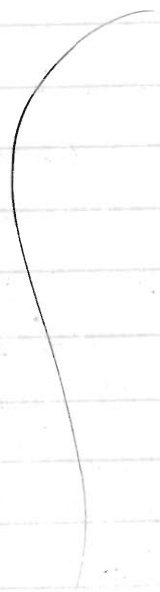

Gentlemen  
With regard to the letter forwarded to you from Local Gov. Board which was transmitted to that Department by Mr. Harry McDonnell a member of your Board, complaining of the manner in which I administer outdoor relief to Mrs. McDonnell of Bleggan I beg to offer the following explanation for the information of the Local Government Board.

Application was made to me for outdoor relief in the case last April. I proceeded to a small Hut at the Quay of Bleggan where I found her lying ill and very destitute, and accordingly I gave her out some relief for three weeks, until she got better and was able to go to her Daughters House.

It is not true as stated by Mr. McDonnell that he

bought her interest in a farm of land and gave her £60 for it, as this old woman had no land for many years. She being now 90 years of age, — It is also untrue to state that one of her sons receives 15/- a week, the wages they receive are as follows: — one of them 8/- a week the other 10/- both of them are married having their own families — Hoping gentlemen this will be found satisfactory.

I beg to report to you, as Sanitary Authority, that owing to the continued drought, and at the request of several of the inhabitants in this District, I have inspected almost all the wells and water streams in the neighbourhood of Roundstone, and that I found them in a dried up and stagnant condition. They are not capable of supplying a sufficiency of water to the people, and whatever small amount of water remains in some of them, lies only a few inches from a foul and muddy bottom, beneath. I beg to state that if they are not remedied soon, there is every likelihood of an Epidemic of Typhoid Fever springing up in the District and as the inhabitants are at present using any water they can obtain from the wells, even in this condition, and I recommend that the old well near the forge here, be cleaned, and a pump erected on this site, or the sinking of a new well in the vicinity, with the object of supplying a constant run of pure water to the people.
