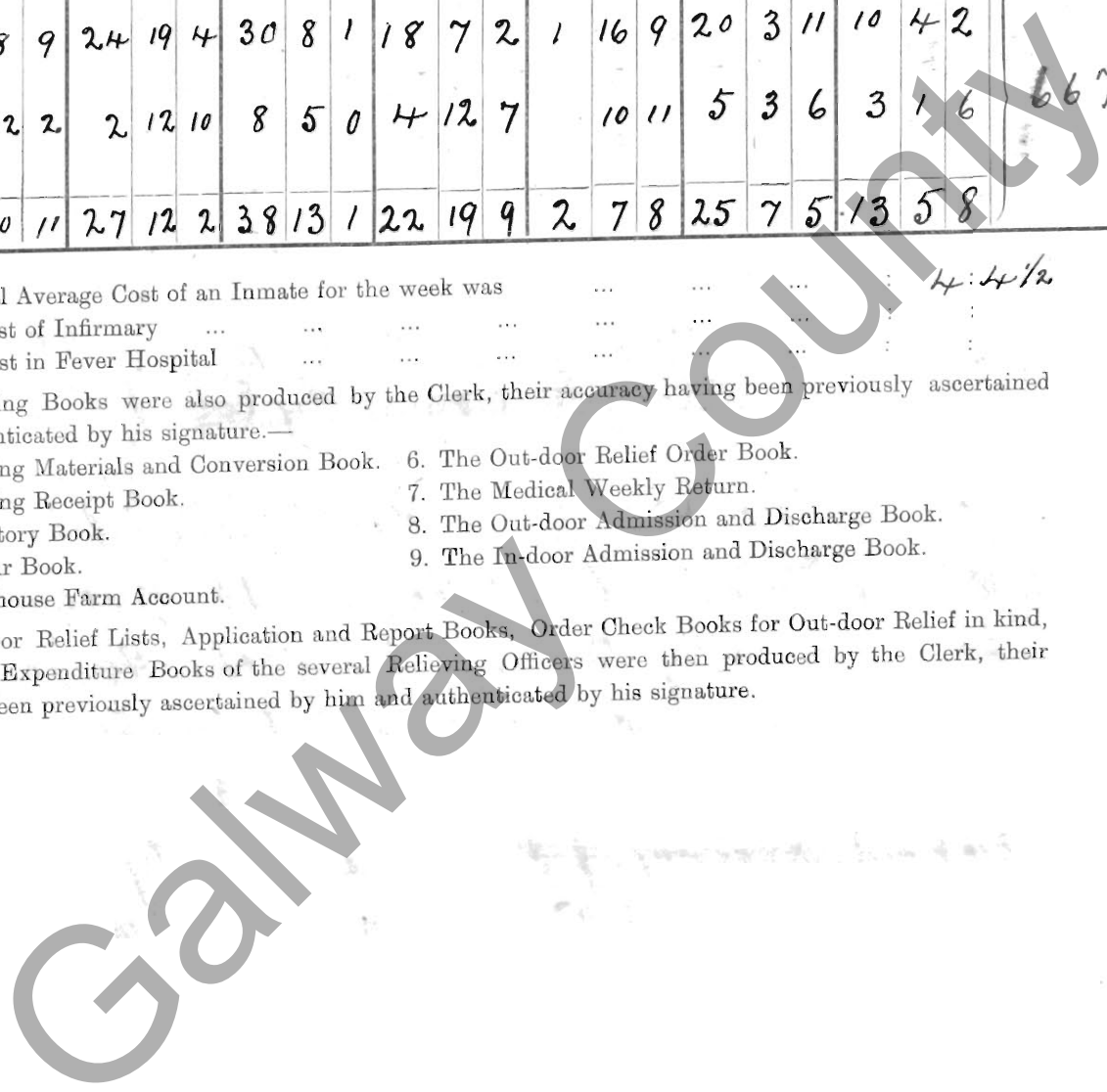

The poor man not having returned a search was made when his dead body was found at the bottom of the area:— About an hour and a half elapsed between the time of his leaving the Ward (7 o'clk p.m.) and the finding of the body as testified to at the Inquest held at the Beas Room on Friday the 15th just by Mr Charles Cottonham Coroner.

The Coroner and Jurors having visited the scene of the accident and viewed the body found that death was accidental caused by the deceased falling into the area and recommended a railing should be at once erected around the unprotected place.

On the night of the accident the acting master communicated at once with the Medical Officer who attended immediately accompanied by D. Ryan but life was then extinct. She reported the occurrence next morning to the Constabulary with the result that the Inquest was held.

The acting master also reports: - That another inmate Thomas Somers died suddenly in the male ward. He was found dead in his bed on the morning of Friday last the 15th inst. He was apparently in his usual health on Thursday night when I visited the ward at 9:30 p.m. and later at the hour of 10 o'cl. p.m. when Mr. Bookin workhouse Porter was locking up, Somers was talking to him - Deceased did not receive the last rites of the church. The medical officer certifies the cause of death to ~~death~~ "Heart Disease".
