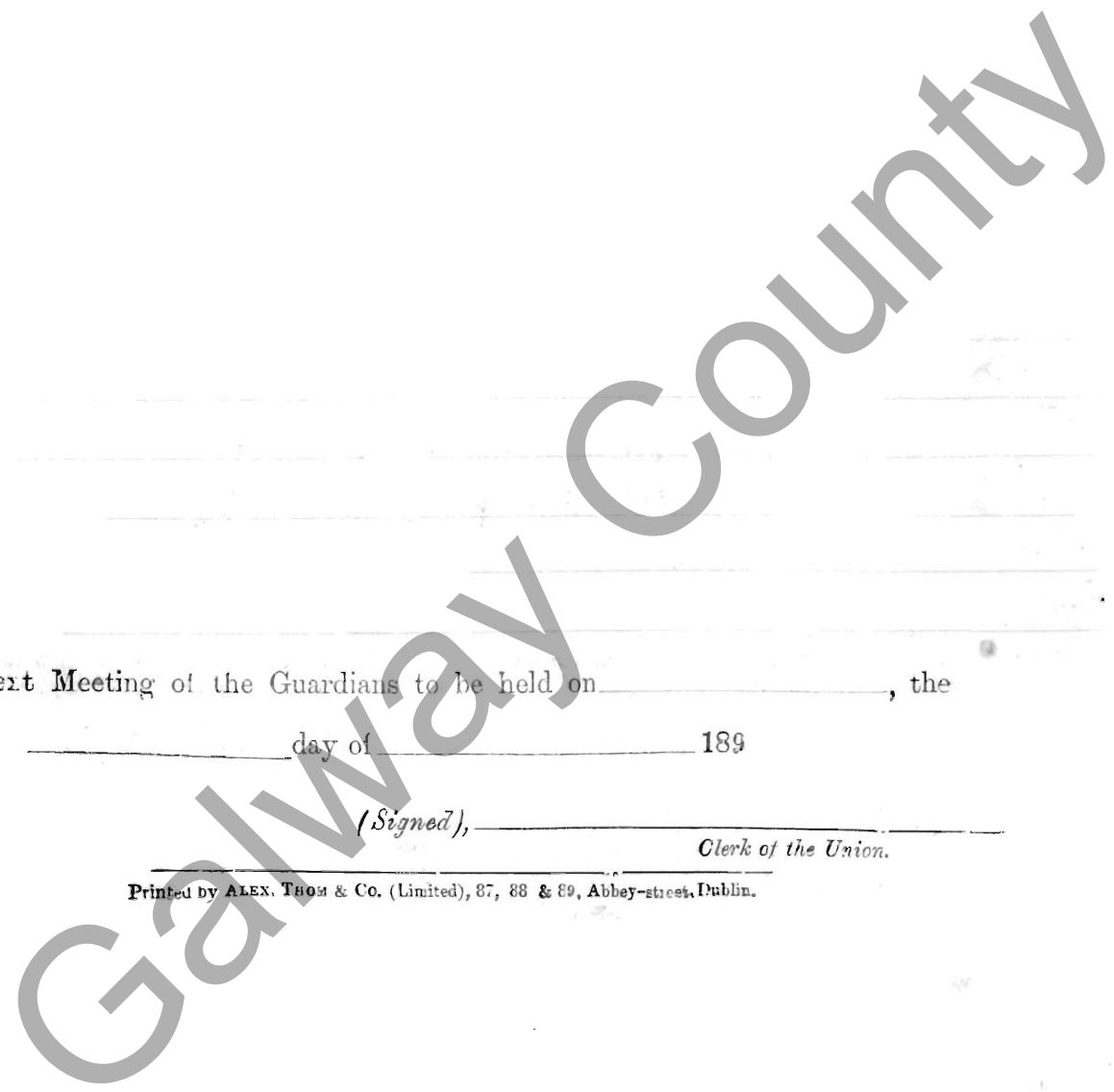

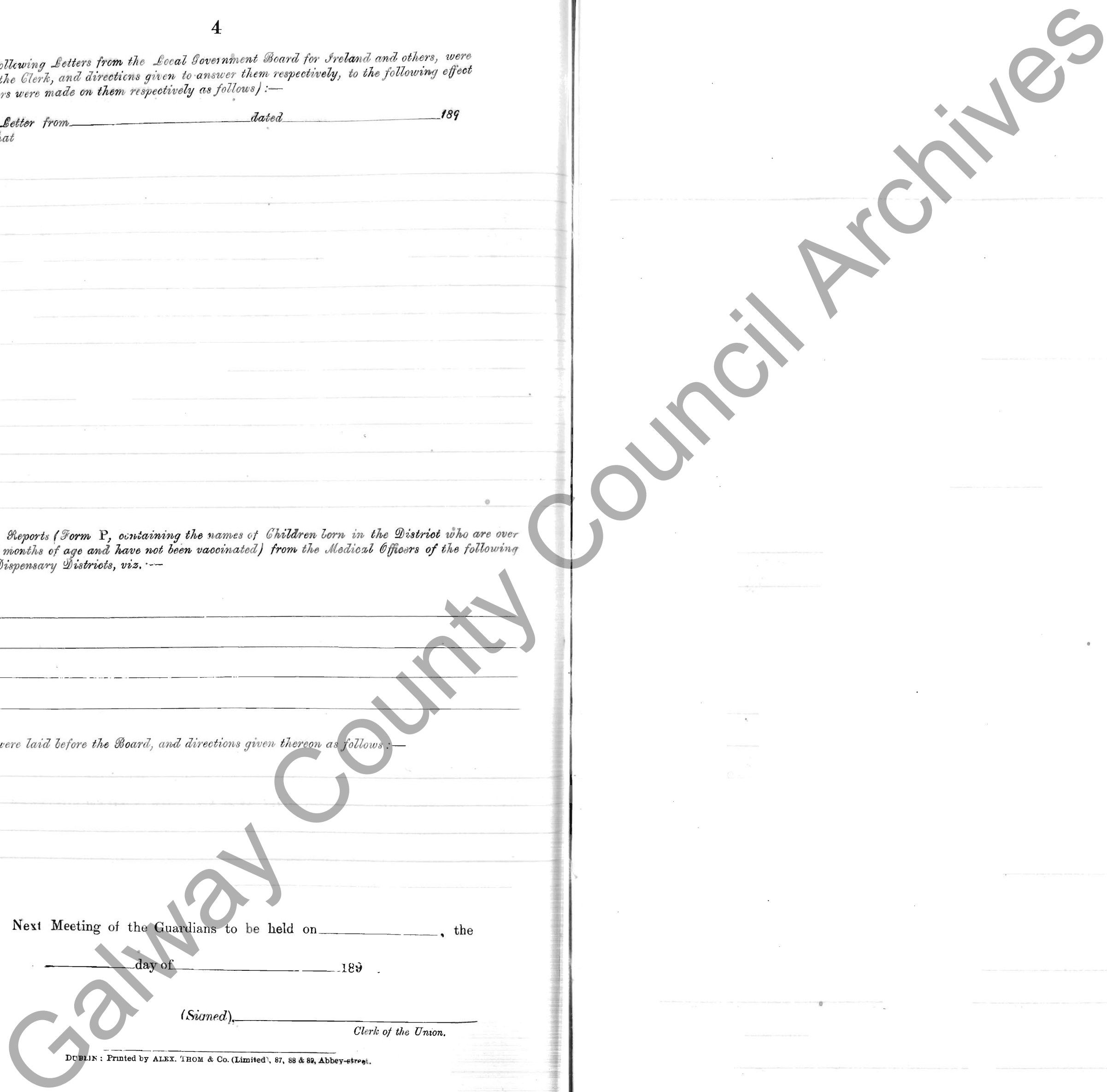

