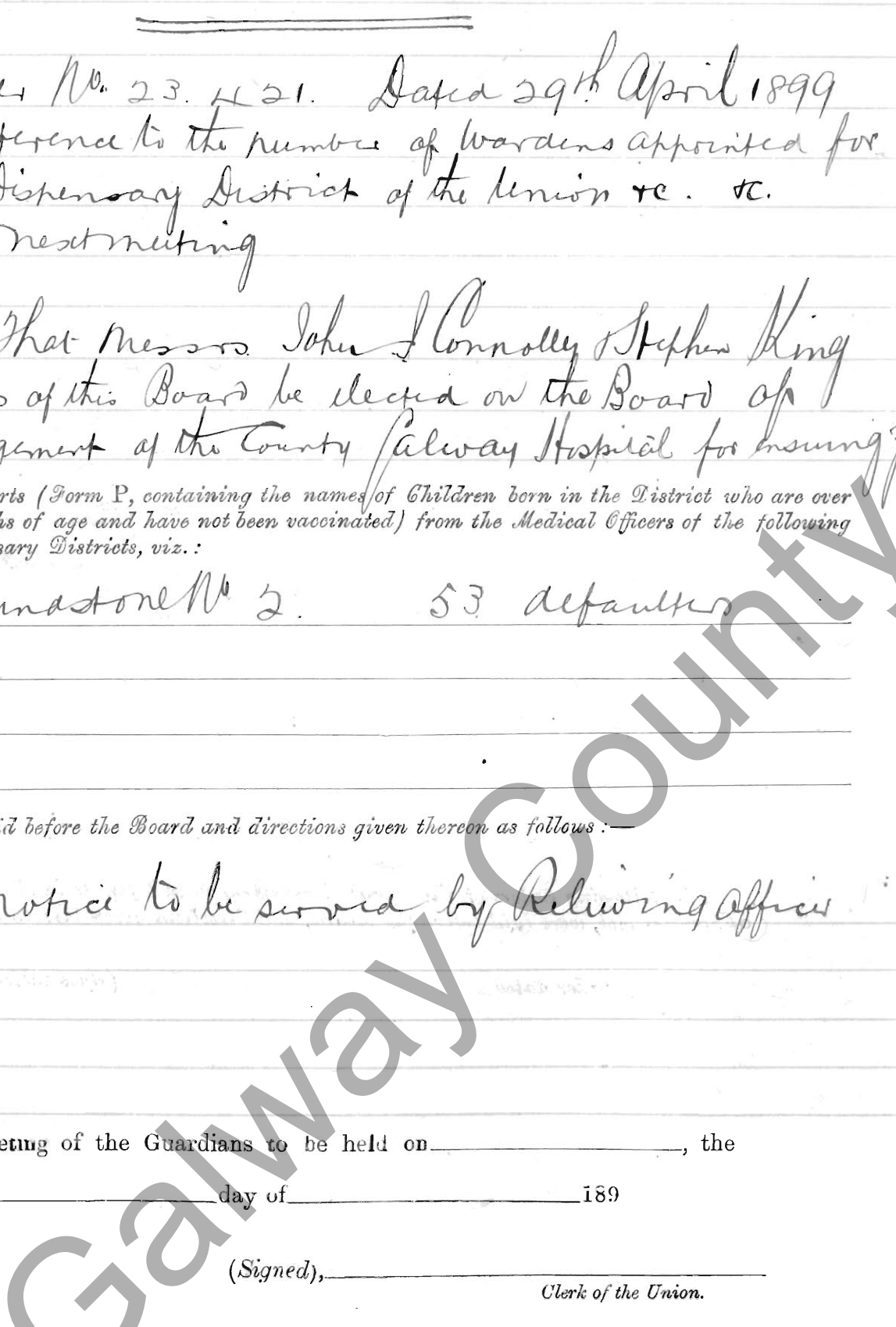

Letter from Clifden Union 1st June 1899

Gentlemen

I beg to inform you that while attending a patient in Cleggan my attention was directed by the Acting Sergeant at Keshelbrack to the state of the dock, the tide happened to be out at the time, from which an extremely offensive odour arose owing to decaying vegetable matter (sea weed) so odour arises when there happens to be water in it, but when the dock is empty and a strong sun acts on the rotting seaweed a most offensive smell arises and the air about the place is bound to become impregnated with the poison arising from the decaying vegetable matter which is likely to act most injuriously on those working in the fish trade and perhaps be the cause of an epidemic. This can easily be remedied by a few men raking the weed from the bottoms into a heap when there is only a few feet of water in the dock and the tide on the ebb and put into a small boat ^{it can} afterwards ^{be} thrown into the harbour

Gentlemen
On Thursday 8th inst. I inspected the steam

Cooking & Apparatus. There are some small matters not quite completed, and there was some difficulty from the injectors not being adjusted, but these matters have nothing to do with the general character of the work done by Mr. Little which is as far as I have seen excellent.

