Gentlemen

I beg to state that I visited the proposed new grave yard at Ballyconnely with a view to ascertain if any portion of said ground would be found suitable for burial purposes.

In order that you might understand the position of affairs, I have to state that this portion of land is a continuation of the old cemetery which is to be immediately closed.

I have caused the ground to be opened in several places in order to test its depth.

No 1. I opened ground large enough and deep enough to contain a full sized coffin

No 2. I failed in making an opening owing to the ground being of a rocky nature

No 3. Opened another one of sufficient depth near West boundary wall

No 4. Could only find 18 inches of soil

No 5. All along West boundary wall interments can take place

No 6. Same applies to East boundary wall

Every line of this important letter deserves the anxious consideration of the Board. The Rewriter is the Curate in charge of the district whose people are to utilize this proposed extension of the Ballyconnely graveyard for burial-purposes. In the light of the condemnation of this same plot by the Local Government Board Inspector Dr Thomas Hamilton Burke after sworn Inquiry, investigation on the ground itself, any further approbation ought to be taken with very great caution. It is particularly notable that Father Flatley takes care to indicate in his letter that any portion, however small, of this proposed extension of the Ballyconnely burial-ground cannot have the possibility of having a boundary wall safe not alone from mere injury, but from total destruction by the first high tide. Thus in the selection of this place for burial-purposes, ^{the Guardians} would incur the responsibility of having the coffins and corpses floating on the tide after a storm.

The ratepayers have a right, and the poor whose humanity is shared in by them, have a right to demand that the Guardians will not select this indefensible place to be the people's burial-ground.
