In reply I beg to state that the Guardians regret they are at present in such straightened circumstances, owing to the embarrassed financial state of the Union having as I might say a mill stone around its neck, a debt of £4,666 against its Divisions of £2,822 being due to small and needy shopkeepers for medicine supplied by them under the Relief of Distress Act 1886. Some of whom are on the brink of ruin owing to the Guardians inability to pay.

The Guardians are however most anxious to pay as far as possible and with this view they desire me to state that notwithstanding that there are no funds at present available but as the acc. is rather a complicated one they are most desirous to discharge as far as possible their liabilities and for this purpose and in order to avoid complications they are prepared to pay a sum of £300 in full discharge of the old acc together with a sum of £115:16:7 for medicines supplied for past half year.

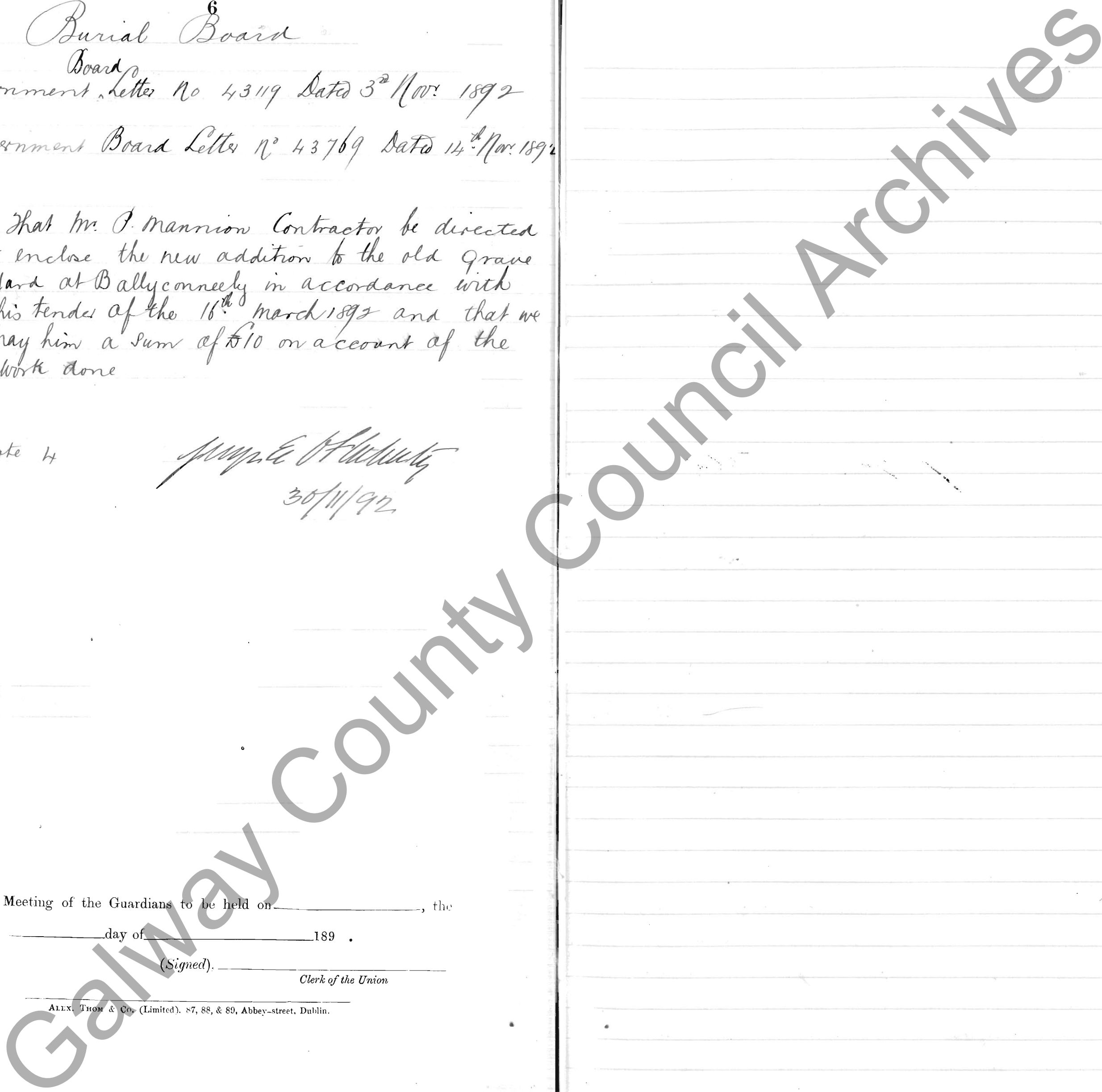

The proposal made by the Guardians was placed before our Directors yesterday, and I am instructed to say, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the case, they agree to accept the offer of £415.16.7 in full discharge of our account against the Union up to 30th Sept. last. As this will entail a very considerable loss to us, apart from the Interest on the old account, we must stipulate that the amount named be paid to us forthwith, say within 14 days from this date