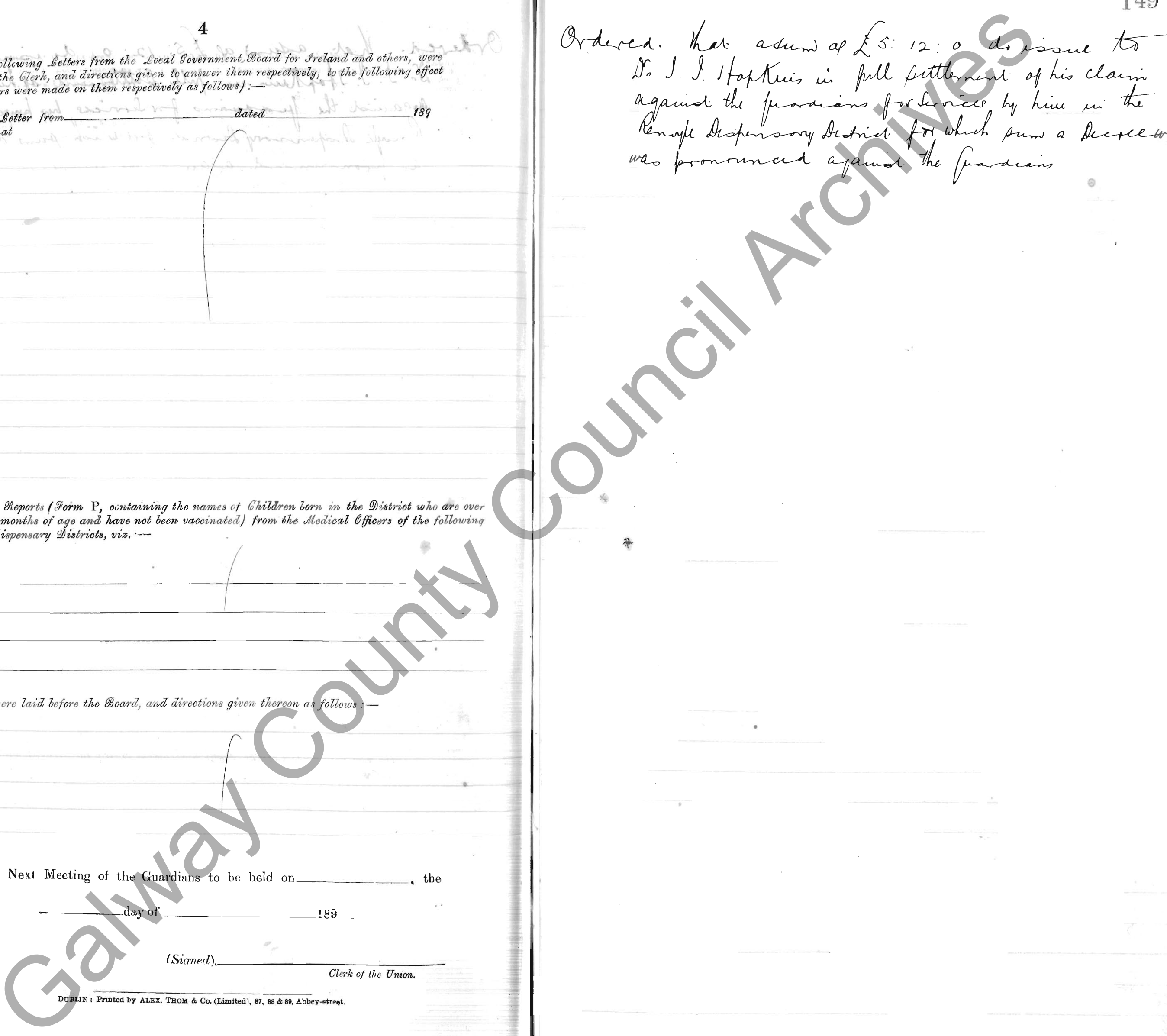

I have employed a good nurse to look after them and would recommend she be paid 10/- per week. and 3/- for it for her support during her attendance on these patients.
