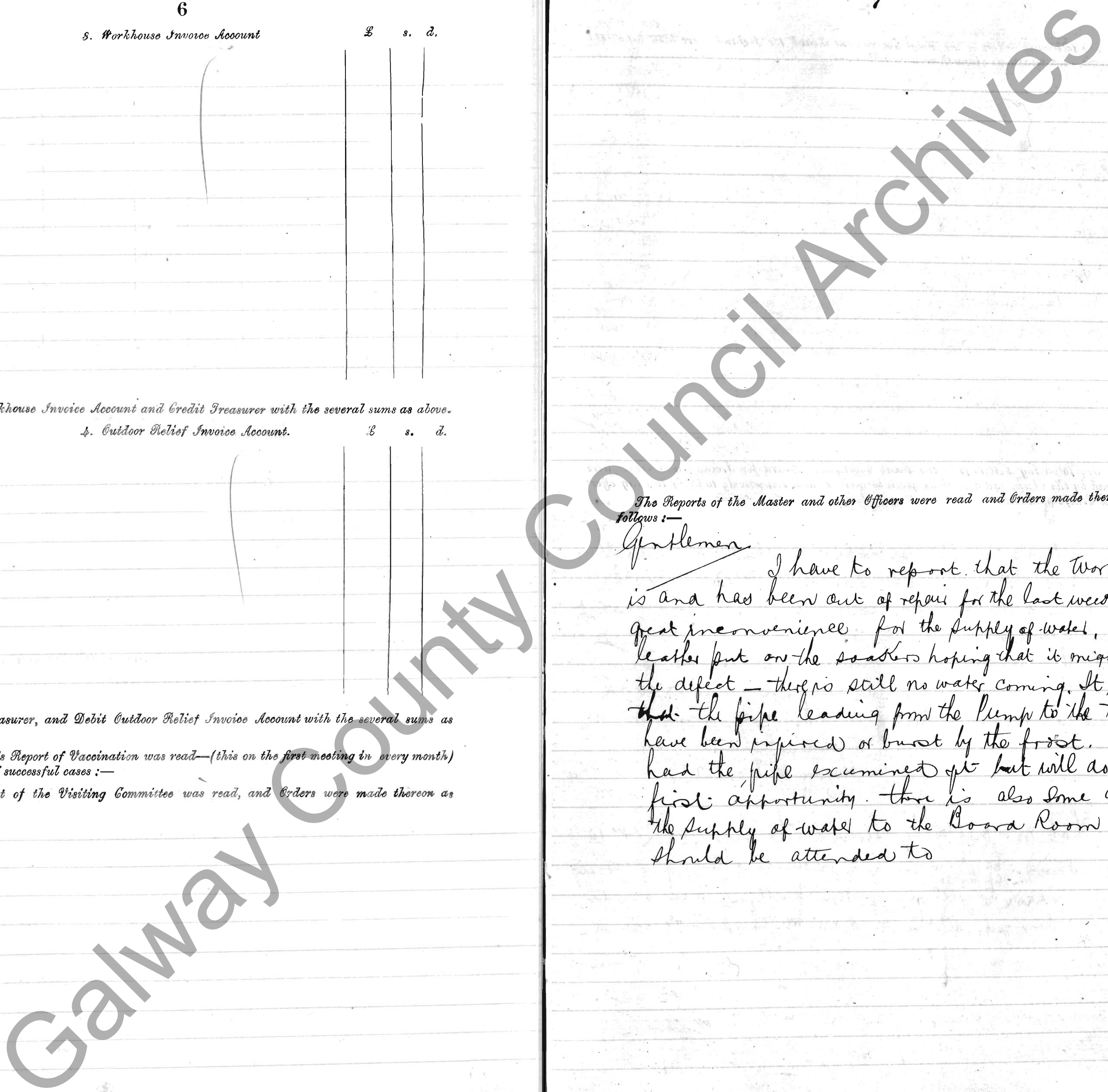

Gentlemen

I beg to report that I visited on yesterday 12th instant a family at Derryquinla named Mullhoom. There are altogether 12 inmates. Seven of whom are