I am directed by the Board of Guardians to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 4th instant asking for payment of £47. 15. 6 balance due to Mr Lyden of Aillebrack for goods supplied under "Relief of Distress Act 1886" and with reference thereto I beg to state: That this balance is included in a total sum due to a Contractor (Mr Michael O'Malley decd) whose affairs have gone into Bankruptcy and the Guardians on the 24th of January 1894 informed Messrs Molloy & Molloy, 18 Eustace St. Solicitors for the Assignees in Bankruptcy that Mr Lyden's Claim as well as a Miss Lyden's were included as sub or Contractors in the total debt as appearing due to the Estate of the Bankrupt.

The Bankruptcy Court have cautioned the Guardians against the payment to either of those parties stating that they were liable to be set aside as being paid to the Estate of the Bankrupt.