Resolved - We the Clifden Board of Guardians feel it is our imperative duty to call the attention of the Government to the very reprehensible delay on the part of the Midland Great Western Railway Co in not carrying out their undertaking with regard to the construction of the Galway and Clifden Railway. The Company were bound to have the line open for traffic on the traders and merchants made their arrangements accordingly. The owners of vessels now carrying supplies to Clifden made arrangements for disposal of them when the line would be open. The specified time for the completion of the work has nearly expired and one half the work is not done, and there is

not at present and has not been for several months as single man at work in the Clifden District where it was expected much employment would be given. During the last summer we have had innumerable tramps chargeable on the rates in consequence. We respectfully ask the Secretary to see that the works in the Clifden District be carried on without further delay. The tax payers gave the money we should have the benefit

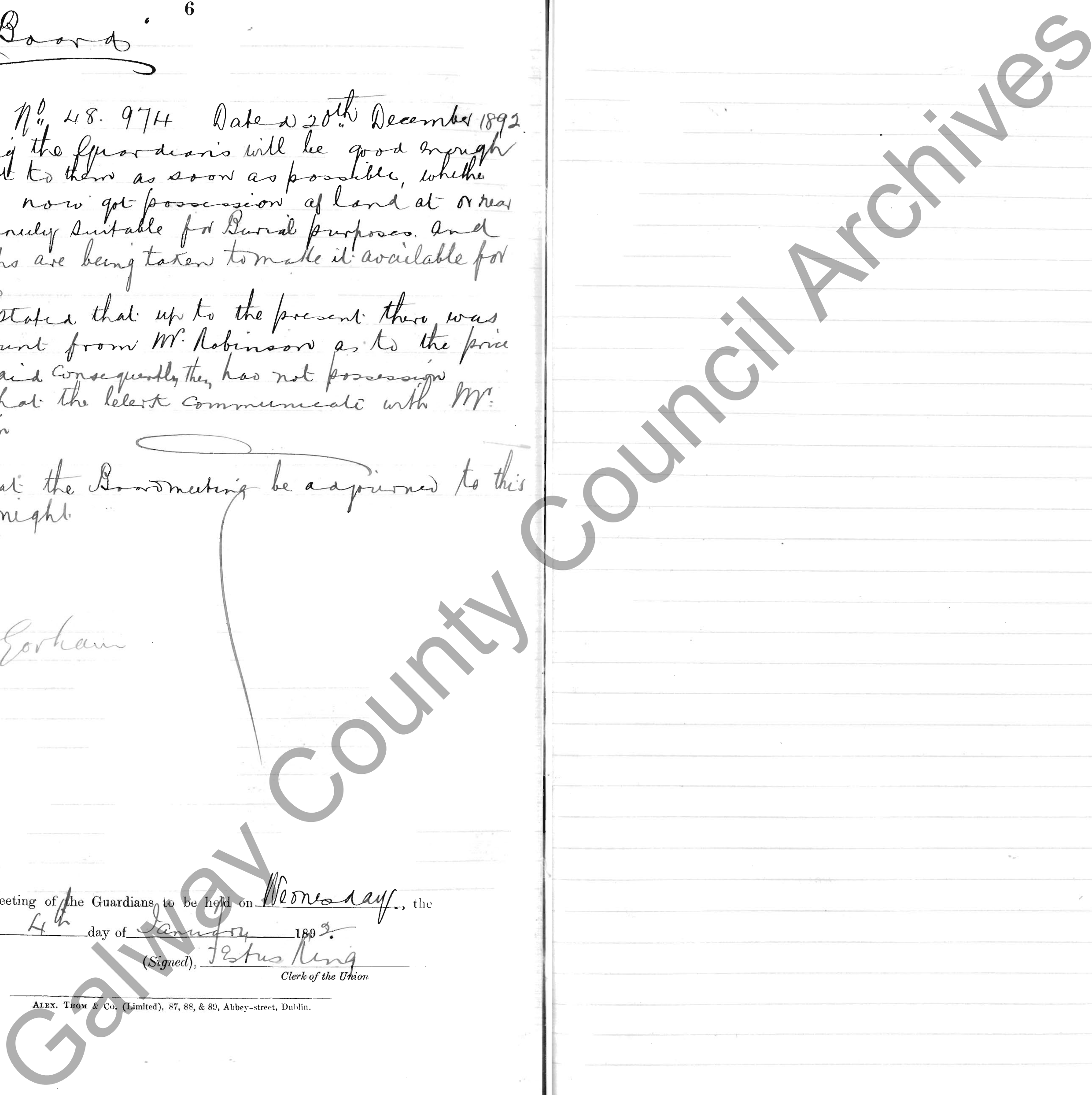

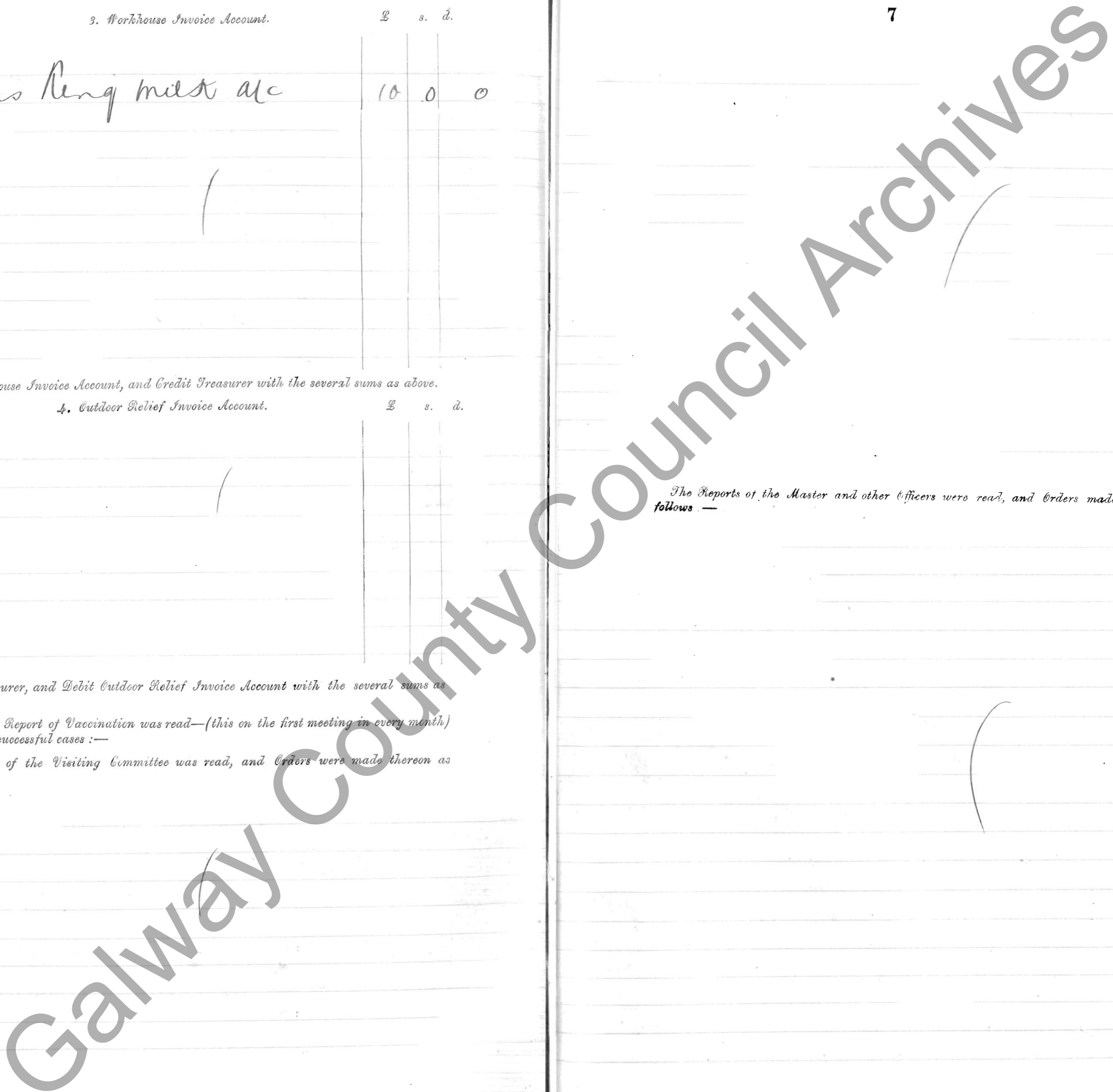
