Not being able to attend the meeting today for reasons of health, I beg to be allowed to submit the following suggestions.

1. Work in this district is much required and there will be great distress if it is not arranged for. Fortunately the work to which the people are well accustomed is the herring fishery in localities quite near to the workers' homes. That is to say to road making. That is the finishing of half made roads, and the cutting down of hills. The gang of men should be small in such work, say eight or ten in number, and there should be a handy man as ganger, who would receive a small increase in wages

Expensive supervision is not required, but it is necessary that the superior officers, who need not be always Army officers or Engineers should stop with the men at work, for say a couple of hours, & encourage them & learn from his own observation, who the best men are. are little better off than those who will be paid, & it is most unjust that heavy burdens should be placed on the shoulders of those who already pay heavy rates, & give some employment. To be sure they can defend themselves by stopping their usual employment — a contingency which was to be seriously contemplated. Seed potatoes will be much required and if not planted next month (February) cannot be expected to thrive. — I have always been of opinion, and often expressed it in the House of Commons, to have secretly Government bought potatoes abroad, perhaps in Germany, & should sell them at a little under market price, & with a small quantity of Landy artificial manure.

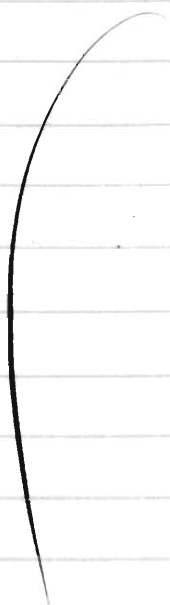

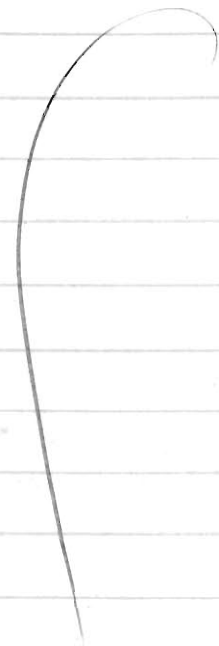
