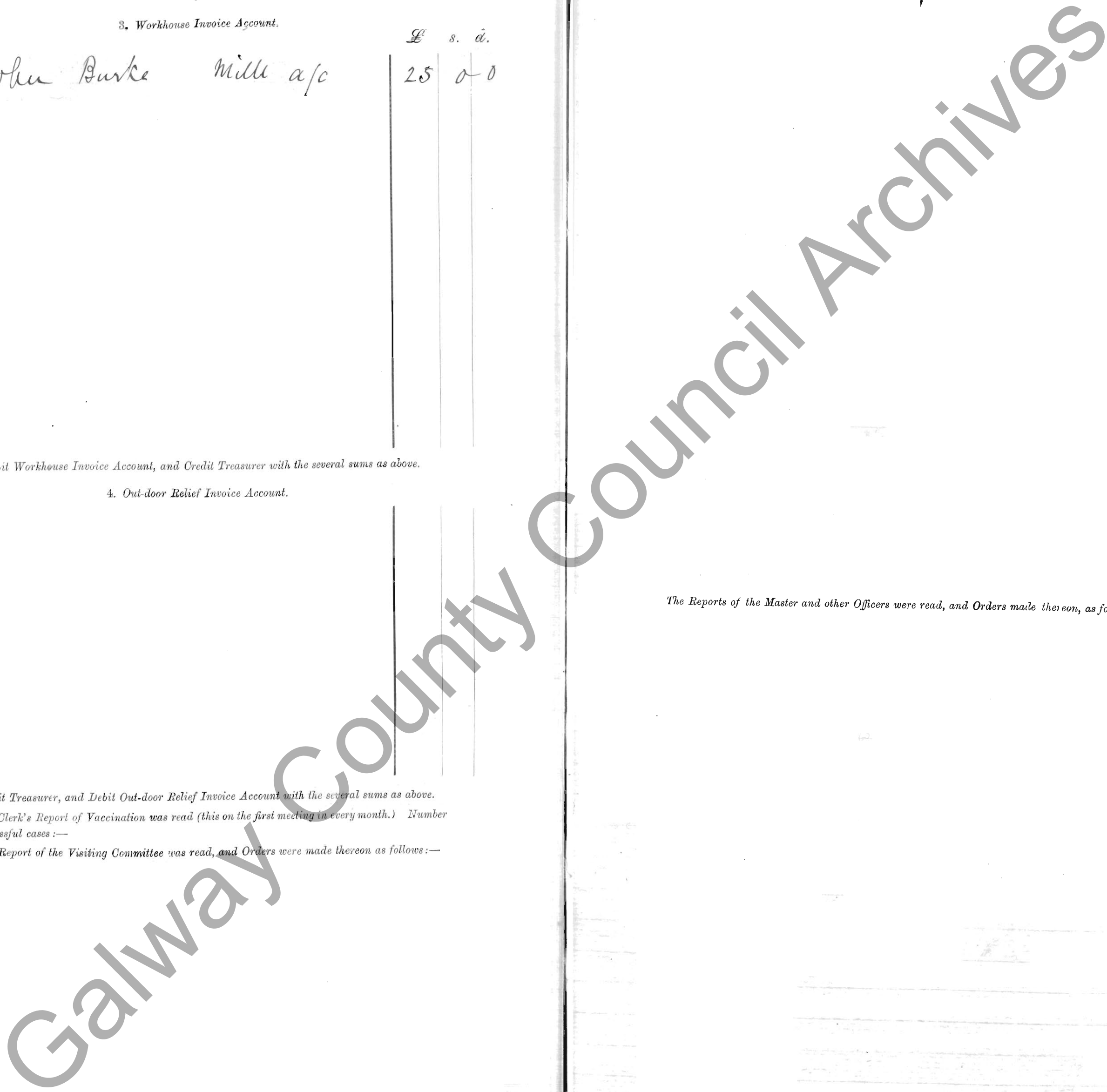
