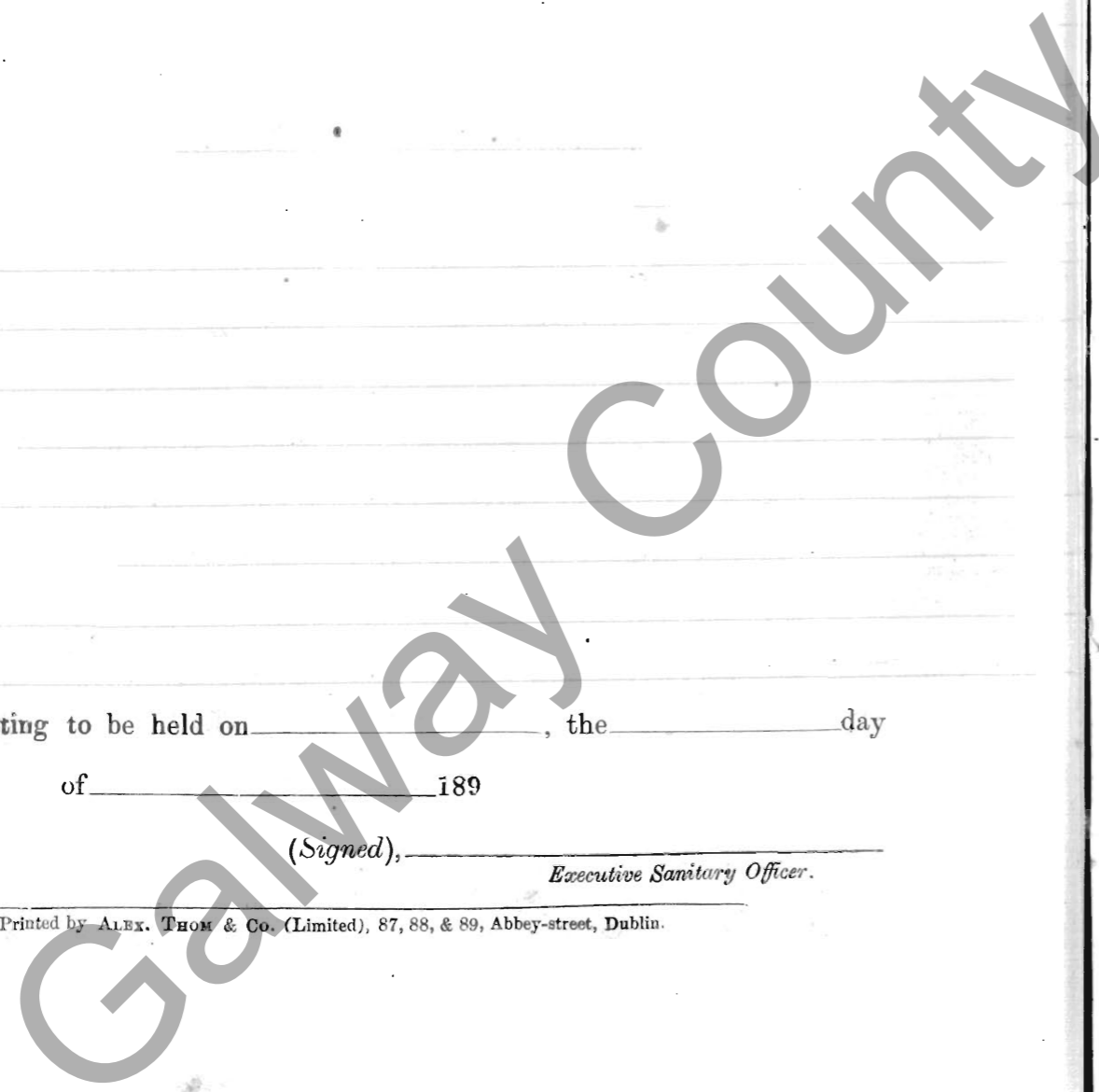

and the construction of roads through the Islands of Innisturk and Innisturket might with great advantage be immediately started — In the divisions of Bunowen, Selbina, Dooloughan and Clifden, where works have already been promised it is unnecessary to say more than that the works should at once be started, if the Government seriously intends to grapple with the distress.