The cooking arrangements will be found to be very convenient. The potato steamer will cook the full of it in about half an hour and the boiling pans take about the same time to boil. When everything is quite complete I shall pay another visit and some members of the Board might be able to attend.

It will be necessary to make a proper washing up place, and I am informed that if the Coals for firing the boilers are not locked up they will be carried off for fires in the other parts of the Workhouse. The Water is satisfactorily boiled in the Laundry tubs.

In regard to the sum to be expended in general repairs it will be in your knowledge that it would be possible to spend a large sum under this head and it is necessary to make a selection. The works so far undertaken are:— 1st The Kitchen chimney stack. 2nd A single flue stack at Womens Infirmary Kitchen. 3rd Another stack at Womens Infirmary. 4th The defective sheeting of the small buildings, bop and pits lavatories has been replaced with thin concrete walls. 5th The roofs are being thoroughly repaired. The whole of the eaves gutters were defective and I instructed the Clerk of works to have the old gutters taken down and cleaned and any good lengths sorted out to be used again. (I fear there are but few of these) It will be necessary to have the eaves gutters properly put up on strong hooks all over and properly connected to sufficient down spoutings.

A most serious defect is the state of the two valleys in the roof of the dining hall. The lead is all gone in holes, the leakage of rain water is very considerable and the roof timbers are rotted. The original construction of these valleys was bad and to make them right will be difficult and expensive - The defective window of the nurses room has been removed and a sash window put in

The repairs to the roofs and dangerous chimney stacks were imperative - In regard to other matters you may more or less restrict expenditure.

I shall revisit Clifden at an early date and shall be prepared to explain to the members of the Board of Guardians the various matters and let them know the expense.

3rd The "Fort Well" This well which is the one most generally used by the public is in the yard of the proposed new Dispensary premises and contains a fair supply of water, it is usually a good well, but, through want of protection, it has been recently polluted by some children in a most grave and wanton manner, so that it is at present most poisonous to any of the inhabitants who may use it.

4th "Paddy Ward's Well", - In this well which is about a quarter of a mile west of the town

Gentlemen: I

I beg to inform you as the Sanitary Authority that a proper and efficient water supply for the town of Roundstone has long since been felt, and as is now sorely needed, and that towards this end I inspected

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there is a beautiful clear spring ^{water} well, but it is scanty in amount & too far away for ordinary use. The people have recourse to it when the other wells are dry, and I would recommend that it be made use of in giving a supply of pure water to the town.

5th. Letterdife well — About half a mile behind the town on the Eastern slope of Dodard Hill contains a good supply of pure spring water, which except in dry weather overflows so as to feed two others about 50 paces lower down one of which is in Mr. McCullagh's field, and the other is known as Dodard well, besides these two offshoot from Letterdife well, there are other small ones which I believe of the same origin, and if deepened could be utilized thus securing a good and constant supply; — I beg to recommend as a means of giving the inhabitants of the town a constant & efficient and pure supply of water that Paddy Ward's and Letterdife wells together with all their branches be cleaned out enlarged and deepened covered safely so as to protect them from pollution, and connected by means of pipes which joining in one main pipe would empty into a large Reservoir erected somewhere in the neighbourhood of mid Nees House where a Pump could be set, I also recommend that the well at the Fort be cleaned out and lime washed without delay so as to enable the public to have pure portable water in the town until a more complete system is provided as suggested, I do state that if some immediate steps are not taken to remedy the dearth and impurity of the water as existing at present in Roundstone I fear it may not be long until an epidemic fever of a virulent type supervenes amongst the inhabitants I beg to send you herewith samples of the water from six of the wells mentioned in this report for analysis

Roundstone Water Supply
To The Rural District Council of Clifden

Gentlemen,

I have carefully examined the sources of water supply available for the town of Roundstone, and I am of opinion that the best and most economical source is in the townland of Letterdife. The pressure will be very good (as good as Clifden) The distance is not very great 1200 yards. I would propose to lay a main pipe from the branch road to monastery (at the Chapel) to the end of the new pier, and erect say 6 fountains, the length of this main would be 500 yards. We may have some trouble from rock in laying the pipe, and it will be necessary to provide a Storage reservoir at the source. To prepare an exact estimate it will be necessary to make some trial openings particularly at the site of the Storage reservoir, but I am of opinion that a satisfactory supply of 10000 gallons a day (30 gals a head for a population of 500) can be provided at a cost not exceeding £600. for material & work (this does not include any legal, Engineering, expenses or cost of land) It will be necessary to get possession of about 50 yards by 50 yards of land. This I understand is in the occupation of Henry Robinson Esqr, and the lord of the soil is R. Berridge Esqr. I should think that the Council will

have no difficulty in arranging with these Gentlemen by private agreement, and that the district will not need to incur the expense of provisional works for this small work. In providing the Storage reservoir it will be advisable to clear out the bog at the source and I am of opinion the water will then be of a better quality, when this is done, than it is at present.