very ill; three youths dangerously so. I at first feared they suffered from Typhus Fever, but have not yet observed any distinctive symptom of Typhus. I should rather call the disease a very malignant form of Influenza. The patients cannot be removed to Hospital, I believe the father is destitute; the family require substantial relief to the amount of at least 10/- per week during this illness. I would suggest you would direct the Relieving office to see to the wants of

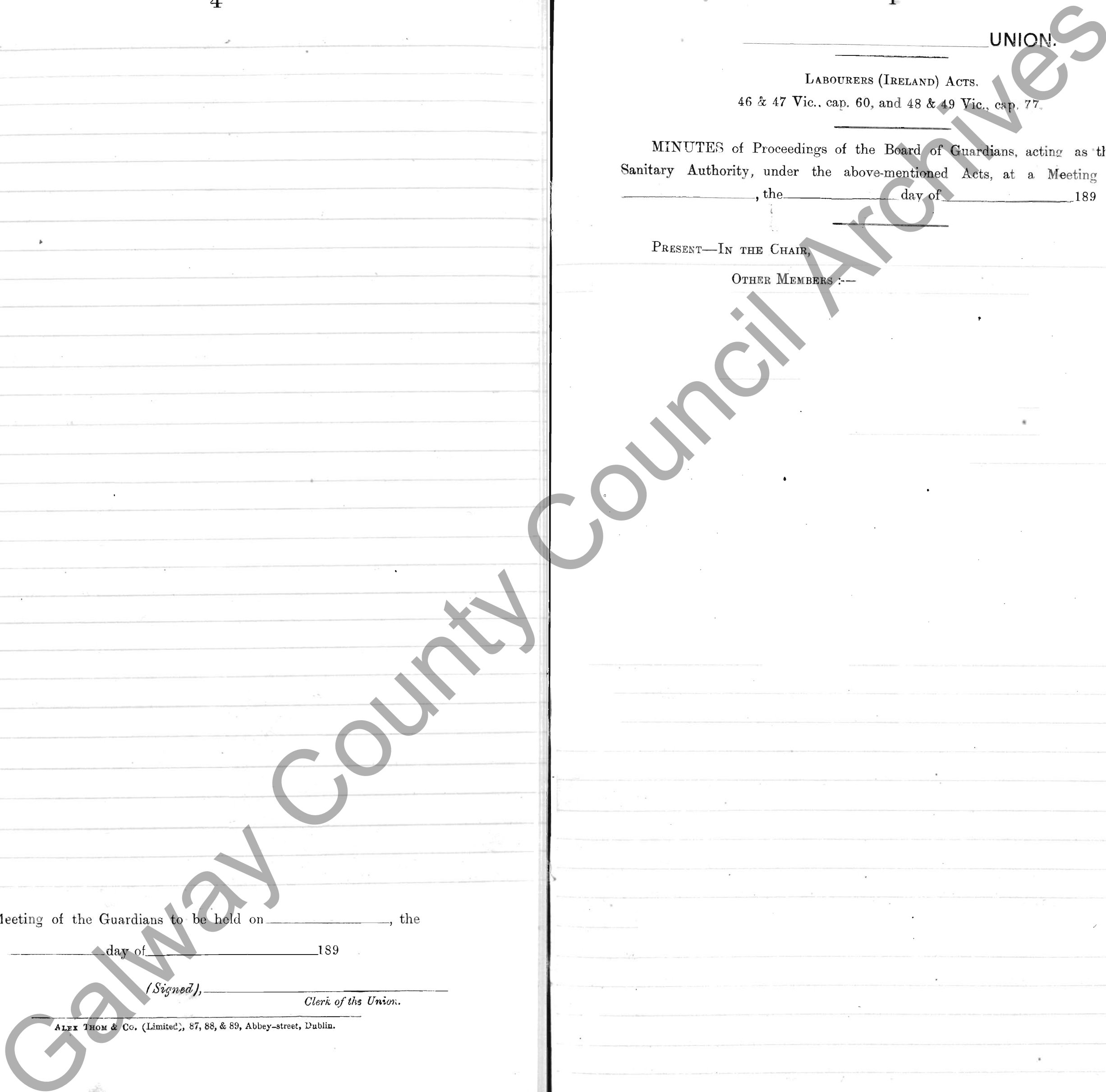

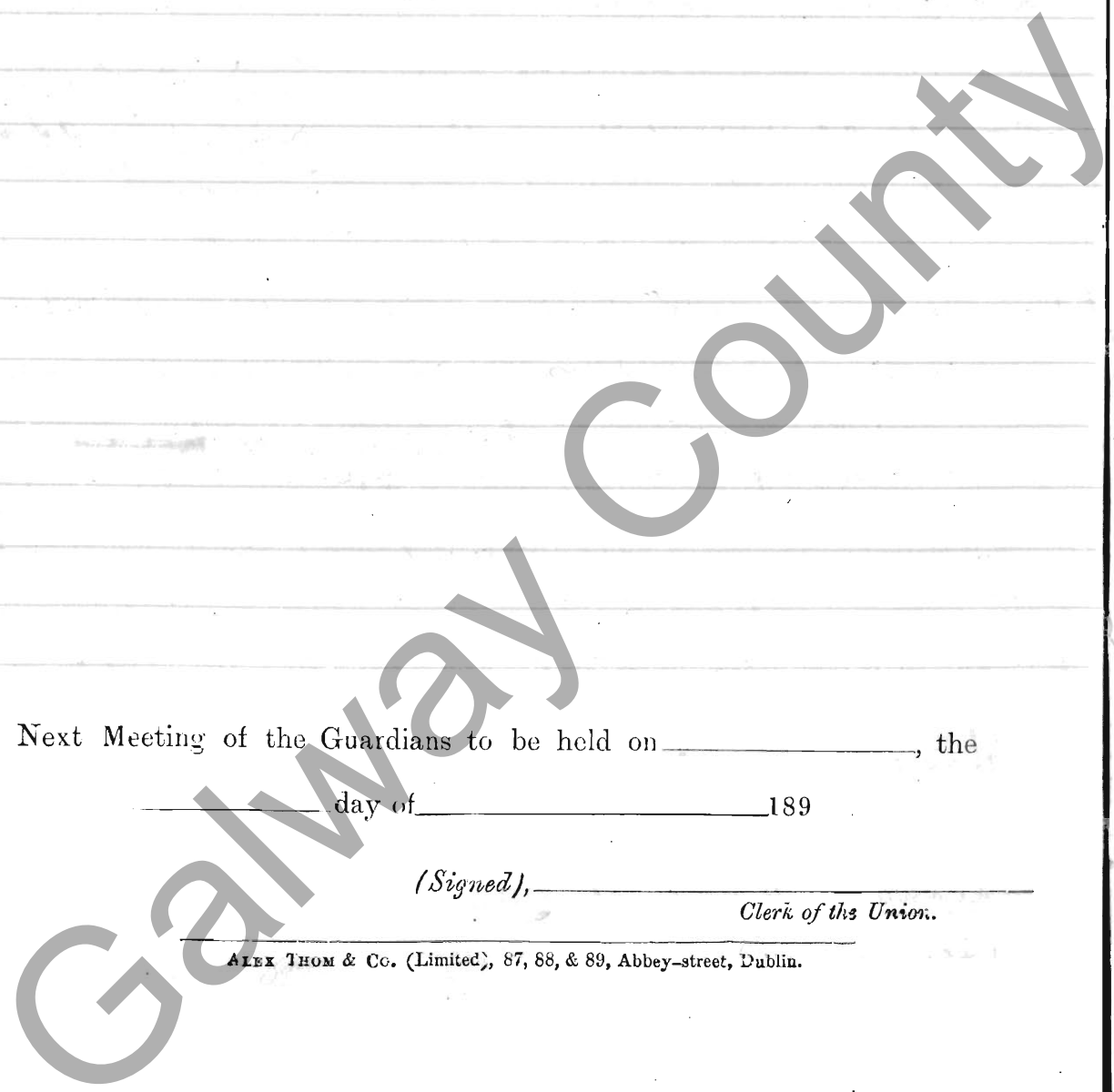

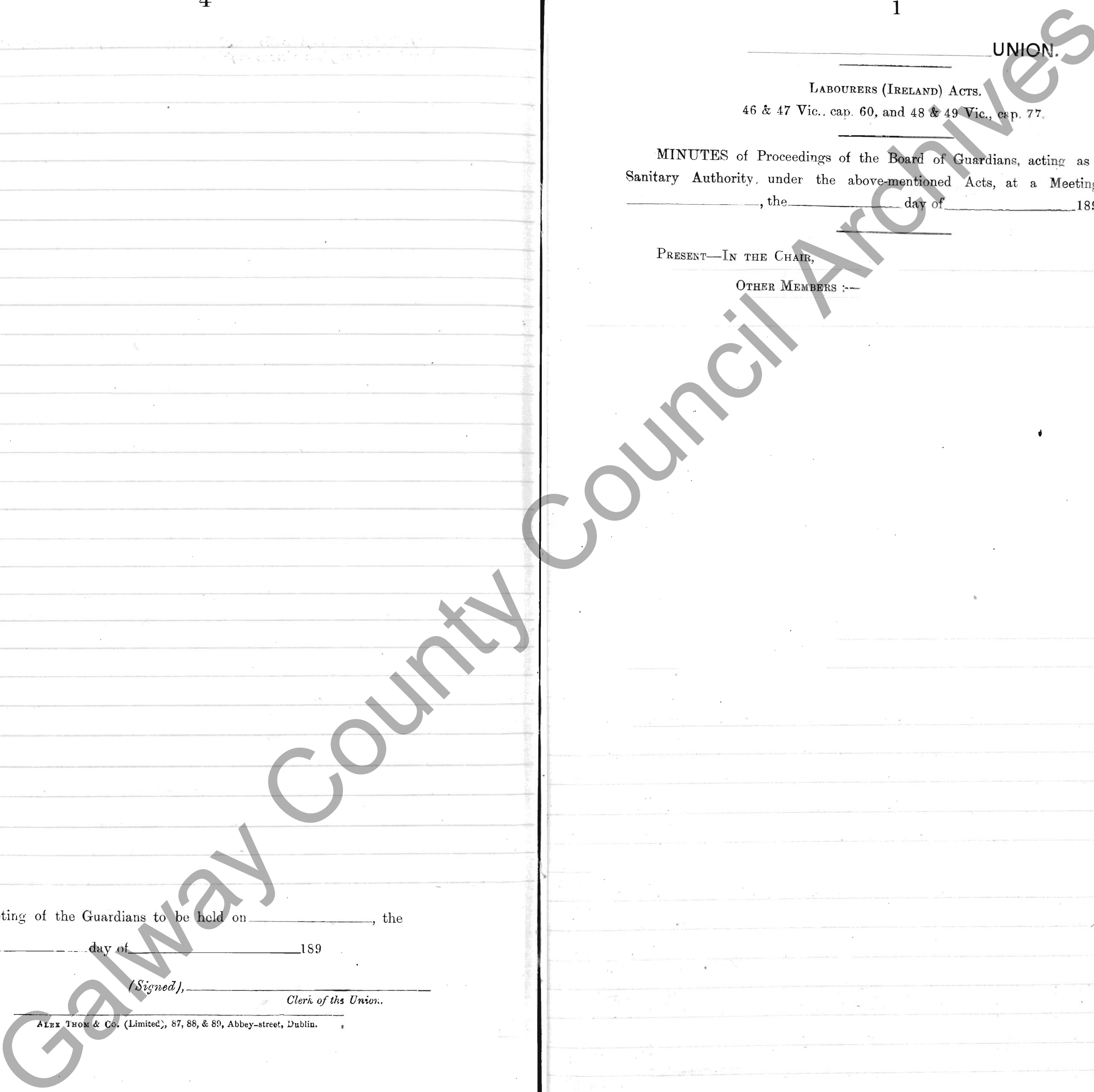