From the extensive number of applications for and the large number of persons at present on outdoor relief, the Guardians feel that they must abandon the responsibility of saving the people unless the Government at once come to their assistance.

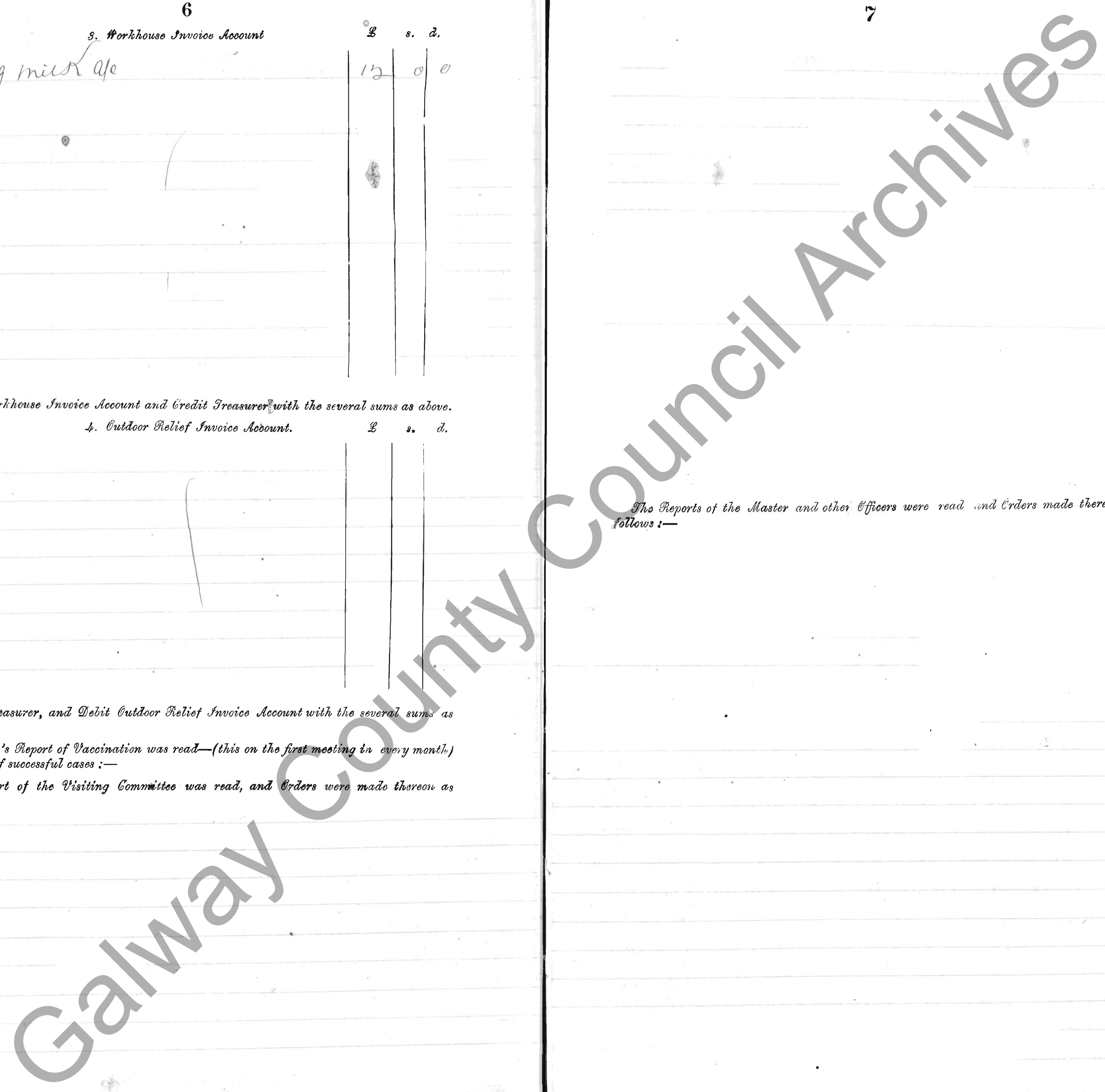

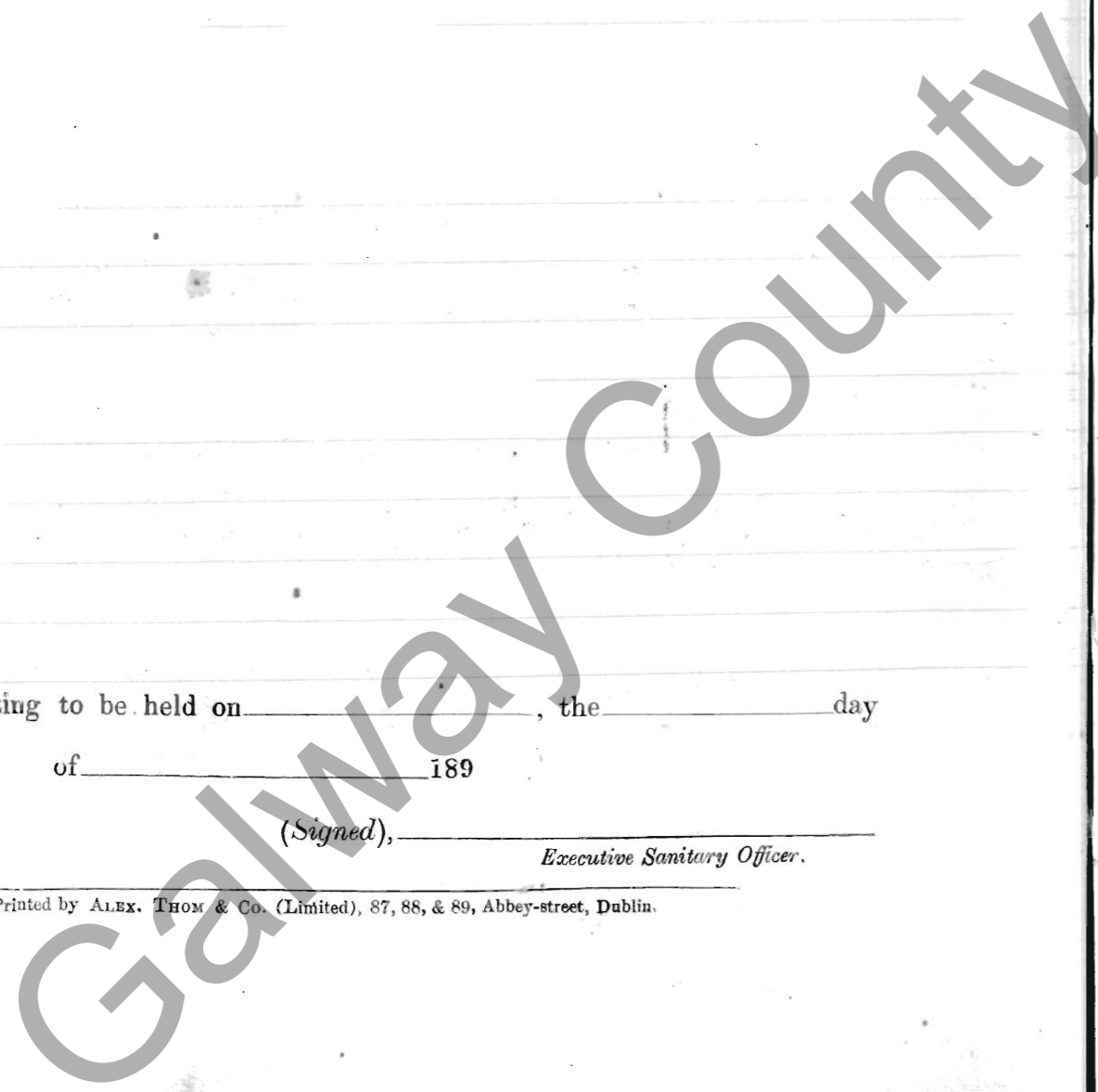
