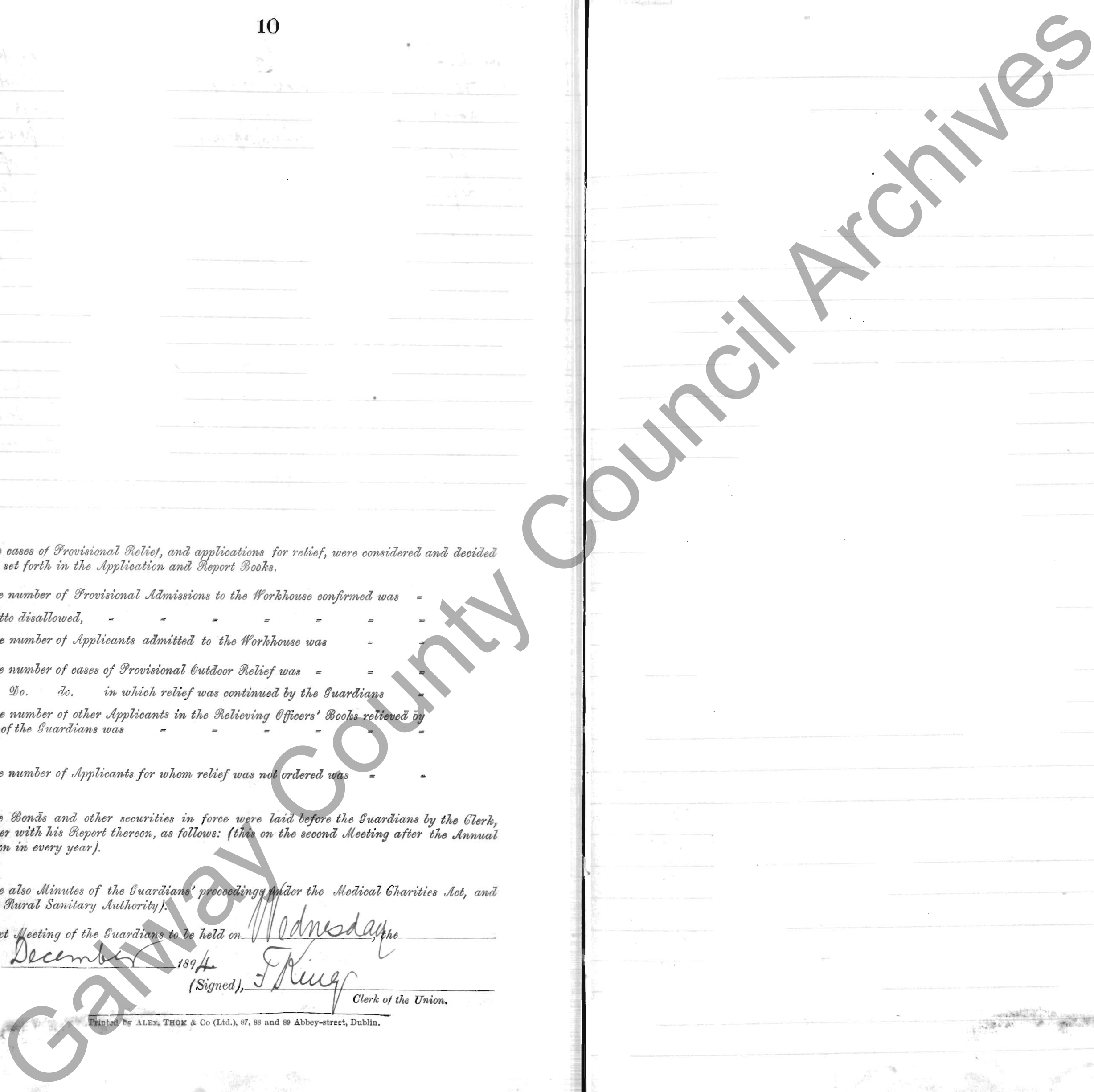

Resolved. The Board of Guardians the Sanitary Authority of this Union at their meeting today have received a Communication from the Board of works to the effect that they would not advance the Loan £1600 recommended by the Local Government Board for the purpose of constructing the waterworks at Clippen. The Local Gov. Board are aware of the fact that in consequence of the reports of their medical Inspector D. Clements as well as the reports of the local medical officers of health that the polluted state of the water for the supply of the people of Clippen Endangers the health in fact the lives of the inhabitants. Also the fact that the inhabitants of the town have sent a strong Memorial on the subject, this Board took immediate action and have left nothing undone on its part. The Local Gov. Board are aware of the

difficulties that had to be overcome in making our title to the required locality— Now when the Local Gov. Board are satisfied, all the necessary deeds executed and registered, the loan is refused on the grounds that previous loans have not been met in a satisfactory manner.

This Union appears to be indebted about £500. balance of a seed rate loan in the year 1880 on foot of which there are presently due by the persons to whom the seed was sold a sum of £2,400 and the Guardians supposed that this balance would not be called for.

The proportion of charge of this ^{balance} area of loan to the Clifton Division the area of charge being the present loan being nominal, and considering the very pressing circumstances (the health in fact) the lives of a large population at stake we most earnestly request the Local Gov Board to press on the Board of works the absolute necessity of granting the loan. This Board firmly believe the Waterworks will repay the outlay continually.

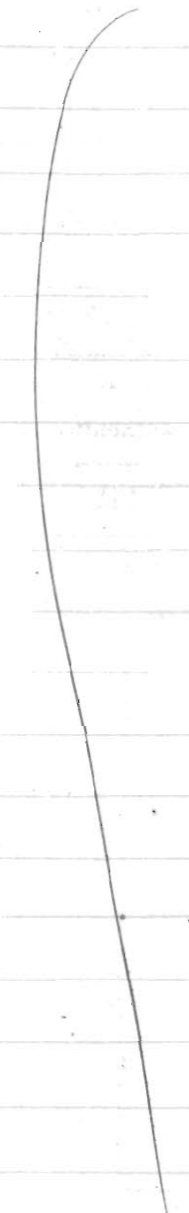
